

Both houses of the State Legislature, last week, by a decisive vote, defeated the proposed 2 per cent sales tax, for payment of pensions. The enthusiastics opposed to the measure in the House, staged a kind of celebration, in the manner of a funeral, and with sarcastic and humorous remarks, buried the sales tax plan at least for this term, when another member who had supported it, came foward with the suggestion that they place in inscription on the tomb, "Here lies the hopes of the old folks of Texas". It was a peculiar situation, after a large majority of the people v ted, by a constitutional amendment, to pay a pension, and last election a vast majority of the legislators, were elected on a promise to pay it, and while we think Gov. O'Daniel's election by such a big majority, was a esult of several other ideals, and causes, mostly musical, it is held out that it was because of his promises to pay full pension to all eligibles, and yet the Legislative regular term is three-fouths expired and nothing done about it. However it seems their delay is result of such divergence in opinione over the method and means of raising the money. Many of them are still imbued with the idea: "Pappy, pass the tax onto the other fellow."

CHEESE OUTPUT IN TEXAS IS OFF FROM LAST YEAR

Production of cheese in Texas dropped 32 per cent in comparison with February of last year, reports to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research for last month indicate.

Producttion lacked only 1.4 per cent of equalling January's output, however.

Other dairy products likewise slumped, but not as drastically. Creamery butter production fell 25.9 per cent from last February but increased 9 per cent over January, 1939, while ice cream was down 12.6 per cent from February 1938, but 12.2 per cent above January.

EDWARD J. ENGLE NEW HEAD OF SANTA FE SYSTEM

From stenographer to railroad president in forty years was the storybook climb today completed by Edward J. Engle, newly-named head of the Atchenson Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Announcement of Mr. Engle's appointment to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Samuel T. Bledsoe, President and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the 13,000 mile Santa Fe System since 1933, was made following Tuesday's meeting of the Company's Board of Directors.

He went to work for the Santa Fe in 1899 as a stenographer in the office of E. P. Riley, President of the Santa Fe from 1895 to

His next move was in May, 1903 from the secretary's desk to the position of Chief Clerk in the Presidents office. In recognition of services well done, Mr. Engle was made Assistant to the President in September, 1910, and appointed vice-president in July 1918.
