Hare Awarded the Silver Rifle Medal

With the 37th Army Division on Bougainville: — For exemplary conduct in combat, Pfc. Van A. Hare of Brownfield, Texas, has been presented with the Army's newest award for infantrymen, the Combat Infantryman Badge. Awarded for exemplary conduct in combat or for combat action in a major operation, the new medal is a silver rifle on a blue field with a silver border, imposed on an elliptical silver wreath. Pfc. Hare is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hare of this city. Since starting his tour of overseas service on May 26, 1942, he has been stationed on New Zealand, Fiji, Guadalcanal and Empress Augusta Bay, and a veteran of the New Georgia campaign.

WADE COLEMAN MURDER CASE CARDED NEXT WEEK

The case of the State against Wade Coleman, colored, charged with the slaying of another colored man here last winter, and which was continued from a former term, was set for next Wednesday, April 12th. The special venire of 50 men summoned at that time, have been ordered to report for this trial.

Several minor burglaries of local stores were reported as taking place Sunday night. Only small change was taken. Several teen age boys are under suspicion and arrests are to follow.

An Ordinance

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Brownfield, Texas, whereas the City and County Health Officer has advised that a dog has been found in Brownfield with rabies, and that other dogs in all probability have been bitten by this dog; Therefore, be it resolved by the City Council that the owners of all dogs within the corporate limits of the City of Brownfield, Texas, be and are hereby instructed to muzzle or pen such dog or dogs for a period of 90 days from this date, and that on and after Monday, April 10th, 1944, the City Marshal of the City of Brownfield is instructed and directed to kill all dogs found running at large in the corporate limits of Brownfield, Texas. This is done as an emergency measure to protect the citizens of Brownfield.

Tire Theft Rig Thought Broken

After a lively chase last week over several counties and two states, Sheriff Hoffack of Levelland, aided by local officers, arrested two men near Sundown, which led to the arrest of two more at Roswell. As a result of the confession of one of them, several Terry county youths, and two or three men became involved. Quite a few truck and other tires have been recovered in this county, and officers are investigating clues of disposition of other tires in other counties. Officers expect to recover most of the stolen property. They were establishing a black market. Several are in jail at Levelland and two at Roswell.

Big Demo Rally at Lubbock Tomorrow

Lubbock, Texas — Democratic leaders from all of west Texas and eastern New Mexico are expected to gather here on Saturday, April 8, for a gigantic area-wide party rally, at which US Senator Harry S. Truman of Missouri is to be the principal speaker. The rally will be staged in the Lubbock Senior High auditorium that night at 8:30, and a packed house is predicted for the appearance of the head of the famous Truman investigating committee of the upper house of congress. It is likely that other national party leaders will be here for the rally as Ed Pauley of Los Angeles, treasurer of the Democratic National Committee and others have been invited. Truman's appearance at the rally here is the result of an invitation extended to him by Arch Underwood of Lubbock, at a recent Jackson Day dinner rally of state Democratic leaders in Dallas, Texas.

Special invitations are to be extended to members of the south Plains, west Texas and eastern New Mexico press to come here and hear Senator Truman, whose committee has saved the Govt. millions of dollars through its probe of government defense contracts and projects. Democratic county chairmen and members of the executive committees of each county from as far south as Big Spring to Amarillo on the north are to be urged to come here for the rally.

Local Postal Receipts Show An Increase

Postmaster L. A. Greenfield, stated this week that the postal receipts for the three months period ending March 31, were \$10,101.12, as compared with receipts of \$7,695.49 for the same period of 1943. This represents a gain of 31 percent.

An increasing trend of this type if continued will place the office in First Class, possibly by July, 1945.

Returns for the County Trustees was incomplete, and are to be canvassed by the Commissioners Court.

Auto Registrations Show 31 Percent Gain

A ten percent increase over last year in automobile and truck registrations, was revealed this week by J. V. Burnett, Tax-Collector. The largest increase was in passenger cars, from 1975 in 1943, to 2169 in 1944. Commercial and pickup trucks from 276 to 321. The farm tags showed a decrease from 305 in 1943 to 284 in 1944. It was noted that many with farm tags last year paid for full commercial rating this year. The total for all is 2556 in 1943, and 2774 in 1944.

