HIS BODY BROUGHT TO THIS CITY.

This man who has probably caused nore excitement and committed more crimes than any man of mod-ern times, has at last fallen and the country breathes free once more, The circumstances of his death

About four weeks since, he went to the house of his brother-in-law, Mr. Thomas Orr, in La Fayette county, Arkansas, and breaking down the door, took Mr. Orr and their father-in-law, Mr. Wen. Foster tied their hands behind them and kept them during the night. Next morning he hung Mr. Orr until he supposed he was dead, when he cut him down to get the rope to hang another man. This man was finally released by some of Haker's men.—Mr. Orr recovered after Buker and his party left. Mr. Foster they released about 12 o'clock that day. On the 6th of January Baker and a man named Kirby came into the set-

man named Kirby came into the settlement again, and Mr. Orr, with few friends, determined to kill the or sperifice their lives in the at tempt. They rushed on him and succeeded in killing him about 11-o'clock A. M. The man Kirby was also killed. Their bodies reached this city yesterday evening about 6 o'clock, and large numbers of persons are congregated around the tent where the boties lie, Baker's corpse has been fully identified by many who have known him. Thus ends the career of a man who has kept a whole kept a whole country in terror for months, and Mr. Orr deserves and will receive the thanks of mankind for his action in ridding the State of a man who had declared himself the enemy of his race. The above facts we get from Mr. Orr in person.
