THE DIVINE RIGHT OF KINGS TO MURDER.

The righteous execution of the law of Mexico against a foreign invader who had desolated her lands and oppressed her people called forth an injmense amount of what Thad leas Stevens sententionsly denominates "putrid humanity." The dictionary was ransacked to find epithets sufficiently forcible to char-acterize the conduct of President Juarez. He was called a butcher, a murderer, an assassin, a second Robespierre, a savage. We did not observe that he was at any time compared to any of the monarchs of Europe whose thrones were baptised in blood—Francis Joseph of Austria, for instance. Off of the mimic stage, which occasionally brings to the public view reference to kingly murders appear to have fallen into disuse. Even the hump-backed monster's strongest point is the exercise of his kingly prerogative to kill. Nothing takes better in the play than

Off with his head; so much for Buckingham! The sentiment of humanity and the expressions of horror seem to be very much modified by two facts, viz: who kills one time ago, when a certain William Walker was outlawed by proclamation for filibuatering in Nicaragus and abot, the verdict of the world was that it served him right. He was a mere citizen of a republic. Lopez was garroted, yet the whole civilized world did not go into mourning. These foiled freebooters were not scions of royal houses, who had in-herited the right to rob and murder and overthrow Governments. So the Chris-tian kings of Europe and the moral Re-public of the United States applauded the death score just as they would that

of bloody Richard on the stage.

Why was the last tragedy of this description not "greeted with similar applause? Simply because the executioner was a plain republican and the man executed was a royal prince Maximilian, the filibusterer, the murderer, the plun-derer of Mexico, the tyrant who issued the infamous decree of October, 1865, which condemned to death within twenty-four hours every patriot caught by his foreign metcenaries, had inherited the divine right of kings to murder. Hence all the advocates of monarchy up-held his afrecities and denounced his execution. The press in the old world is permitted to exist by the complaisance of the throne. It therefore exalts the centre of power thrift may follow fawning. The king determines to kill; "All right" says a subservient press. The says the same, "just as his most sacred majesty pleases." When the Emperor of Austria slaughtered in cold blood the betrayed Hungarian leaders, who surrendered as prisoners of war, the same crowned heads and supporters thereof that have found no fitting terms to ex-press their horror of his brother's death,

It was made a wholesale massacre, so as to glut the vengeance of the imperial monster. The names of the Hungarian generals who were lung in Arad on the 6th of who were hung in Arad on the 6th of October, 1846, were: Damianics, Lazar, Velsey, Kuzich, Poetenberg, Lahner, Alexander, Nagy, Anijch, Leiningen, (cousin of the Queen of England.) On the same day swere shot, in the same place, Generals Kiss, Torok, Schweidell, Dessefy. On the same day there were hung in Pesth, Barons Perenyi, Csanyi, hung in Pesth, Barons Perenyi, Csanyi, Sacsvay. There was one other geutle-man, not a royal prince, it is true, but a gendeman and a patriot, who was sen-tenced to be hung in Pesth on the same day. This was the Hungarian prime minister, Count L. Bathyani. Having been wounded, he was too weak from loss of blood to ascend the scaffold, so

the imperial executioner compromised with his conscience by having him shot!

This is the Austrian fashion. It is not to be wondered at that Maximilian should have followed it by shooting the Republicans in Mexico as soon as cap-tured; but there are numerous axioms in all countries which teach men to beware of resorting to such measures, lest the spirit of justice should overtake them.— Washington Chroniele.

A tax title is considered worthless, and property sold for taxes not considered as prejudicial to the original owner's interest. Two methods of curing the present inefficient tax law suggests them selves to us. 1st. Make a sheriff's deed perfectly good; make the sale of property for taxes as final and complete as it would be under an In order that no hardship should occur, lists of property in arrears for taxes should be published, and the notice of the sale advertised in at least one paper in the county for a proper period before the sale. 2d. Another method would be to place a certain fixed valuation upon wild or unimproved lands, and not leave this to the random judgment of assessors, and thereby leaving a wide door for dishonesty. Have the wild and unimproved lands of the state classified off; lands lying on the frontier, lands lying adjacent the frontier, and lands lying in settled and valuable farming districts; place a just, fixed valuation upon each a little more particular, exempting lands in corporate limits of towns. etc.; but a general, plain law which would feave nothing to either the discretion or honesty of the owner or sessor. This kind of a law would no doubt work some inequalities, but its general results would be greatly to the benefit of the state. It would make the income of the state much larger and more certain. Such an pactment might be a part of the first law we suggested, or it might be a separate act. The state would be certain of its income.

The revenue of wild lands in the class on or in the frontier, might be devoted to educational purposes. To incourage immigration and settle ment of our wild lands, all new farms opened for the caltivation of the seil might be exempted from taxation for a period of years.

That our tax law requires remodels ing no one can doubt. Our present mode is unequal and unjust. It makes the man of moderate means and the working man support the state, and gives a chance to the wealthy to hold vast estates to the detriment of the general good. We want a law which will do equal justice to all. This law should be among the first labors of our convention or legislature.

Addional Articles to the General Convention of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation between the United States and Denmark, of April 26, 1826. Concluded at Washington, July II, 1861; Ratifications exchan-ged, September 18, 1861. Proclaimed by the President of the United States, September 20, 1861.

WHEREAS additional articles to the General WHEREAS additional articles to the General Convention of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation between the United States and Denmark, of the 26th of April, 1862, were concluded and signed by the respective Planipotentiaries of the parties, at Washington, on the eleventh day of July last, which additional articles, being in the English and French languages, are word for word as follows:

lews: -To the General Convention of Friendship, Commerce and Navigation, concluded at-

Commerce and Navigation, concluded at Washington on the twenty sixth day of April, 1826, between the United States of America and His Majesty the King of Denmark. The United States of America and His Majes'y the King of Denmark, wishing to favor their mutual commerce by affording, in their ports avery necessary assignance to their ports every necessary assistance to their respective vessels, the undersigned Plenipotentiaries, being duly empowered for that purpose, have agreed upon the following additional articles to the General Convention of Friendship, Commerce and Navigation, concluded at Washington on the twenty-sixth day of April, 1826, between the contracting

parties.

ART. 7. The respective Consuls-General, Consuls Vice Consuls and Commercial Agents shall have the right as such to sit as judges and arbitrators in such differences as may arise, either at sea or in port, between the captain, officers and crew of the vessels belonging to the nation whose intereste are committed to their charge, particularly in committed to their charge, particularly in reference to the adjustment of wages and the execution of contracts, without the interference of the local authorities, unless the conduct of the crew and the officers, or of the captains, should disfarb the order or tranquillity of the country.

It is however understood that this species

ART. II.