Mr. Burnett stated, also that his records, corroborated by the Rating Board, shows an increase of 10 percent in population.

Several Undergoing Treatment For Mad Dog Bites

A dog with rabies, the diagnosis which was confirmed by the State Laboratory, was found in Brownfield and killed the last week of March.

This dog had been running at large and had attacked other dogs and cats. These contacts may begin to show evidence of hydrophobia anywhere from two weeks to three months after contact with the rabid dog.

As the Bureau of Animal Industry of the US department of agriculture will not assert that vaccine treatment of dogs is a specific preventive, we suggest that owners of dogs who may have had contacts, get in touch with the City Marshal, who will call, collect the dog or animals, and dispose of them.

Six children are now undergoing treatment for bites or contact with this rabid dog. It is also recommended that all dogs be given an inoculation against rabies for their own protection.

James Calvin (Uncle Jimmie) Green was born July 10, 1870 in Gonzales county, Texas. He departed this life April 2, 1944 in Brownfield, Texas. At the age of 16, he moved with his parents to Georgetown. In November 1892, he was married to Ella Green Josephine Young. In 1904, he and wife and five children came to Brownfield, Terry county, as one of the original pioneer families. Mr. Green, a retired farmer, has held various offices in the community; county clerk four years and county tax assessor for four years. He was circulation agent for the Star-Telegram here for some four years, until his eyes failed him. He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Ivy Savage, 2203 28th St., Lubbock and Mrs. J. Sterling J. Parrish Announces For the State Senate

I am a candidate for the office of State Senator from the 30th Senatorial District of Texas. Big Spring on the south, Plainview on the north, Paducah, Guthrie and Aspermont on the east, and stretching to the New Mexico line on the west, give a general



outline and something of the magnitude of the District. In size and population, it is almost the same as the 19th Congressional District.

On the day of election this coming July I will be 38 years of age. This coincident will afford every voter in the District an opportunity, individually, to present me a most welcome present—their vote. My Uncle Sam has said that I am too big for the Armed Forces, and I have therefore been classified as 4-F. If I am too big to serve my Country in a uniform, then surely I am big enough to serve this District in the Senate of Texas.

Having never run for public office before, I cannot be classified as a professional politician.

I was born in Crosby county and lived there until 1923, at which time my father, Pink L. Parrish, moved the family to Lubbock. I am a former student of Texas Technological College.

Often I am asked why I am running for the Texas Senate. My answer is as follows: I cannot get into the Armed Services of my Country. In this time of war I believe every man should give his best somewhere. I trust, also, I will be forgiven for having the ambition to walk in the footsteps of my Daddy, who served this District in the same position I now seek.

Some of the problems to which Sterling J. Parrish will give his attention, if elected, are as follows: 1. Redistricting of this State for legislative purpose. 2. Support of the public institutions of this District, including Texas Technological College and the hospital for the insane at Big Spring. 3. A fair distribution of the Rural Aid money to the rural schools of West Texas. 4. A sufficient State appropriation of money for School Teacher's salaries to enable this most underpaid profession to take its proper and respected place in our State.

5. Adequate Social Security for the aged, the blind and the dependent children. 6. Advancement and protection of the farming interests of this section of Texas, particularly the adjustment of freight rates on producer's goods. 7. Fight for West Texas' fair share of the production of oil. 8. A lessening of bureaucracy in our State Government.

At a later date I shall publish a detailed platform. Subject to limitations imposed on campaigning by reason of a shortage of gasoline and tires, I shall attempt to see the voters of this District and solicit their vote between now and the July primary. Because of the shortage of gasoline and tires, making it impossible for me to campaign as otherwise I might do, I shall appreciate every effort on the part of my friends throughout the District in my behalf.

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STIGMA TO BE PUT ON DRAFT DODGERS

Washington March 29 — Legislation was passed by the House today to make those who fled the United States to escape military service, "men without a country."

The bill went to the Senate without dissent, expatriates such "evaders" and Chairman Sabath (D-Ill) of the rules committee said there are many of them.

