We heard the other day about a weekly newspaper which had that problem in its birth column. The paper dutifully reported the birth of a child to a prominent family of the community but, instead of the usual rule at the end of the notice, there was a line which proclaimed boldly "more to come."

THE RASH OF hitchhiker trouble on Interstate 20 in this area this week serves as a good reminder to us all -- it can be very dangerous to pick up hitchhikers, and it can be dangerous to try to hitch a ride.

We have long made it a rule in our family to never do either. That may be a bit unfair to people who really need a ride, but it certainly is much safer.

In both instances this week, the Good Samaritan lost only money. There are many cases on record where the loss was much more costly from such a well-intentioned act.

THEY MAY BE somewhat overlooked in the rush of graduation activities, but we here and now extend our congratulations to those Baird High seniors who were so close to getting top scholastic honors but missed them.

Baird Juniors Win at Merkel

Baird junior trackmen wound up their season Saturday in Merkel, taking top honors with 92 points in a 13-team field.

Albany finished second with 82½, followed by Sweetwater with 63 1/3, Anson with 61 1/2, Cisco with 49 1/3 and Roscoe with 38.

Baird won three blue ribbons, including two relays. The team captured both the 440-yard and 1320-yard relay crowns, and Alan Towler won the 220-yard dash in 24.9 seconds.

The 440-relay team clocked at 50.7 to win that event. Members are Billy Collins, Bryan Reese, Franklin Alexander and Towler. The same four made up the 1320-yard foursome, which was first in 2:53.1.

A second place was captured by the 220-yard relay team composed of Donny Rowe, Gene Hughes, Alexander and Towler. And the 880-yard team was sixth at 2:04.5. On that group are Rowe, Hughes, Robby Talley and Chris West.

Alexander ran second in the 440-yard dash with a 59.4, and was second in the broad jump with a leap of 17-3. Towler was third in the broad jump with a best effort of 16-10.

Deadline Near For Notaries

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin has issued a reminder that all qualified notaries public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence between May 1 and May 15, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the county clerk approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his county clerk before May 20. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the county clerk.

Mr. Smith, a sergeant in the Texas Highway Patrol, died Sunday in Midland following a long illness. He suffered from a disorder of the esophagus.

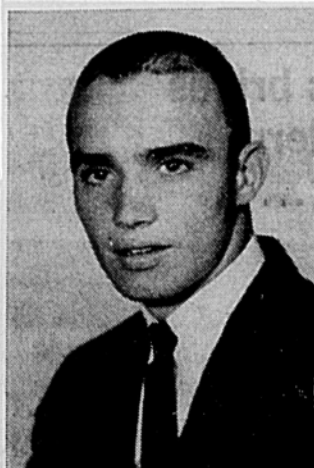

It'll be up to a relay team and two individuals Friday when the Baird Bears match their talents against the best Texas has to offer in the Class A state track and field meet in Austin.

Field events will be unveiled during the day, with running events Friday night. Class 4-A athletes will be competing against each other at the same time.

Richard Windham, whose regional shot put effort was the best in the state for Class A,

will take part in that event and the discus throw at the big Austin meet.

His toss of 56-1 leads the pack, with Alfred Campbell of Edgewood closest with 54-9½. But past performances won't mean a thing when the action begins Friday -- places will be awarded on what happens during the day.

Windham is further down the line, record-wise, in the discus. His regional toss was 140-5, while Terry Hampton of Spring-

town hit 148-10½ in regional.

In other meets this season, Windham has better distances in both shot and discus. He has topped 148 feet in the discus.

Steve Stanley will carry Baird's colors in the only other individual event, as well as running a leg on the crack Bear mile relay quartet.

Stanley's 51.5 in the 440-yard dash at regional won him second place. Herbert Jones of Memphis was clocked at 50.1 at his regional to set the pace for state entries.

Joining Stanley on Baird's relay team are Kelton Jones, J. D. Faircloth and Maxie Gordon. The 3:29.2 which won the Bears the regional title is 2.1 seconds behind the best time posted, a 3:27.1 by Gaston.

Of the eight mile relay teams, Baird's regional time ranks fourth.

New Well Locations Are Staked For Callahan Co. Regular Field

B. L. Hoover of Pampa completed two wells and staked a new location in Callahan County regular field, seven miles southwest of Cross Plains.

No. 2 Dibrell is 150 feet from the south and 3,778 feet from the west lines of W. Helms Survey 184.

Daily potential was five barrels of 38-7 gravity oil, pumping from an open hole. The 3½-inch casing was set on top of the pay at 507 feet. Total depth is 519.

No. 5 Dibrell spots 150 feet from the south and 4,078 feet from the west lines of the same survey.

It also has a daily potential of five barrels of 38.8 gravity oil. The well is pumping from an open hole at 493 to 506 feet.

No. 6 Dibrell is a planned 700-foot cable tool venture. Drillsite is 450 feet from the south and 4,378 feet from the west lines of W. Helms Survey 184.

