THE GRAVE OF JOHN BROWN.

A correspondent of a New York paper thus describes the grave of John Brown, which is situated in front of the house he used to occupy in the town of North Elba, New York, among the Adirondack

mountaine:

"The lot in which John Brown is builed lies east of the house, and corners toward it, and separated from it by a space of only two or three rods. The fence on each side is three rods in length, five boards high rough and unpainted. In the middle of the lot there is a rock of granite occupying a space upon the ground nearly square, and afmost perpendicular upon all sides. The north side is ten feet high—the opposite four, and the circumference five rods. Across the top, from the west to the east (standing on the south side), you will read :

JOHN BROWN, entalq 6.13 "1850."

Each letter and figure is one foot high and nearly one wide, and cut one inch-into the rock. Mr. Alexis Hinckley, the present owner and occupant of the house —a gentlemanly and well-informed young man—said to nie: "This work was done by a stone-cutter, J. A. Daniels. He was sent here for that purpose by Wendell Phillips and Francis Lee. It took him three days and a half to ac-complish it." John Brown is buried with his feet to this rock, with his head to the west in a line with the two oppo site corners of the lot and the The head-stone is, of course, grabite, three feet and two jushes thick. It was procused and lettered a long time ago in Connecticut, for the grave of Captain John Brown; but, as it did not suit his children, it was never erected there, but remained till his son, who lies there, brought it to Westport, and there left it. When Mes. Brown was with her husband in Virginia prison, as I understand, he expressed a wish to be buried near his house in North Elba, and have this stene placed at his head. Although other inscriptions are upon it, still, only one body lies here.

Here and thus—as I have described -lies the body of one who, by a single daring deed, shook the world as with the uddenness of a thunder-bolt. And bere my thoughts naturally ran upon the great events that this one deed hastened, modified or produced. I have never been a follower of John Brown, but, standing by his grave and looking off and around, I can traly say how wonderful! In this high region is the ruck that I have described. To appear ance, for several miles each way from this rock, the earth is comparatively level, though undulating and beautifully diversified by lakes, streams and groves All around beyond this distance the earth rises into hundreds of mountains and hills, rearing their summits into the heavens and forming an eptire circle.

We will venture the assertion that there is not a community in the United States, with an equal population, where there is less enterprise than in this; there is not a community where there is so much real capital laying idle as in this. It may be contended that people who have money have a right to do just as they please with it. In one sense this may be so, but in another it is not so. We believe wealth which good fortune or chance has brought him. Wealth made in and from a community is still the property of that community-it has simply changed from the hands of the many to the hands of the few. And the few leave no right to let it remain idle. If it remains idle the community suffers, as the only benefits arising from the centralization of capital is that it can be used more directly in the accomplishment of great works, which benefit all in a community. There is a silent but well enforced law that places a stamp upon every dollar that goes into the coffers of the rich, that it must come out again to help in the general advancement of society and building up the world; either it comes forth for great undertakings or is scattered again by the hand of the profligate and finds an active channel. That manufacturers and producers of agricultural tools and implements, gasten seeds, trait and ornamental trees, satores and hollow ware, brooms, wooden ware, charcoal, and guapowder, delivering and selling or wholesale any of said articles, by them nelves or their authorized agents, at places other than the manufacture, shall not therefor be required to pay aspecial tax: Provided other than the manufacture, shall not therefor be required to pay aspecial tax: Provided forther. That persons who solt shell or other fish or both, traveling from place to place, and not from any shop or stand, shall be required to pay five dollars only; and no special tax shall be imposed for selling shell or other lish from hand-carts or wheelbarrows.

Thirty-three. Apothecaries shall pay ten dollars. Every person who keeps a shop or building where medicines are compounded or prepared according to prescriptions of physicians, or where medicines are sold, shall be

prepared according to prescriptions of physicians, orwhere medicines are sold, shall be regarded as an apothecary. But who leave prid the special tax therefor, shall not be required to pay a fax as an apothecary; nor shall apothecaries who have paid the special tax be required to pay fax as are tail dealers in liquor, in consequence of selling alcohol, or of selling or of dispensing, upon physicians prescription, the wines and spirits officinal in the United States and other national pharmacopoetas, in quantities not exceeding half a pint of either at any one time, nor exceeding in aggregate cost value the sum of three hundred dollars per assum.