The House Immigration committee reported that in the vicinity of El Paso, Texas, more than 800 "draft delinquents" crossed the border into Mexico to avoid induction.

Those and others who have done the same thing would be denied re-entry into the United States forever.

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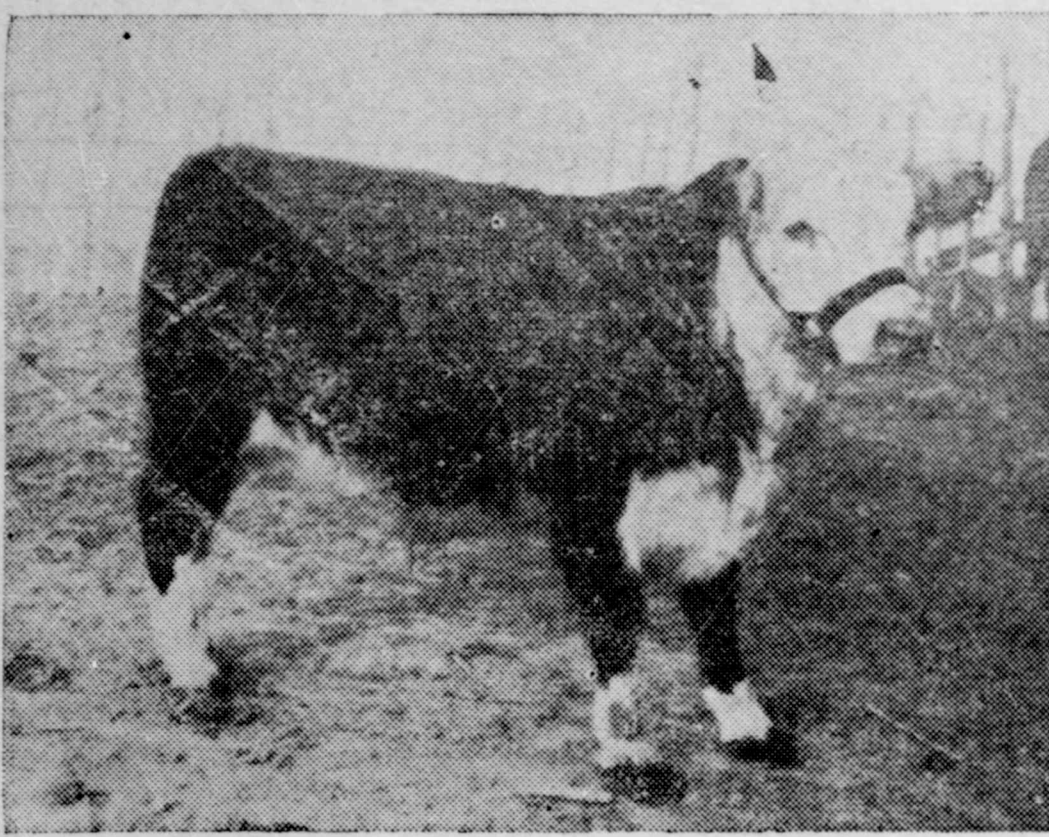

