General News.

THE Shreveport Times proposes,
for the present, to bury the hatchet
between itself and Governor Coke
with regard to the veto of the Cad-
do and De Soto annexation bill, be-
cause it has been assured by friends
of the Governor that "he is not per-
sonally opposed to the annexation
scheme." The "friends of the Gov-
ernor" have our unbounded admira-
tion for the discovery that the Chief
Magistrate of a State is a dual indi-
viduality, with personal convictions
entirely apart from official opinion,
and that, consequently, he can with
perfect propriety oppose the same
measure officially and approve it
personally.—Gal. News

DANGER OF BEING TOO SOCIAL.—
Mr. Rousseau, of Dakota Territory,
while travelling to New York, with
several thousand dollars in his belt
to buy goods, got acquainted on the
railroad cars with a fascinating
young man, styling himself Charles
Warner, a dry goods agent, and
this hasty acquaintanceship ended
by Rousseau being drugged and
robbed. The nice young man was
very hospitable and took Rousseau
to the house of his sister, as he said,
and would not permit him to run
into hotel expenses. Rousseau re-
membered nothing more that hap-
pened till he was picked up in the
street by a policeman. Moral—Be
careful about making the acquaint-
ance of nice young men in the cars.

ST. LOUIS, May 18.—Judge Mc-
Clure, Chief Justice of Arkansas,
and Colonel Oliver, sheriff of Pulaski
county, have arrived here, en route
to Washington. Judge McClure
says all the statements upon which
Attorney General Williams predi-
cated his opinion in the Brooks-Bax-
ter case are false from beginning to
end, and that the courts of the State
including the Supreme Court, have
never had under adjudication the
case erroneously made up by Mr.
Williams.

With regard to the present condi-
tion of Little Rock, he said the situ-
ation remained unchanged; that
Brooks would continue to be recog-
nized as the lawful Governor by the
State Auditor, Treasurer, and At-
torney General, and, in fact, by all
the executive officers, except Mr.
Johnson, Secretary of State; and
that if Mr. Williams can dictate who
is Governor against all the execu-
tive officers, and against the deci-
sions of the court, then there is no
longer a republican form of govern-
ment in Arkansas. The whole ques-
tion will be brought before Con-
gress.

MEMPHIS, May 19.—A fatal af-
ray occurred at Cherry Creek, Pon-
totoe County, Miss., on last Thurs-
day evening. The parties engaged
were Wm. Garner, Sim McCoy, Sam
Reeder, W. McCoy, Sr., Lark Milam
and George McCoy. Fire arms were
freely used, and Wm. Garner was
shot dead. Lark Milam was shot
three times, each wound, however,
proving to be slight. Wm. McCoy,
Sr. had his arm broken, and Sim
McCoy was slightly bruised. All
the combatants had before this ter-
rible affair been friendly toward
each other, and in fact were all re-
lated. No other cause is assigned
for the unfortunate and deadly col-
lision than that the parties were at
the time under the influence of ar-
dent spirits.

COLUMBUS, O., May 19.—The trial
of Robert Dunlap for the murder of
James Carpenter, in September,
1872, commenced to day. The indi-
cations are that the defense will set
up that Dunlap was provoked to the
deed by the knowledge of a crim-
inal intimacy existing between his
wife and Carpenter. The prose-
cution will set up that at the time
Dunlap was married to the woman
known in this part of the country
as his wife, he had a wife living in
Virginia. This is done to secure
the testimony of Mrs. Dunlap, who
was the only witness to the murder.

CINCINNATI, May 19.—In a saloon
on the corner of Walnut and 12th
streets, last night, during a quarrel
between Charles Pobst and Jacob
Fath, two prominent brewers, the
former was stabbed in the head
three times and will probably die.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 18.—The
steamship Costa Rica, from Pana-
ma, touched at San Diego last even-
ing. She reports that the Govern-
ment at San Jose de Guatemala had
settled with Consul Magee for the
recent outrage upon his person by
paying him £10,000.

DENISON, TEXAS, May 19.—Dur-
ing this spring the Texas Atlantic

Refrigerator Company has added a
large cooling house and other im-
provements to their slaughtering
works in this city. They are now
killing 100 hives per day, and will
soon increase this amount to 500
per day. They own 100 cars con-
structed so as to transport fresh
beef to Chicago, New York and Bal-
timore. They will send a train load
per day, and will land beef in these
cities fresh and sweet from the
plains of Texas. Beef cattle are
now getting fat in this State.

The wheat crop is now out of dan-
ger, and will be the largest and best
ever harvested in Northern Texas.
New wheat will be marketed here
by the 1st of June.

