GRAHAM USING NATURAL GAS FOR FUEL

AGRICULTURAL CLUB ENJOYS GOOD PROGRAM

The boys of the Young County Agricultural Club had a great day in Graham last Saturday. County Agent Edgar Kemp had sent letters to all the boys to be on hand on September 24. A good crowd was present but not as many as ought to have been here.

The Chamber of Commerce assisted Mr. Kemp in entertaining the boys. Secretary Walker of the Chamber of Commerce entertained them at the National Theatre after which they were furnished with a meal ticket. In the afternoon they went to the school building where Mr. Kemp conducted an examination in order to see who would win the free trip to the Dallas Fair. They were then taken to the football game between Graham and Burk Burnett.

After carefully grading the record books and examination papers turned in by the club boys last Saturday, Mr. Avants and Mr. Kemp announce the following boys as winners: Grade of each boy follows in name:

All of the boys have done excellent work and their grades are very close as will be noted. Mr. Kemp regrets that Young county's quota is not greater so that more of the boys could attend. He hopes that no boy will be discouraged on account of not winning and that each one will try the harder next year.

GRAHAM SCHOOLS NEED ASSISTANCE OF ALL FRIENDS

The Graham public schools have for several years been recognized as the best in this section of the country. It has cost money to put them where they are and it is going to cost money to keep them at the high point of efficiency they have attained. During the stressful times of the past six years the board has had to pay \$22,500.00 out of the available fund for building and equipment. To do this the board has had to borrow about \$18,000.00. Economy has been practiced in every possible way but the 50 cent tax has not been sufficient to meet the necessary expenditures. The board feels that with the increased taxes \$10,000.00 of this indebtedness can be taken care of but the remaining \$8,000.00 must be cared for in some other way.

There are only two possible ways by which this \$8,000.00 can be paid. One is to shorten the school term from year to year until enough can be saved to pay it; the other way is to raise the amount by popular subscription. No one will think of the first method, for in doing so our school would lose its rating and our pupils would not have the benefit of a first class school. Every argument would be against that method of meeting the indebtedness. Superintendents McLendon, Howell and Cogdell have worked too hard to build up the schools to their present high standard for the citizens to permit them to drop to second or third class on account of a little money. It takes years to build a school system but it may be destroyed in a few months.

The second method is to raise the \$8,000.00 by popular subscription which is really the only feasible method at this time as the president of the school board and a few others have already subscribed more than half the amount. The following have subscribed the amounts opposite their names:

This leaves a balance of only \$7,250.00 to be raised and The Leader and Chamber of Commerce believe that the loyal school patrons will raise this in a few hours. The committee will call on you early next week. Be prepared to subscribe as liberally as the names given above and our schools will have their financial troubles settled. The heavy enrollment this fall indicates that something must be done at once. Many of our children are attending only half day sessions due to the crowded condition of the school rooms. Nearly 1100 pupils have been enrolled this session and these are being taught by 22 teachers. This is an average of 50 pupils to the teacher and every fair minded person knows that one teacher can not do justice with 50 pupils.

Help the committee from the Chamber of Commerce remove the indebtedness next week and then the board will be free to do greater things for our excellent schools.

COMPANY TESTS LINES AND BEGINS SERVICE TUESDAY

The Ranger Gas Company has made a record in installing their gas system in Graham. The officials of the company arrived in Graham about the first of August and stated that they hoped to have the system in working order within sixty days. Their tools and equipment arrived about the 10th of August and a large force of workmen began at once upon the big task—a big task it was in this mountainous section. The company brought their big ditchers here but they could not be used to a very great advantage on account of the rocky condition of the ground. Undaunted by difficulties the work went steadily on and within forty-five working days the work was completed and the people are now cooking with gas.

Office Manager, A. T. Barrett, stated to The Leader yesterday that the lines had been tested and the first meter placed at R. E. Lynch's. Mayor E. S. Graham has meter number 2 and the Young County Hardware and Furniture Company number 3. The Hardware and Furniture Company claims the distinction of being the first in Graham to use the gas. The reporter was in their store at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday and learned that they had turned on the gas at 1:20 and was giving a demon-

YOUNG COUNTY GETS GOOD RAIN; LAND IN PLOWING CONDITION

Young county received a good rain last Saturday night. It was the best rain in this section for several months. We have had a few light showers but not enough to put the ground in condition for plowing. The rain Saturday night will enable the farmers to prepare their land for sowing wheat. County Agent Edgar Kemp has been working faithfully to introduce the famous Kanred wheat in this county next year. Farmers all over the county are anxious to give it a test and are preparing for good seasons for fall sowing.