Jim B. Curry of Abilene spotted a Callahan County regular field location eight miles southwest of Clyde. It is No. 3 Schultz & Turner, slated for 2,000 feet with rotary.

Location is on a 160 acre lease, spotting 660 feet from the north and 1,040 feet from the east lines of J. Williams Survey.

Tierra Corp., operating from Cisco, spotted No. 1-WI-B Cal Ramsey in the regular field four miles northeast of Putnam. Permit depth applied for is 500 feet with rotary.

It spots 1,460 feet from the north and 1,390 feet from the east lines of Section 3156, TE&L Survey.

A Callahan County Regular Field project drilled three miles northeast of Baird was plugged at 2,700 feet. It was Don L. Choate and Wico Oil Co. No. 7-B James L. Snyder. Site was 330 feet from the south and east lines of Section 138, BBB&C Survey.

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene will drill No. 2-A J. W. Evans in Callahan County Regular Field eight miles south of Clyde.

Drillsite is 1,978 feet from the north and 650 feet from the west lines of Section 1, Block 2, SP Survey.

Permit depth applied for is 1,200 feet with rotary to test the Moutray Sand.

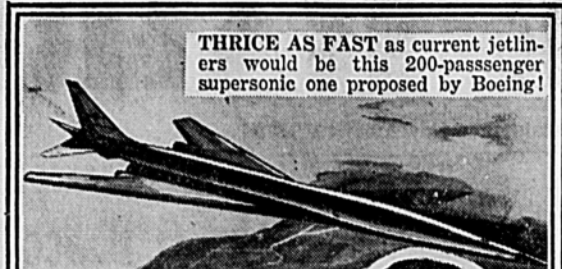

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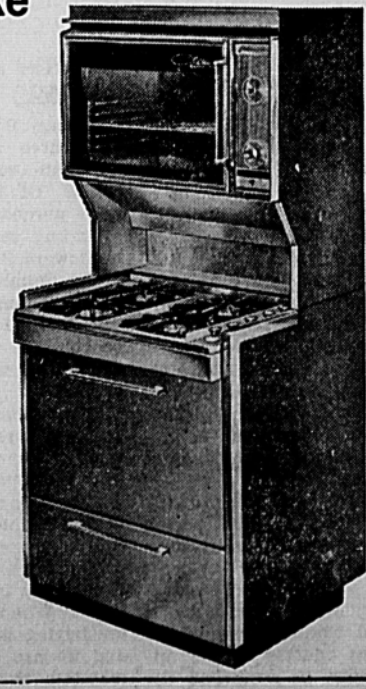

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Third in a series on the origin, interpretation and application of legal concepts:

The tenth amendment of the Constitution: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

This article is the key to the Constitutional Revolution and the diminution of State rights which has been taking place for the last 30 years.

The president of the American Bar Association in 1962 said in his presidential address. "The balance of power between the Federal and State governments has shifted dramatically since the Constitution was adopted in 1787."

Two prevailing conditions have obviously been the reason for changes. One is the growing power of the Federal government over the nation's economic and social affairs. The other is the growing application of the rights guaranteed to individuals by the first eight amendments to the Constitution. For instance, for the Supreme Court to have said in 1800, or even in 1925, that every state must, in criminal cases, provide legal counsel for those too poor to pay for it, would have been unthinkable. But, even the American Bar Association, long recognized as a force among conservative lawyers, praised the decision by the Court, which was appealed from the State of Florida. They approved it as a great advance in the administration of criminal justice.

The Supreme Court has been involved in both aspects of this resolution. In the late 1930's it removed the limitation it had previously placed on Federal power. In the years since, the Court has been placing additional restrictions on both the Federal and State Governments in their relationship with individuals.

In the early depression period of the 1930's, many critics felt the Court was hampering the nation's growth. It struck down laws concerning rate regulation, child labor, working hours, agricultural and industrial regulations. It interposed its power against the will of a great majority in Congress, and presumably against that of the people.

In the late 1930's the Court backed away from these earlier actions and made it possible for Congress and the President to

exercise a power they had been seeking. It was then that the power of State governments -- or state's rights -- may have suffered its greatest decline.

When the Federal government stepped into broad economic areas, the State governments had to step out. In many instances State governments were unable to cope with changes in their environment, such as the growth of cities and commerce which flowed across State lines in way that was never thought of when the Constitution was written.

Once that part of the constitutional revolution was accomplished, the Supreme Court turned its attention to the reverse side of the coin of increased Governmental powers -- the impingement of Government on individual liberties.

By applying many of the restrictions of the Bill of Rights to the states, the Court has brought the legal processes of the states closer to those of the federal government. Prior to this period the guarantees of freedom of religion, the right to assemble and petition for redress of grievances, the protection against unreasonable searches and cruel or unusual punishment had never been enforced against the States.

Until the Florida decision, the Supreme Court had never taken cognizance of the right to counsel by one accused of crime.

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
Former Resident Gets Presidential Award
