BIG CROWD IN BAIRD SATURDAY TO HEAR ELECTION RETURNS

The Primary Election in Baird passed quietly, but never the less there was keen interest shown in voting as was proven by the number of votes cast.

There was a large crowd in town all Saturday afternoon and considerable interest was taken in the awarding of the prizes offered by the merchants of Baird. The names of those being awarded the prizes was not available this week and the only one The Star knows about was T. S. Gains was awarded the years subscription to The Star for the nicest variety of vegetables and fruits and he certainly had a nice variety of vegetables and fruits in the display and shows what can be grown in the gardens and orchards of Callahan county under favorable conditions—and work. Mr. Gains has a nice little farm and he knows how to work it and always has a good crop of fruit and vegetables.

Mr. Gains has long been a subscriber to The Star, so he had us send the paper to his son-in-law, Lloyd Duncan, Rt. 1, Baird.

Later in the afternoon the crowd began to increase and by the time the election returns began to come in hundreds were standing in the central block on Market Street to hear the results.

The bulletin board was placed in front of the American hotel and as the returns came in the result was posted on the board and Frank Hammons at the microphone announced the results and the crowd stayed until all returns from the county were posted.

Sheriff R. L. Edwards is happy over the vote he received—he led the ticket.

Little Girl Seriously Injured In Car Wreck

Earnestine Simco, 11 year old daughter of Mrs. J. E. Simo, of McCamey was seriously hurt in a car wreck on the Bankhead Highway near the Beck farm yesterday about noon when the car in which the little girl, her mother and Mrs. C. E. Pruett and little five year old daughter were traveling east plunged off a curvet down a steep embankment and landed outside the right-of-way a distance of some thirty feet and turned over demolishing the car, a new Ford.

The injured were brought to the Griggs hospital where their injuries were dressed. Little Ernestine Simco is the most seriously injured. She sustained several lacerations of the left leg and other parts of the body—requiring more than one hundred stitches to close the wounds on her body and she also is suffering from concussion of the brain.

Mrs. Simco is also suffering from severe lacerations and bruised. Mrs. Pruitt and little daughter were not seriously hurt.

The vote cast in the Democratic Primary Saturday is given at 906,147 in the final count made last night by the Texas Election Bureau. Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson's lead over Gov. Ross S. Sterling, is close to 100,000 votes.

The vote of the three high contenders for the governorship was:

Ferguson, 377,609.
Sterling, 278,583.
Hunter, 204,803.
Scattering, 45,152.

The count showed a vote favoring resubmission of the Eighteenth Amendment of more than two to one. There were no changes in position of candidates for State offices and Congressmen at Large in the count.

In the race for District Judge 42nd Judicial District, Judge M. S. Long, present judge, received 8,262 votes and his opponent Henry L. Debusk, received 2,701. Judge Long having a majority of 5, 261. This district is composed of three counties, Callahan, Taylor and Shackelford.

In the Seventeenth Congressional race composed of 19 counties, Hon. Thomas L. Blanton, present incumbent had a lead over his opponent Joe H. Jones, of Eastland county with 28,654 votes against 25,922 for Jones.

We failed to get the vote in the 24th Senatorial District. Wilbourne C. Collie, of Eastland county; Oliver Cunningham, present incumbent and Andrew H. Hously, of Shackelford county were the contenders in this race with Collie and Cunningham being in the run-off.

There will be a run-off in the 107th Floterial District composed of Callahan and Eastland counties, the run-off being between B. L. Russell, Jr., of Baird and Cecil A. Lotief, of Cross Plains. Others in this race were: J. S. Yeager, Putnam; Clive Calloway, Cross Plains and T. S. Ross, of Eastland county. The vote by counties is as follows:

CALLAHAN:—Russell, 1,040; Lotief, 586; Yeager, 530; Callaway, 514; Ross 91.

EASTLAND:—Lotief, 1,869; Yeager, 1,020; Callaway, 986; Ross, 969; Russell, 968.

Total vote being:—Lotief, 2,455; Russell, 2,008; Yeager, 1,550; Callaway, 1,500; Ross, 1060.

In the county we will have four run-offs. The races being between Wm. J. Evans and W. W. Everett for tax collector; Vernon King and Eddie Priest, for tax assessor; C. R. Bray and L. J. Cook, for commissioner Precinct No. 3 and George Clifton and B. H. Freeland for commissioner Precinct No. 4.

The official count of the vote cast in the county will be made by the Democratic Executive Committee Saturday and the tabulated vote will be published next week in The Star.

Sharpen Your Pencils, Please—Figure What Telephones Are Worth to John J. Subscriber

If an acquaintance says that by doing without his telephone he can "save" anywhere from \$1.50 to six or seven dollars a month, are you inclined to agree with him? Do you sometimes feel that a telephone, particularly a resident telephone, is not an essential of life?

If you do, it is likely you are one of us—one of many of us—who have been permitting friends to "give up" telephone service under this mistaken idea of economy.

This is simply a case where the telephone has come to resemble a lead pencil—one has always been available and it doesn't cost much. Consequently, no one can realize that he will be crippled without it.

We will not discuss here the telephone's value in emergencies. We all realize that value exists.

Not An Axe
Never confuse the telephone with the shiny axe in the glass case, labeled, "for emergency use only." By the same token, do not confuse it with the pearl earring in the jeweler's glass case which might be labeled, "for luxurious use only." The telephone is not a luxury; it is a convenience used in office and home. It is not a costly convenience, either.

For if telephones were costly, if there were some cheaper way of doing the same thing that you can do with a telephone, people would use the cheaper way. Telephones would then be a comparative rarity; you might even find them in jewelry shops, exhibited alongside ear-rings.

But the telephone is not rare. It is an active factor of modern life. It is said to supply the "nervous system" of the body of society. Isn't it a little sad, then, for anyone to let himself think, or to let telephone customers think, even for a moment, that it might be an economy to "give up a telephone"? If, by all known logic, there is no cheaper substitute to do its work, isn't it wrong to let a friend cancel his service to save money?

Dollars and Cents Argument
Let's talk in terms of dollars and cents. Suppose you give up your telephone. Your telephone bill no longer comes in—you don't have to pay out two, three or four dollars a month to the telephone company. Are you saving two, three or four dollars each month? No.

Why are you not saving? Because, if you formerly used that relinquished telephone for any call that in any way related to business, you must now pay someone to run business errands for you. How many errands at how much per errand would soon exceed the cost of your telephone bill?

Of course, you may run the errands yourself, but how long before the cost of that would equal or exceed your economy in telephone service?

There is another loss to figure here. Your time may be worth little, but on every occasion when you walk or drive a mile, while your competitor completes a like errand in a few minutes by telephone—on every such occasion you lose money. Your competitors in jobs, or hunting for jobs, in business or soliciting business, are moving faster than you. Which means that in the long run they make and you lose.

Social Calls Have a Price
Return, please, to that telephone you supposedly relinquished. When you decided to give it up, you undoubtedly considered the sacrifice you were making of calls to the grocer, the druggist, of calls on various appointments, so we'll put those

aside. However, your telephone had another value. You used it socially—how's that? You say to lay off—that social calls have no money value? The dickens they haven't!

Suppose you just want to ring up Mary Dillingham Smith to see what's going on at her house. You recall that you've given up your telephone. Immediately, you find yourself in what old-time writers lovingly referred to as a quandary.

You must either decide to forget about Mary, or go to see her. If you decide to forget her, sooner or later you will lose a friend. Does that cost money? Emphatically, yes. Lose the good will of modern society, and you are heading into a complete wreck. Social good will has a money value, a health value, a contentment value—every value that makes life count.

But you understand that. Anyhow, you like Mary Dillingham Smith. You think her friendship is worth an effort. Effort? Hm! Say "effort" and again you are talking in terms of something that is measured in dollars and cents. Effort is all most of us have in this world. It's what we live by. We may sell it direct to an employer or we may pool it with the efforts of a husband or wife to keep a home. Either way, it's worth money. It earns its share of the family income.

Walk, Drive or Write?
Now you propose to use your valuable time and your valuable effort because you esteem Mary Smith. You walk or drive over to call on her. Driving costs money—so much a mile. Walking costs money, because the time spent for it is taken from other duties which require time.

If you write a note, it costs money. Figure the value of stationery, postage and time—and you'll be surprised to find it more than the cost of a telephone call.

You can't write notes forever, anyhow. If Mary is your friend, she wants to talk to you now and then. If you write today, what about next week? What will she think if you write again? Next week you must call on Mary. You must give her time and effort.

There's no way out of it. Social telephone calls are about the cheapest way of doing your social job, to put facts very bluntly. If you do without the telephone, substitute methods of communication are apt to incur higher costs than your telephone bill.

Duty Calls
Certain social calls are more valuable than others. Suppose you find, at five this evening, that you must give attention to some vital matter. You remember that you have promised to go to dinner at—well, at Mary Dillingham Smith's table. What to do? You must let Mary know that you can't come. You must let her know as quickly as possible. Can you sincerely suggest a way that would be cheaper than a telephone call?

No, far from being valueless, social telephone calls are among the most valuable features of modern life. American city and rural life revolves around gossip, chatter, apparently meaningless social telephone calls. They are not a luxury that can be abandoned at will. You can't give them up without suffering for it. It's worth an effort, a strain, it's worth a fight, by thunder, to keep even the most gossip, the most chatter of them in your daily life.