While the rain was enough to enable farmers to break their land, reports from various sections indicate that very little stock water was caught. Many have been driving their stock to water and some have been pumping for large numbers of cattle. The rain fell slowly and the ground was so dry that it was taken up before it reached the tanks.

Road overseers and our people generally should make an effort to improve our roads while the ground is in a good condition. The Leader has from time to time commented on the bad condition of our roads through out the county. We have been too busy to do anything but use the roads and as a result they are very bad. The Leader is hoping that the importance of good roads will be realized by Young county people and that before long an effort will be made to interest our citizens in a bond issue for the betterment of our roads.

STREET COMMISSIONER LEVELING SQUARE

The Street Commissioner is having some much needed work done on the public square. The square and many of the streets in the resident section became very rough during the continued drought.

Since the fine rain Saturday night the square is being leveled and it is to be hoped that the grader will be run over many of the streets in the city. A large number of the streets that have been graveled are very rough. If the grader could be used to pull the gravel back to the middle of the streets, they could be materially helped.

NOTED CARTOONIST, FRANK LOGAN, TO APPEAR HERE SOON

A clever young cartoonist whose work while in the army in France attracted the attention of the French and English newspapers, is to give his popular chalk-talk here on the evening of October 15 at the High School Auditorium.

Mr. Logan was a Lieutenant in the army in France. He had had previous newspaper experience in America, and his sketch work, done in idle moments, created considerable interest. He was suddenly "borrowed" from his superior officer to do feature cartoon work on the LeMans Bulletin. His series of drawings portraying the life of the doughboy in France attracted wide attention. His work carries the requisite "punch" so characteristic of the successful newspaper cartoonist.

A portion of his lecture is devoted to humorous impressions of the doughboy. His pictures are artistically correct; they sparkle with keen humor and irony. He works with lightning rapidity, and he is a master of splendid color effects.

His art is just a little different from any other cartoonist, and his drawings accurately picture the many sides of life gathered from first hand experience.

MORE THAN 20 DERRICKS IN BUNCER FIELD

More than twenty derricks in the Bunger field at the present time show that there has been much activity during the past few days. Oil City is a new town which has sprung up on the Grimshaw lease. Lots are selling every day and several new buildings are being erected. This town is located in the heart of the field at present and affords needed accommodations. A tank company and a supply house have acquired property in the new town and are getting ready for business.

The Simms Oil Company has built a camp on their Lynn lease which will be a supply base for their several operations in this field.

Ross & Tyrrell, who are carrying on extensive operations in the Bunger field, are erecting a camp on their Grimshaw lease where casing and equipment will be stored.

The Stephens County Water Company is lay a 4-inch line to their storage tanks on the Stoffor lease and will soon be prepared to furnish water for everybody in the field.

The Prairie Pipe Line Company is extending their line through the Bunger field and will bid for the oil in the entire section. Owing to the high quality of the Bunger oil a premium will no doubt be paid for it. A test this week shows that this is 41 gravity oil with a large per cent of gasoline. No better oil is found in this section of the country.

Both the Owen and Driver wells are holding up well with a good gas pressure. The Askew is shut down but had been nearly cleaned of the water in the hole that came from the collapsed casing when the well went into the oil sand some time ago.

Ross & Tyrrell-Askew No. 2, drilling around 400 feet.

Ross & Tyrrell are drilling around 1000 feet on the Cheney and DeFreest offset acreage to the Owen No. 1.

Ross & Tyrrell have rig and ready to drill on the Orrell survey of C. W. DeFreest et al.

Ross & Tyrrell are drilling on the west 20 acres of the Grimshaw Gulf lease.

Cheney & Miller are ready to spud in their Grimshaw No. 1.

Sun Company-Auburg No. 1, rig. Hedrick & Spoons have two rigs on their Driver lease and will be drilling soon.

Simms Oil Company have two rigs on the Harkness survey and are ready to spud in their No. 1.

Godley Oil Company-Owen No. 1, derrick.

Rig is up on the Whittenburg No. 1, and the company is waiting for water.

Location has been made on the northeast corner of the Harvey lease, survey 35.

Rig is up on the Reed 20 acres on the Grimshaw lease.

Browning & Hodges-Durham No. 1, drilling around 300 feet.

