Lula Gorrell observed the original Veteran's Day Monday, November 11, by dressing in her original World War I nurses uniform.

Mrs. Gorrell who is 81 years old served three years as a nurse in the American Red Cross during World War I. She says her salary was paid by the U.S. Army and the Army also commissioned her as a Lieutenant.

At the age of 18, Mrs. Gor-

rell left her home in Clearfield Pennsylvania, where she graduated from nurses school, and joined the Red Cross. She trained in Fort Banks, Mass. and then went over to France where she was stationed in several different hospitals during

Mrs. Gorrell states that she was never wounded and did not take the flu that killed thousands of her fellow workers over in France.

After serving in France she was transferred to San Francisco and then to Camp Lewis Washington. She was discharged at Fitsimmons in Denver. Colo. In 1934, Mrs. Gorrell and her husband moved to Muleshoe

where they farmed. She states that one day Dr. L.T. Green came to the farm and asked her to work for him for just one week until he could get another nurse. Mrs. Gorrell worked for him for 10 years after that.

Mrs. Gorrell has one son, Roger of Austin, and one daughter, Mrs. Frankie Mason of Denver, and six grandchildren. Mrs. Gorrell was the school ourse in Muleshoe for 10 years

recommendation that substitute teacher pay be raised from \$15 to \$20 per day. Substitute Tea-cher Aides pay will be \$15.00.

The local Textbook Committee was approved as recommended by the Superintendent of Schools. His committee will examine the new State Textbooks for 1975-76 from an approved list from the State oard of Education. The local mmittees selections will be resented to the Local Board of Trustees in the March of 1975 meeting for approval.

The current enrollment report showed a total of 1849 students enrolled in the Muleshoe Schools as of Nov. 8, 1974 as compared to 1910 enrolled last year at this same time. This shows a difference of 61 less students than last year.

The library circulation report was aldo heard and it was shown that a total of 14,231 books are

in circulation.
The board discussed the U.I.L. Letter and Jacket Award Rule. \$20.00 is the maximum price that can be paid for an award jacket or blanket. an additional \$3.00 can be spent for various types of patches that may go on the jacket in addition to a letter. There will be a referendum vote by from the Department of Health, all league schools to raise Education and Welfare.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Virginia Roas, Teacher Aide, Mary De-Sha: o Elementary School, effective October 24, and approved the employement of Mrs. Frances Ramos, Teacher Aide. Mary DeShazo Elementary

School, effective November 5.
The board then discussed "Plan A" Special Education that requires all schools in Texas to participate by September of 1976. The Muleshoe Schools are currently opperating under Plan B.

Plan A requires a Co-op with area schools with a minimum Average Daily Attendance of 3,000. This will open areas of participation in Education of Educatable Mentally Retarded; Trainable Mentally Retarded; Language and Learning Disabilities; Emotionaly Disturbed; Speech Handicapped; Minimumally Brain Injured, etc.

Plan A will also provide the services of a counselor, diagnostician, supervisor and consultative services, depending upon the total average daily attendance of the Co-op.

At the present time the local schools have four units of Educatable Mentally Retarded and have had a speech correction unit but could not find a qualified teacher for this unit this year.

The board requested that a letter of request be sent to the Texas Education Agency asking for a Plan A Unit, locally based on a reduced pro rata share of the personnel figured from the local average daily attendance.

The board discussed and studied new Federal Regulations being handled down The new Privacy Law Reg-lations released by H.E.W. that will go into effect November

20,1974 was also descussed. Under the new law, school officials must make student records available for inspection by parents or students over the age of 18. The new law states that no Federal Funds will be available to any educational institution which denies parents or students (if over 18 years of age), the right to inspect any and all official records, files and data

directly related to the student. Schools must publicize the fact that parents and students now have the right to see their files and parents may challenge the contents of the files

This will not affect the local policy very much, because student files have been available at the parents request.

The Board requested that the local board policies be adjusted so as to conform with the Federal Laws. This is to be presented for approval at the next regualr board meeting.

The board also approved replacing the roof of the Mary DeShazo School.

Criticisms of school personnel were discussed and the board approved the dismissing of school at 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, November 27, for the Thanksgiving holidays. School then will resume on Monday, December 2.

The next regular meeting of the board will be on Monday, December 9, at 7:30 p.m.

And Livestock Prices

COLLEGE STATION -- Are high imports and low exports the cause of current falling cattle price?

Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, sheds some light on this question with a fee facts. "During January to June of 1974, imports of beef, veal and pork into the U.S. were down three per cent from last year's levels, while imports of cattle were down 21 per cent, says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Hog imports, however, were up 184 per cent over last year's lev-

Uvacek went on to say that beef and veal exports were down eight per cent over last year's levels, while pork exports were down 77 per cent. However, cattle exports have gone up 87 per cent, with a 231 per cent increase in cattle exports to Canada.

"Despite these low import levels, except for hogs, and higher cattle exports, the price gilts has shown a marked des; to 1973 levels, he adds. "This should emphasize the fact that current low cattle prices have a much deeper somestic root than foreign trade in livestick would explain."