A large breadth of land has been
planted in cotton, and looks fine.
Business is reviving in Texas, and
the Missouri, Kansas and Texas and
other railroads are crowded with
emigrants, while the prairies are
lined with people in wagons, seek-
ing new homes.

NEW YORK, May 18.—Charles
Timbrook, a negro, was murdered on
Sunday night near Dayton, N. J.,
by his colored paramour, Rachel
Coward, whose husband is in this
State lunatic asylum. She attempt-
ed the deed twice, was once pre-
vented by the interference of an-
other man, who wrested the knife
from her; but after he was gone she
seized another knife, and, with the
fury of a tigress thrust it into Tim-
brook's head. Death was almost
instantaneous. A coroner's jury
found a verdict against the mur-
deress, who was committed for trial.

GEN. K. C. NEWTON has resigned the command of the Baxter forces in Arkansas, and Gen. J. J. Churchill has succeeded him.

THE Cunard line of steamships between Liverpool and Boston is about to be withdrawn from Boston and sent to New York, on account of high railroad freights.

BISHOPS ROWMAN and SIMPSON, of the Methodist Episcopal Church visited the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a few days since, and were received with great cordiality. Everything looks favorable to re-union.

It is well understood that the new currency bill which has just passed the Senate is a worse inflation measure than the one the President vetoed, and that he will veto this also, if it should pass the House. Inflation and inflationists are both dead.

THE Victoria Advocate approvingly quotes from the Dallas Herald, edited by Col. Robert Josselyn, a life-long Democrat and a Texas of forty years standing, says of this late Legislature: "By a majority of them ignoring the known will of the people in several important matters, and so acting as to insure their continuance in office, they have fallen short of the duty of good and faithful servants."

If all the journals of Texas, Republican and Democratic, would unite to denounce the corruption and delinquencies of the respective parties, we should soon have a happier and more prosperous country.

THE Superintendent of Public Instruction has published a circular in the Austin Statesman and other papers, in which he says that the scholastic population of the State is 269,506; that the appropriation of \$500,000 is now in the treasury, and will be paid to the respective counties pro rata as soon as each presiding justice shall officially notify the Superintendent that the county treasurer's bond has been approved. County officers, public school officers, and public school teachers should read the circular and comply promptly with its requirements, that teachers may not be kept out of their hard-earned money.

GOV. COKE is "catching thunder" from his own party in every direction on account of the public printing muddle, the Louisiana annexation veto, and other things; and the Fourteenth Legislature is also being elevated to "bad eminence" by the people who elected it. We quote:

"The Victoria Advocate has pronounced sentence of condemnation against the Democratic party of Texas."—Rockport Transcript.

"The Advocate pronounces 'sentence of condemnation' against all frauds. It hates a cheat as God hates a liar, and when the Democratic party—so called, descends to the tactics of the proprietor of the 'dollar store' to secure its tenure of power, we hold it as guilty as the disreputable swindler who seeks gain through false pretenses."—Victoria Advocate.

General News.

THE Brennan jailor claims to have identified one of his prisoners as one of the recent stage robbers, and claims the reward of \$2500.

Mrs. NELLIE GRANT SARTON embarked with her husband for England on Saturday last, amid many tears, embraces and good wishes.

WM. BANKER, for 20 years conductor on the New York, New Haven, and Hartford railroad was arrested last Saturday, charged with embezzling \$20,000.

CORONADO'S MALDEN became insane and was sent to the insane asylum at Washington, from over an anxiety on the financial question, and a day or two since he died.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., has been made a part of entry, with a deputy collector, at \$1500.

THE old complaint against the Houston State Fair, of local management and partiality, is made again this year. It is too true.

COL. CASRO, commanding Matamoras, at request of Capt. Claus, commanding Fort Brown, sent troops up the river, and captured some hides, last Thursday.

THE Civil Rights bill has passed the Senate. It may not pass the House. If it does not provide for separate schools, it will do nothing but mischief.

THE Columbus railroad is pushing for San Antonio, west of the San Marcos.

KARREN'S GARDEN is now open to the public at all times of the day, and will be illuminated every evening. Ladies and gentlemen will find all kinds of accommodations and good, cool beverages of every description.

Texas Fairs.

The State Fair at Houston closed last Saturday, having commenced the Tuesday before. It has been decidedly successful. These annual fairs, since their inauguration five years ago, have done much toward building up Houston, and promoting her prosperity. Fairs have now become popular in Texas. (San Antonio, Austin, Brenham, Waco, Dallas, Jefferson, and other cities, will all adopt them, and we shall, from this time forth, have annual fairs in all the centres in Texas. The rivalry between the different cities will tend greatly to the success of their respective fairs.