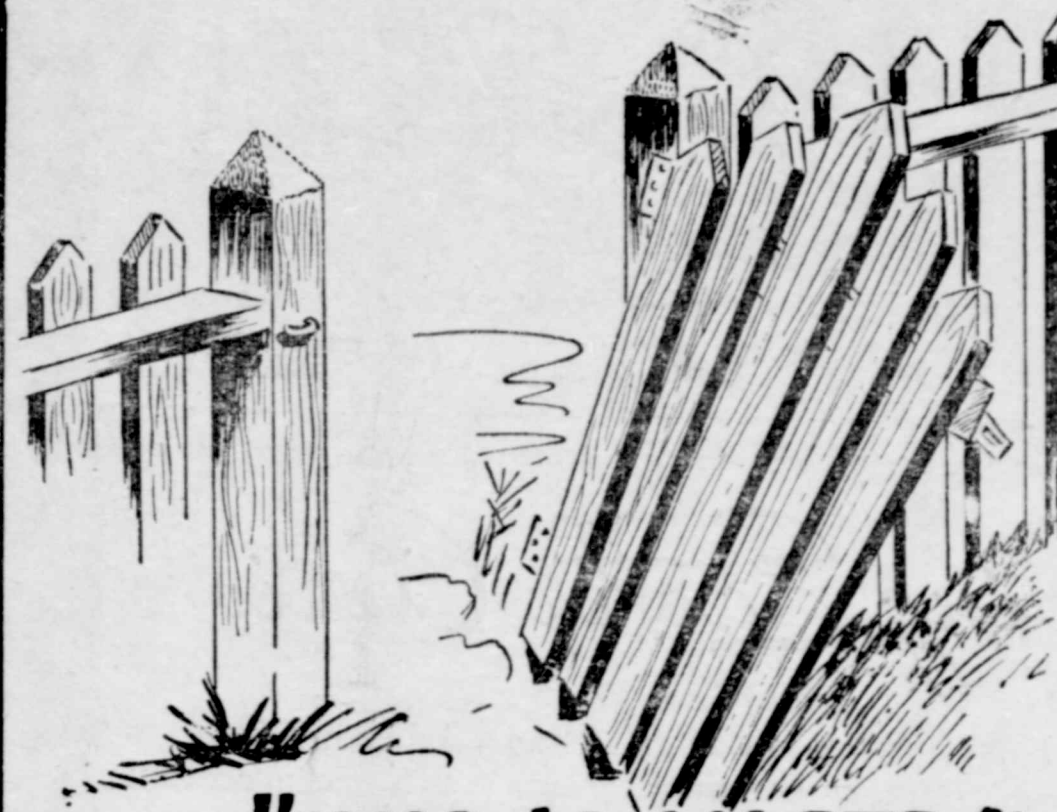

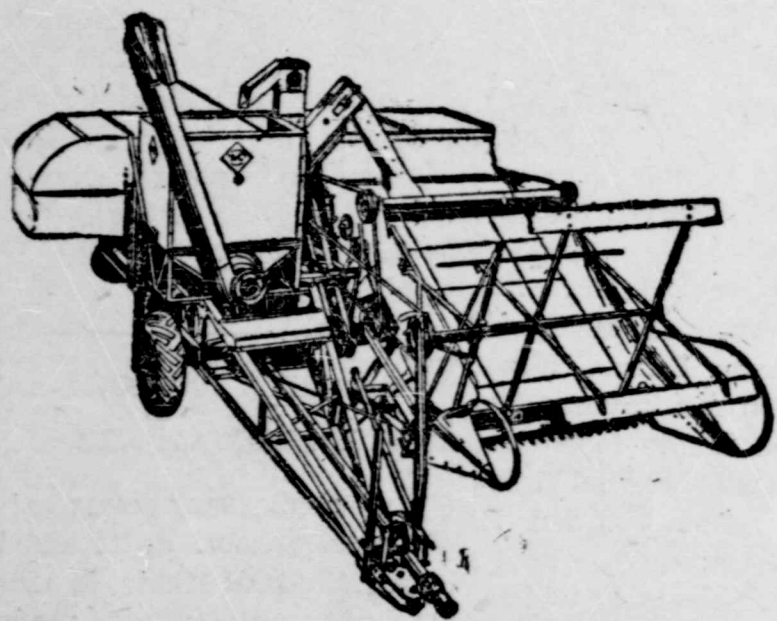

Up at Washington, it seems the administration joined by a hand-picked supreme court, are still trying to tell southern people how to hold an election, who can participate in them, and that without regard to qualification. The latest is that negroes can vote in Democratic primaries in Texas, which has always been the white man's way of nomination. The State Democratic Committee, or at least some of them, have come out for a negro primary, if they wish one. This will not suit the ballheads at Washington, who are set on social equality, which neither the true negro of the south or the white man desires. Let us remember that the white people of the south had their way soon after the Civil War, when there was a Yankee soldier on every stump, and a carpetbagger with his hand in every treasury. The federal government has no more right to try to control primary nominations in the south, or anywhere else, than we have to tell a Harlem negro how to vote.
