GENERAL HANCOCK'S AT-TENTION IS CALLE

The Herald of Toesday develor three columns to the Board of Registration unds like the last despairing wail disappointed traitors. A series of charges are made against the Board, all of which are maliciously false. In this article it is attempted to convey the idea that the Board did not give an opportunity to the people to register. Let us look at the

The Registration Board opened in the Court House in this city on the 1st of July, 1867, and continued until the 17th of the same month. The sittings of the Board were advertised in the newspapers, and by handbille in three different languages posted throughout the city. The Board then moved to Fisk's ranche and sent messengers to all points for miles around, and continued in session until the 23th of July. Then moved to Desmuke's or Garra's, on the Medina, remaining there until the 26th, when, hearing that there were several voters at San Laben's they returned to San Antonio by that ranch, remaining there one day and a helf, sending messengers through the neighborhood. On the 31st of July the Board opened at Auc's, Leon Springs, and continued until the 3d of August. They then made their report, expressing the opinion that there were several handred voters in the county not registered, and that another session of the Board would be necessary to the full enrollment of the legal voters. Under this representation of the Board, the General commanding this District or dered the Board to reopen on the 6th of August and coptinue five days.

Every opportunity to register wa given, and there can be no doubt but every man in the county was aware of the sittings of the Board of Registration, and that all who valued the right of voting, applied.

Again the registration has been opened, and the total result shows over 1603 persons registered, and 148 rejected, making 1751 applicants, Of the 148 rejected persons, one-fourth are Union men. Had every man been registered and none refused, the 1751 would be the result.

Now, as to some of the charges of the Herald, which are intended to reach the ear and eye of General Houcock. Must of these charges are trivial, and malicious and all felse, The Herald says that 1663 voters have been disfranchised by the Board of Registers. This wilful lie should of itself condemn the whole three columns of charges, since only 1751 Persons applied, and over 1600