The Cosden Company, the Gulf Company, the Texas Company and other companies have good acreage in this field and are making preparations for extensive operations at an early date.

The Barnes well is still shut down waiting for water. The continued drought has delayed drilling activities in all the fields in this section of the country.

Applegate & Harlan-Whittenburg No. 1, Taylor survey are drilling at 200 feet.

We have given only a partial list of the operations as exact data could not be secured for some of the wells. Several locations were made during the week and many operators are visiting the field daily.

Mr. J. R. O'Connell and son, Phillip Joseph left Monday for a ten days visit with her parents in Waco.

NAME M. K. GRAHAM ONE OF DIRECTORS OF SOUTHERN R. R.

M. K. Graham, the man whose tenacity of purpose resulted in the running of the Wichita Falls and Southern through Graham, even though the original route would have been more to his personal interest, running through 12 miles of land owned by him, with the establishment of a townsite in the center, was added to the board of directors of the Wichita Falls and Southern at a stockholders meeting here Wednesday. Breck Walker of Breckenridge, who with C. M. Caldwell of that place, has been closely associated with the builders of the line in carrying out the project, was also named as a member of the board.

Issuance of stock and securities was authorized at the stockholders meeting. The road now has no outstanding securities of any kind, nor has any stock been issued, the road having been built with an informal grouping of "shares" representing a many times larger investment than the usual share of stock issued by corporations.

The amount of stock nor the amount of securities issued has not been determined.

A directors meeting followed the stockholders meeting, both meetings being held in the office of Frank Kell, the head of the road.—Wichita Falls Record.

TEXAS CATTLE MEN URGE ENFORCEMENT OF SLAUGHTER LAW

Texas cattle raisers and people generally interested in the cattle industry are asking that the law regulating the slaughtering of cattle be rigidly enforced.

A few of the important laws on matter are herewith quoted:

"If any butcher or any other person engaged in the slaughter of animals shall kill or cause to be killed, any unmarked or unbranded animal for market, shall purchase and kill or cause to be killed any animal without having taken the bill of sale or written transfer from the person selling the same, he shall be fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$300."

"If any person engaged in the slaughter and sale of animals for market, in any county, city, town or village in this state, shall fail to report to the commissioners' court of the county in which he transacts business, at each regular term thereof, the number, color, sex, marks and brands of every animal slaughtered by him since the last term of court, accompanied with a bill of sale or written conveyance to him of every animal slaughtered save such as were raised by himself, which shall be specified, he shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$300."

Another section of the law specifies that every person engaged in this kind of business is required to register his name with the county clerk and is also required to file a bond in a sum not less than \$200 nor more than \$1,000.

"Every person who shall carry on the business of butcher or slaughter of animals and shall fail to keep a true and faithful record in a book kept for the purpose of all cattle purchased and slaughtered by him, together with a description of each animal, including brand, age, color, weight and from whom purchased and the date of purchase, or shall fail to give the hide and ears of such animals inspected by the inspector or some magistrate, within 20 days after such animal is slaughtered, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$20 nor more than \$200."

The Chamber of Commerce is putting in overtime in an effort to do the many things that need to be done at once. Tuesday five men and a truck were put to work on the Bunker road. Since the increased development began in this field a few weeks ago the traffic has been very heavy and as a natural result the roads are in bad condition. FIRE DEPARTMENT SAVES CITY NEARLY \$10,000 ANNUALLY

Mayor E. S. Graham has received a letter from the State Fire Insurance Commission which should be of interest to every loyal citizen of Graham. The good work of our city government, the interest manifested by our live Chamber of Commerce, and the efficient services of our excellent fire department have been recognized by the State Fire Insurance Commission and the rate for Graham materially lowered as the following letter, which every citizen should read, clearly shows:

"Dear Sir:
"I am giving you below a statement showing the amount of savings to the people of your city, due to the 'Good Fire Record Credit' and the fifteen (15) per cent reduction under Amendment No. 111, to the General Basis Schedules, which reduction became effective February 1, 1921. The fifteen per cent reduction, as set forth in Amendment No. 111, applies to the following classes:

- 1st. Dwellings and furniture—owner, frame.
- 2nd. Dwellings and furniture—tenant, frame.
- 3rd. Dwellings and furniture—owner, brick.
- 4th. Dwellings and furniture—Tenant, brick.
- 5th. Barns, stables and outhouses—private.
- 6th. Automobile garages—private.

