

# LOS ANGELES BADLY SHAKEN

Los Angeles, Cal., July 16.—Four severe earthquakes here today threw the city and its suburbs into excitement, indirectly caused a number of injuries to men, women and children, and slightly damaged several buildings, chiefly old ones, but none to a great extent.

While the shock seemed to center in Los Angeles some were felt more than thirty miles away, but as in this city no material damage was reported from any other city or town.

An unusually warm morning produced from some of the ritizens the remark "good earthquake weather." It was said in jest, and none were more surprised than those who made the remark when the first trembler came at 10:10 o'clock in the morning. It felt much as does the sudden stopping of a street car operated by an inexperienced motorman, only that the trembler produced the unpleasant sensation multiplied many times.

Excitement, in many cases hysterical, followed the first shock, and had hardly been calmed when at 1:27 o-clock in the afternoon came the second, followed two minutes later by the third. these two were shorter than the first. Then the agitation of the citizens became prolonged, and it was some time before it was a case of "business as usual."

Courts and other public places were scenes of near-panic, some people unning for the open, some fainting, some stopping to pray. Many gathered at street intersections and others walked down the middle of the streets with watchful eyes on the buildings. Many sought Pershing Square, in the heart of the downtown district, as a sanctuary, and remained there for ours. Pictures were jolted from nooks; mortar jarred from brick walls and plaster from ceilings; cracks appeared in some older structures; a water main was broken; a few copings and chimneys fell; parts of an embankment collapsed, throwing dirt and brick into the street, and plate glass windows in some department stores were broken.

The morning trembler shook mortar from brick walls and plaster from walls and ceilings, sending four persons to the receiving hospital with minor injuries and frightening the majority of the population. The shock at 1:27 was followed so quickly by the third at 1:29 that it was difficult to tell just what damage could be attributed to either of those two.

The fourth shock was felt at 6:13 tonight. There was no damage reported. It was lighter than the preceding shock.

RAT EXTERMINATION HOPE AND DESIRE OF TEXAS TOWNS

Austin, July 18 .- That Texas cities and towns are willing and anxious to inaugurate rat extermination campaigns is the sense of letters pouring into the State Health Department, and the writers ask for more detailed information as to methods of pro-

In answer to these queries the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering of the State Health Department gives the following suggested outline:


