Policy of the Administration.

In concluding I would sum up the policy of the Administration to be a thorough enforcement of every law, a faithful execution of every decree, a prompt and energetic use of the resources of the country to meet the difficulties of the times; a prompt payment of every debt of the nation; a reduction of taxes as rapidly as the treasury can bear it; a strict economy in the expenses of the government; a reduction of the public service to the lowest point; a reduction of taxation and tariff so as to be arranged so as to afford the greatest relief to the greatest number; honest and fair dealing with all his people; to them who have suffered wrong, redress; to those who may be evicted, but without compensation; any right or obligation destroyed, a return in the treatment of the individual; and finally in securing a pure, untrammeled ballot, where every man's right to cast a vote may do as he sees fit; to secure the election of a president as soon as possible, as an assistant of his political faith, nativity or color.

Newspaper Law.

We would call the special attention of Postmasters and subscribers to the following: by the laws of the United States, a Postmaster is required to give notice by letter (returning a paper does not answer this) whom ever publishes or sells any newspaper, magazine, or other periodical, or any part thereof, in the state or states for which the paper is printed, and the reason for it not being taken; and a neglect to do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publication for the paper.

Any person who takes a paper from the Postoffice, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for it.

If a person receives a paper, directed to him, he must pay all arrears and the publisher may continue to send it until the payment is made.

If another orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time, and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it from the Postoffice, or removing and laying them uncalled for, in prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