"The reduction of 15 per cent, referred to above, applies to either or all of the classes, 1 to 6 inclusive, wherever located, whether it be in city, town, village or on the farm or within or without the corporate limits of such city or town. The Good Fire Record Credit is, in a sense a contingent credit and can only be allowed by this Department to those cities and towns that are able to qualify under the rule permitting us to grant it. This credit is based upon the loss ratio of the city or town for the three years, preceding the calendar year during which the statement is filed with the State Fire Insurance Commission. For each five (5) per cent, or fraction thereof that the losses sustained by fires are less than fifty-five (55) per cent of the premiums received a credit of three (3) per cent will be allowed, with a maximum credit of fifteen (15) per cent.

"The total amount of savings over the entire State for the year 1921, to the insuring public, under Amendment No. 111, covering the six classes, above outlined, will amount to approximately, \$1,232,065.98.

"The total savings to the citizens of those cities and towns enjoying a good fire record credit, two hundred and fourteen (214) in number, for the year 1921, will amount to, approximately, \$1,599,113.22, which would mean a total saving on all policies, written or renewed during the year 1921, of approximately, \$2,831,419.20.

"The savings to your city, under the Good Fire Record Credit for the year 1921, amounts to \$6,475.62, while the savings, due to the 15 per cent reduction on the dwelling classes (1 to 6 inclusive) as enumerated in Amendment No. 111, would amount to \$1,942.69, or a total saving under both reductions of approximately, \$8,428.31.

"If the premiums received by the companies are not sufficient to pay the losses, expenses and permit them to earn a reasonable per cent profit for their services, they must accept either one of two alternatives—refuse to write such a class, or increase the rates sufficiently to enable them to pay the losses, expenses, and have a little left for their trouble.

"Proper fire protection, and fire prevention, practically applied by every citizen, without fear or favor are two of the most essential methods, to bring about a reduction in fire insurance rates.

GRAND JURY MAKES REPORT TO COURT; NINETY-SEVEN BILLS

We were sorry that the report of the grand jury did not appear in last week's issue of The Leader. It was crowded out but we are glad to give in full the report this week:

"We have been in session for ten days and have found and returned 94 bills of indictment, of which number 56 are for felonies and 38 are for misdemeanors. We have had before us and have examined 230 witnesses. We have investigated more than one hundred felony charges.

"There has been an unusual and abnormal condition in our county as a result of the discovery of oil and the consequent influx of transients. On account of this situation we recognize that law enforcement has been rendered more difficult than it would otherwise have been. In many instances the witnesses could not be obtained in cases and in many other cases when they were obtained it was difficult to determine the real and true facts with respect to such matters.

"Our judgment is that the laws of the State have not been properly enforced nor have the results been obtained that should be expected, but we are not prepared to place the blame upon any particular source. We find that gambling houses and lawless houses and also slot machines and games of chance have been run more or less openly in several of the town of this county, but in few instances only have we been able to gather sufficient and satisfactory evidence to indict.

"There have been two or three murders committed which we have been unable to return bills of indictment for, and in these cases, after full and painstaking investigation, have not been able to locate the guilty parties.

"We are pleased to note that we are soon to have a good jail and this will eliminate a great deal of the inconvenience and trouble on the part of the sheriff's department in handling persons charged with violations of the law. The Sheriff's department has been seriously handicapped by reason of this condition.

"We think that full co-operation between all officers charged with the duty of enforcing the law and co-operation by the good citizenship of this county will go a great ways towards relieving the situation that we have been confronted with.

"We desire to thank all of the officers who have waited upon this grand jury and especially do we desire to say that our bailiffs have been active and on the job. We desire to thank the County Attorney's department for services rendered this grand jury.

"We especially wish to thank the Court and District Attorney for their co-operation, and to say that the District Attorney has been unusually diligent in his work, without which we would not have been able to obtain the results which have been accomplished.

"Having completed our labors we respectfully ask that we be finally discharged."

After the grand jury made its report it was reconvened and then turned in the following supplementary report:

"We have found and returned three bills of indictment of which two are for felonies and one for a misdemeanor. One of the felonies is against A. S. Slater. In this case we recommend to the court and the district attorney that this case be carried upon the docket of this court for a period of two years, provided the said A. S. Slater maintains good conduct and demeans himself consistent with a good citizen.

"And at the end of said two years, if his conduct has been good, then this case should be dismissed. We take this action because of the physical and financial condition of the accused and particularly on account of his young children, all of whom are girls. His wife died of the dread disease, tuberculosis, when his youngest daughter was but ten months old. His children are now from six to thirteen years of age."

