Acting upon the warning of Mr McConnell, a movement will, in the near future, be started, it is understood to form a local advertising league, which shall have for its purpose the principle of cleaner advertising for Graham. Under this league an executive committee would be appointed to investigate the applications of persons desiring to solicit advertising in the city. Should the medium they represent be found an honest one, then a card would be issued to this effect On the other hand should the advertising scheme be found a fake, no card would be given the applicant.

Under this system, which is employed in all the larger cities, the merchants and business men would be fully protected and thereby relieved of responsibility and annoyance. All that would be necessary under this plan would be for the merchant to ask to see the permit of any perten who presented himself to solicit edvertising. If the person failed to produce a permit, then he would be me arred to the committee.




