recommendation that substitute teacher pay be raised from \$15 to \$20 per day. Substitute Teacher Aides pay will be \$15.00. The local Textbook Committee was approved as recommended by the Superintendent of Schools. His committee will examine the new State Textbooks for 1975-76 from an approved list from the State Board of Education. The local committees selections will be presented to the Local Board of Trustees in the March of 1975 meeting for approval. Committee members are Mrs. Mary Crane, Mrs. Mary B. Obenhaus, Milton Oylar, Mrs. Jane Rudd, Bill Taylor, Patsy Brown, Mrs. Owetha Finley, Wayland Ethridge, Mrs. Aileen Siewert, Mrs. Barbara Milburn, Mrs. Betty Jennings, Kerry Moore, Fred Mardis, Mrs. Elizabeth Watson and Neal B. Dillman. The current enrollment report showed a total of 1849 students enrolled in the Muleshoe Schools as of Nov. 8, 1974 as compared to 1910 enrolled last year at this same time. This shows a difference of 61 less students than last year. The library circulation report was also heard and it was shown that a total of 14,231 books are in circulation. The board discussed the U.L.L. Letter and Jacket Award Rule. \$20.00 is the maximum price that can be paid for an award jacket or blanket, an additional \$3.00 can be spent for various types of patches that may go on the jacket in addition to a letter. There will be a referendum vote by all league schools to raise

this price beginning with the 1975-76 school year. The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Virginia Rojas, Teacher Aide, Mary DeShazo Elementary School, effective October 24, and approved the employment of Mrs. Frances Ramos, Teacher Aide, Mary DeShazo Elementary School, effective November 5. The board then discussed "Plan A" Special Education that requires all schools in Texas to participate by September of 1976. The Muleshoe Schools are currently operating under Plan B. Plan A requires a Co-op with area schools with a minimum Average Daily Attendance of 3,000. This will open areas of participation in Education of Educable Mentally Retarded; Trainable Mentally Retarded; Language and Learning Disabilities; Emotionally Disturbed; Speech Handicapped; Minimally Brain Injured, etc. Plan A will also provide the services of a counselor, diagnostician, supervisor and consultative services, depending upon the total average daily attendance of the Co-op. At the present time the local schools have four units of Educable Mentally Retarded and have had a speech correction unit but could not find a qualified teacher for this unit this year. The board requested that a letter of request be sent to the Texas Education Agency asking for a Plan A Unit, locally based on a reduced pro rata share of the personnel figured from the local average daily attendance. The board discussed and studied new Federal Regulations being handled down from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The new Privacy Law Regulations released by H.E.W. that will go into effect November 20, 1974 was also discussed. Under the new law, school officials must make student records available for inspection by parents or students over the age of 18. The new law states that no Federal Funds will be available to any educational institution which denies parents or students (if over 18 years of age), the right to inspect any and all official records, files and data directly related to the student. Schools must publicize the fact that parents and students now have the right to see their files and parents may challenge the contents of the files. This will not affect the local policy very much, because student files have been available at the parents request. The board requested that the local board policies be adjusted so as to conform with the Federal Laws. This is to be presented for approval at the next regular board meeting. The board also approved replacing the roof of the Mary DeShazo School. Criticisms of school personnel were discussed and the board approved the dismissing of school at 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, November 27, for the Thanksgiving holidays. School then will resume on Monday, December 2. The next regular meeting of the board will be on Monday, December 9, at 7:30 p.m.

### OLD FASHIONED POTATO SALAD

- 1/4 cup tarragon vinegar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika

"Since meat takes the largest portion of your food dollar, a comparative shopping trip is a good idea," Frances Reasonover with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, pointed out.

The specialist suggested you consider the number of servings you will need and the number of servings per pound you can expect from each of the products you're comparing--turkey and ham, for example.

"You can expect two and a half servings from one pound of ham with bone in, but three servings from a pound of boneless ham.

"One pound of whole fresh turkey yields two servings per pound, while one pound of turkey breast or boneless turkey roast gives three servings," Miss Reasonover pointed out.

Nutrition wise, turkey and ham are comparable. Both are good sources of protein--but pound for pound, turkey has a little more protein and less fat than ham. This may be a consideration if you are on a special low-fat diet, she noted.

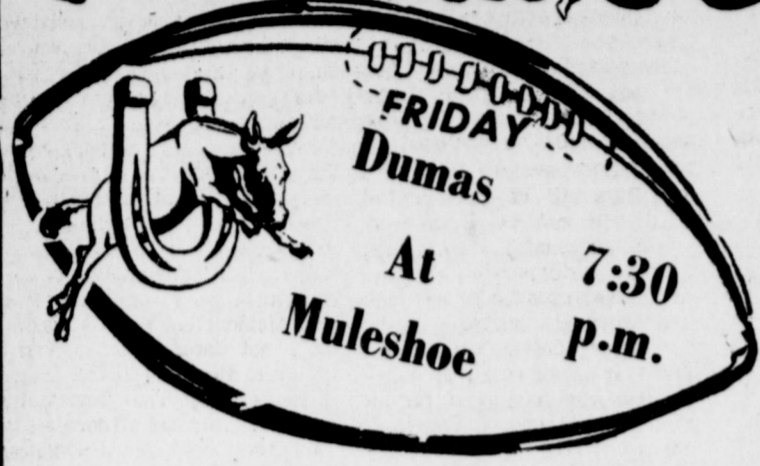

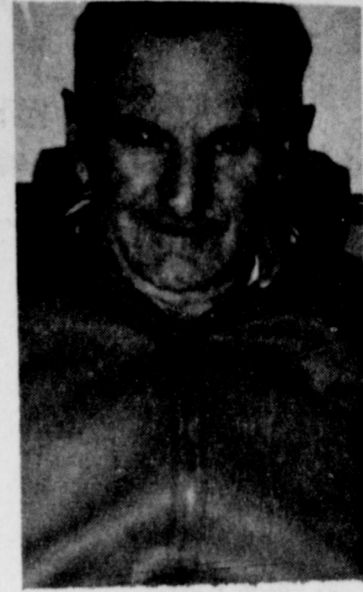

country where some of the finest wool in the world is produced.

Tourism is also a booming industry in their country.

Bird life and wild flowers are abundant in Australia and some species are found nowhere else in the world. Australia also has rain forests, virtually

untouched by civilized man. Also there are wastelands in Australia which receive little or no rainfall.

The Davies live in Bundaberg, a city of about 30,000 people. It is located about 250 miles North of Brisbane.

They have two sons and a daughter. One son is a mechanical engineer and his wife is an industrial chemist. The other son is an insurance inspector and his wife is a registered nurse. Their daughter is a scholastic

teacher and teaches in a private school. She has visited Muleshoe before.

Davies explained that Australia is an independent country, a member of the Commonwealth. The political head of the country is called the Prime Minister and each state has a premier.

The Queen of England is also the Queen of Australia and she has an appointed representative called the Governor General and also representatives in each state called governors. Australia is made up of six states,

plus a federal territory which is where the capitol is located. The Australian people are an outdoor type people. The weather allows them to be active outdoors, day and night. They are also very sports minded and participate in many kinds of sports.

Davies stated that Australians value their weekends and that almost all of the stores and shops over there close at mid-day Saturday and do not open again until Monday.

Entertainment in Australia is about the same as in the states. The Australians love music and dancing. There are some movie theaters, but Australia has not yet received color television. Davies said they would be receiving color next year.

The theater is very popular in Australia and each state has a traveling symphony.

The Davies are enjoying visiting America, but will be glad to return to their home in December.

## Hunting Seasons Now In Full Swing Here

Goose and sandhill crane seasons are in full swing in the western part of the state as well as duck season.

Goose season west of U.S. Highway 81 is October 19-January 19; east of U.S. 81, October 28-November 24 and December 7-January 19.

Duck season in that part of West Texas which is known as the "High Plains Mallard Management Unit" started November 4 and runs through November 24, and resumes December 7 until January 19.

In the remainder of Texas, duck season is November 9-24 and December 9 through January 19.

Pheasant season is to begin December 14 through 29 with two cocks per day and 36 in possession.

Quail season is to start November 16 through February 16 with 12 per day and 36 in possession.

Sandhill or little brown cranes are legal October 26-January 26 in what is known as "Zone A", generally the western most part of the state. The big birds may be hunted in "Zone B" November 30-January 26.

The daily bag on sandhills is three per day with a possession limit of six.

Migratory bird regulations require that a fully feathered wing remain attached to such game birds while being transported from the place taken to the residence of the hunter or to a commercial processing facility.

ility. The big cranes are arriving late in the Panhandle this year, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game warden Bobby Goff of Lubbock.

"Hunters will have to search for the birds the first part of the season," Goff said, "but cold weather will send the rest of the cranes south later in the year."

Large playa lakes on the South Plains are ideal for wintering cranes and they usually number over 200,000 by January each year.

A federal migratory bird stamp is not required for hunting sandhills, but the stamp is necessary for hunting ducks and geese.

## Foreign Trade And Livestock Prices

COLLEGE STATION--Are high imports and low exports the cause of current falling cattle price?

Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, sheds some light on this question with a few facts.

"During January to June of 1974, imports of beef, veal and pork into the U.S. were down three per cent from last year's levels, while imports of cattle were down 21 per cent, says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "High imports, however, were up 184 per cent over last year's levels."

Uvacek went on to say that beef and veal exports were down eight per cent over last year's levels, while pork exports were down 77 per cent. However, cattle exports have gone up 82 per cent, with a 231 per cent increase in cattle exports to Canada.

"Despite these low import levels, except for hogs, and higher cattle exports, the price gilts has shown a marked decrease to 1973 levels," he adds. "This should emphasize the fact that current low cattle prices have a much deeper domestic root than foreign trade in livestock would explain."