PELLAGRA CAUSES MANY DEATHS YEARLY

Pellagra is a disease—demarcated by the four "d's"—dermatitis (inflammation of the skin), diarrhoea, delirium, and death.

The average layman, no doubt, is quite apt to regard pellagra as a fairly new enemy—one that has conspired with tonsils, teeth, etc., to make his pathway more perilous. In this he is quite wrong, since there are fairly definite references to its existence as early as the 12th Century in Southern Europe, and very recent descriptions of this disease in the 17th Century. From this time on untold effort has been put forth by investigators of the old world to determine the cause of this scourge.

In 1905-07, this disease began to appear in this country, particularly in the Southern States, affecting mostly the rural districts, thereby holding true to its old world traditions.

Since its advent to our country its cause has been sought in an enormous expenditure of energy, by individuals, by endowed commissions, and by the concerted efforts of many States and the U. S. Public Health Service. There has certainly been no lack of material, as it is conservatively estimated that there are in the United States each year over 200,000 cases.

In spite of all these years of intensive investigation, the real cause of pellagra remains yet unknown. The early old world belief in the "spoiled maize" theory has been discarded. The medical world is now divided into two opposing camps—one holding that the disease is due to some deficiency in diet, perhaps some of the vitamins; the other believing that it is an infection by some yet undiscovered germ, the diet malnutrition merely acting to break down the resistive powers of the body. So intense has been this argument that not uncommonly one enthusiast will refer to the other as having pellegraphobia. Notwithstanding the failure to determine the cause of pellagra, all this study and research has not been without its reward. All are agreed that the prevention of this disease can be accomplished to a very definite extent by—

(a) Improvement in rural sanitation.

(b) Provisions of well-balanced diet.

(c) Avoidance of the use of soda in cooking meat and vegetables.

Only recently this subject has aroused renewed interest, being featured in the daily press as a pall hanging over the South, where conditions of famine impend. To get at the truth of this matter, a conference was held this month in Washington by the authorities of the U. S. Public Health Service, health officials from twelve of the Southern States, and representatives from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The consensus of opinion of this meeting is indicated by the following statements: That "there will be an increase of pellagra this year in localities in certain States where the disease has been epidemic;" but that "the data show that the number of cases and deaths during 1921 will still be, less than the annual average during the period of 1914 to 1921;" that there does not exist "condition approaching a famine or plague in the South," and that statements to this effect are "erroneous and misleading;" that "Federal health agencies, especially farm and home demonstration agencies of the State agricultural schools, carry into the rural homes the practical necessity for a better balanced diet, which should always include eggs, milk or milk products, and vegetables;" further that "encouragement should be given to efforts for the establishment of health departments in all counties, or other units of government, which will permit well trained health officers to carry leadership which will insure healthier and more productive lives."—F. C. GREGG, M. D.

Information About Game Laws of Texas

The open season for shooting doves began September 1, and others begin as follows: Ducks, October 16; snipe, October 16; prairie chicken, November 1; buck deer, November 1; wild turkey, December 1; quail, December 1. It is a violation of the law for any of these to be killed before the dates given above.

A local association is offering a reward of twenty dollars (\$20.00) for evidence leading to the conviction of any one shooting quail out of season. J. T. Vaughan, deputy game fish and oyster commissioner, will appreciate any information on the violation of the game law in any manner. He also asks us to give publicity to the law regulating hunting outside of the county of one's residence. Two sections of the law are given below:

Section 42 of the Game Law provides that it shall be unlawful for any citizen of this State to hunt on any side of the county of his residence with a gun without first having procured from the Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner, or one of his deputies or from the County Clerk of the County in which he resides, a license to hunt, and for which he shall pay to the officer from whom he secures such license the sum of Two (\$2.00) Dollars.

Section 43 of the Game Laws provides that it shall be unlawful for any non-resident of this State, or Alien, to hunt in this State without first having secured from the Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner, or one of his deputies, or county clerk, a license to hunt for which he shall pay the sum of Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars.

The penalty for violating the laws of either section is a fine of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars, nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars. Mr. Vaughan asks the co-operation of farmers throughout the county in protecting the game from hunters. It is a violation of the law for hunters from other counties to come here and hunt without a license. All violations should be reported to him immediately. He will issue license to any one making application to him at The Shamrock Motor Company on the south side of the square, Graham, Texas.