In addition, in most of the counties movements have been set on foot for the holding of annual county fairs, and the time is not distant when these shall become general throughout the State, and the prosperity of each county will be gauged by the success of its annual fair.

San Antonio, Brenham and other places are preparing to hold their fairs during the coming autumn. In order to success, the work of preparation should begin now, and everybody concerned should help with all the energy possible. We take it for granted that our fellow citizens who have the San Antonio Fair in charge were careful to have some representatives at Houston, to gather items, and to acquaint themselves with the secrets, the plans, and the minutiae which obtained such a splendid success. If they had not, they made a mistake. Let the San Antonio Fair this fall be made equal to any ever held in the State. Let it be advertised all over the Union, and all over Europe, and let thorough preparation be made for it.

Productive industry, agricultural, mechanical, and pastoral, constitute the basis of all prosperity, more especially in Texas. Could we get enough people here to develop all our industrial resources, and consequently, our commercial wealth, Texas would have forty millions of people, and would be richer than the whole Union is now. These fairs are well calculated to bring us people, and to fill our State with capital and industry.

Unity in San Antonio.

We spoke yesterday of the new era about to dawn upon San Antonio in consequence of approaching railroad connection with the Union at large, and also of the importance of guiding the future of the city by a public spirited citizenship. In relation to the latter point we have a few more words to say.

It is all-important in developing the resources of a growing city that all the citizens should be united in sentiment and in action in relation to the common weal. They should not only be public spirited, but they should be harmonious. They should act in concert. In reference to the great object they all have in common, there should be no divisions, jealousies, or rivalries among them. Democrats and Republicans, Catholics and Protestants, native-born and foreign born; those of English blood and speech, and those of German, Spanish, French, or any other nationality; men of northern birth, and those of southern birth; merchants and bankers, farmers and mechanics, railroad men and stock men; all should unite heartily in the work of building up the city, and pushing her forward to prosperity and greatness. Neither individuals nor a few men combined, can accomplish any great enterprise, but a whole community united, and each doing all he can, will accomplish wonders.

There should be frequent meetings together of the citizens to promote this unity of sentiment and this concert of action. They should meet together for consultation, and for the interchange of views for the welfare of the city. The various enterprises of the city, either now in process of development, or existing only in idea and purpose, will flourish suitable occasions for these meetings. Not only will harmony of sentiment, wisdom of counsel, and vigor and enthusiasm of action, be promoted by these meetings, but

new plans and enterprises will be developed, and men will be astonished at the strength of execution which this united action will bring about.

Men situated as the citizens of San Antonio are should not shut themselves up in their own shells, and selfishly devote themselves exclusively to their own private business. Each one should feel that he has a public duty, the duty of a citizen of this promising and beautiful city, to perform, as well as the duties of his own private station. For the prosperity of the city will be the prosperity of its inhabitants, and men should not selfishly allow themselves to reap the benefits of the labors and enterprises of others. Each one should entitle himself to a share in those benefits by taking a share in the necessary labors.

GOV. COKE AND LIEUT. GOV. AN TOINE.—Recently the Radicals here had a pow wow, which was addressed by the bullet-headed little black negro, Antoine, by the grace of Grant and the force of Federal bayonets, now holding the position of Lieut. Gov. of the State of Louisiana. Among other subjects he alluded to that of the annexation of Caldo and De Soto parishes to the State of Texas, and triumphantly remarked that Louisiana would have something to say in the matter. This proud boast was received with thunders of applause by his sable auditory, which fact goes to show that Antoine and his followers are in full accord with Gov. Coke on this question.—Shreveport Times, 16th.

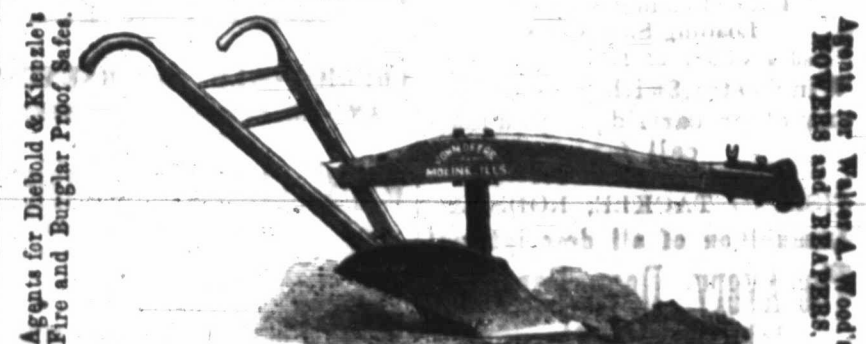
