REPORTED MAKING 350°BARRELS DAILY

Ketch & King's well, owned by the Hamon estate and located on the Stovall land, is making 350 barrels from the top of the 2,097-foot sand. The well, an offset to Hall & Rutherford's No. 1 Harris, came in last Tuesday night. It is located about a mile and a half west of South Bend and a quarter of a mile north of

BUNGER DISTRICT



With five producing oil sands and an average production of 20,000 bar-rels daily, Young county is forging swiftly ahead and taking rank among the most important oil sec-tions in the country.

The outstanding features this week in connection with development work is the picking up in pro-duction of the Costello well, owned by the National Oil & Refining Com-pany, and located just over the line in Palo Pinto county, after being drilled 23 feet deeper into the sand.

Griffed 23 feet deeper into the sand. From a small 10-barrel pumper on the 2,680-foot sand, the well has increased its flow to 75 barrels daily, thereby lending added importance to the Strawn sand in a strip of terri-tory extending from the South Bend pool to the Palo Pinto county line, approximately 20 miles long. The oil tests out 40 gravity.

New Pipe Line

Operators in Young county, long hindered by lack of adequate pipe line facilities, are gratified to learn that the Texas Company has started that the Texas Company has started the work of stringing an 8-inch line from the Lyden pool in Stephens county to the South Bend field. There is only one pipe line company in the field at present, the Prairie Com-pany, whose capacity is only 10,000 barrels daily. Many wells after top-ping the sand have been held up for a considerable length of time waiting to be put on the line. to be put on the line.







What's the Matter

What's the matter with our school children? The American Child Hygiene Association reports that "of the 22,000,000 school children of the nation, statistics show that from 15 to 25 per cent suffer from malnutri-tion; that at least 5 per cent have, or have had, tuberculosis; that 20 per cent, or 5,000,000, have defective evey-sight; that 5 per cent have defective hearing; that 1 per cent are handicapped by organic heart dis-case; and that another 1 per cent

case; and that another a performance are mentally defective." Some physical incident—this. So far as I know nobody challenges these figures. The question is what is America going to do about it? Merely building school houses and send-ing these children to school by compulsory school laws is not going to build up teh vitality of the citizens to be. That nation which seeks to whet the intellect of its people while it is neglecting the call of the body digging its grave. Graduating folks from our schools as fit sub-jocts for the cemetery is not a very hopeful activity. Moreover we waste about fifty cents on the dollar in seeking to educate these physically defective children. Why not seek to build up the bodies of these children and then get a dollar's worth of education for every dollar we spend? All of which is simply saying that in all educational work that which is of first consideration is flesh and afterwards that which is mind or spirit. There is nothing carnal about such a procedure; even the great Teacher taught that this was the order of things in spiritual develop-Yes, the school physician and the school nurse are the order of the day-and, we might add, the misment sionary school cook whose duties it would be to carry the message of proper feeding into those homes where the children are suffering from malnutrition.



Bank Call Forms To Be Simplified

Washington, D. C., April 21.-A new and simplified form of bank call is being worked out by the Comptroller of the Currency, call Treasury officials said today. The old form on which the national banks were required to make a statutory returns as to conditions, officials explained, was found to be too involved and lengthy, and it is expected that the new form will be more standardized and but half as long.
