District Court adjourned Ennis Warehouse Makes Rate of 50c a Bale to March 1.

The Ennis Cotton Warehouse company, directors held a meeting and decided to make a flat rate of 50c per bale for storage till March 1, the customer to carry or provide for his own insurance. The warehouse handled lots of cotton last year and by protecting it from damage for a better price made it bring \$50,000 additional to the people of that community. The warehouse paid 15 per cent dividend last season and had already announced a considerable reduction in its charges for this season, but the farmers were not patronizing the warehouse this season, but were storing it in open yards where it is liable to damage. Seeing the condition of affairs President E.-M. Thomas called the directors together and for the public good and to induce the farmers to keep from glutting the market decided to make this sweeping reduction, which means nearly six months, storage now for 50c a bale.
