

Girls Place Second In Baird Belle Relays Friday; Trent Wins Meet

Baird girls placed 2nd in the Baird Belle Relays held Friday April 1, with 96 points.

Placing first was Trent with 103 1/4 and Hamlin was third with 73 3/4.

Baird girls placed 1st in the 440-yard relay. The team consisted of Diane Petty, Sue Smith, Debbie Vine and Betty Corn.

Betty Corn placed second in the shot put with 31'4 1/2".

Trent won the 220-yard dash with 28.1. Debbie Hass, Baird Jr. High, placed 5th in this event.

Betty Corn, with 78'9", placed 3rd in the discus. Santa Anna took first with 113'1".

Placing first in the 60-yard dash was Stephenville, with 7.9. Marian Odom, Baird Jr. High, was 4th with 8.2, and Vickie Varner 6th with 8.4.

Betty Corn took first in the 50-meter hurdles, with 13.3 and Debbie Vine placed 3rd in the broad jump with 14'6". Trent won the broad jump with 15'1 3/4". In the 880-yard relay, the Baird team, Betty Corn, Debbie Vines, Sue Smith and Diane Petty, took first with 1:59.

Debbie Hass, Baird Jr. High, came in 6th in the 100-yard dash, with Trent placing first

at 12.6. Trent also placed first in the hop-step-jump with 31'1 1/2" and second at 29'4". Debbie Vines won third with 28'9" and Sue Smith, 5th with 28'3".

Baird placed second in the mile relay with a team composed of Diane Petty, Debbie Vines, Mary Jo Collins and Kerry White. Hamlin placed first with 4:45.4.

In a no contest City election held Tuesday Mayor Lynn Ault and two City Councilmen, Jerry Loper and Jimmy Godfrey were re-elected with 89 votes each. A total of 90 votes were cast in this election.

Clyde School Board Election

Food For The Needy

New County Agent Hired Here Mon.

Jerry Lackey of Brenham, in Washington County, has been hired as County Agent, replacing Pat Garner, as announced by County Judge Byron Richardson, Monday afternoon.

Lackey was approved by the Callahan County Commissioners in a call meeting Monday morning.

Recommendation was made by John E. Burleson, District 8 Agent from Stephenville, who accompanied Lackey to the meeting.

Lackey, who was assistant County Agent in Brenham, will receive the same salary and expenses Garner was receiving before accepting a similar position in Pecos County.

The newly hired County Agent will assume his duties May 1. He and his wife will move to Baird some time before that date.

In other action by the Commissioners in Monday's meeting, a secretary, Pat McMahon, was hired for Richard Keathley, Adult Probation Officer for the Tri-County District, serving Callahan, Taylor and Jones Counties. Callahan County's portion of Keathley's salary is 4.2 per cent.

Also, in unanimous decision, the Commissioners authorized County Judge Richardson to enter into agreement with the State Department of Public Welfare Commodity Distribution Division. Purpose of this program is to supply pensioners with surplus food. As soon as agreements and eligibility requirements have been approved, the program can get underway, according to Judge Richardson. "Cost of this program to the County will be 18c per year, rising to 36c the second year, for each person receiving food from this surplus stock," Richardson stated. Omar Burleson Makes Statement For Re-Election To Congress

Omar Burleson, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, today pledged a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for re-election.

In announcing his plans to seek re-election, Burleson stated he will base his campaign on his record of nearly 20 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a 'yes man' to anyone or any group, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for what I thought was in the best interest of our Country, our State, and our District; people have the right to expect no less," Burleson said.

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice-Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burleson said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their (Continued on Page 3)

Deadline Draws Near

Members of the Steering Committee for the newly named Shady Oaks Recreation Center have mailed over 500 letters and membership blanks to residents in the Baird-Clyde area.

Please read this letter carefully, give some consideration to becoming a recreation center member, then fill out the blank and mail to P. O. Box 316, Baird, Texas, or Drawer DD in Clyde.

A copy of the letter and membership blank has been printed below for the convenience of those who may not have received them through the mail.

LETTER . . .
A group of Baird and Clyde citizens are interested in securing a recreation center for the people in the Baird and Clyde area.

The proposed recreation area consists of a nine-hole golf course, an Olympic-size swimming pool, miniature golf, tennis courts, picnic area, and other facilities as may be decided by the board of directors.

The over-all cost of this project is estimated at between \$140,000 and \$150,000. Approximately \$50,000 will be spent on the golf course, \$50,000 on the club house and facilities, and from \$40,000 to \$50,000 on the swimming pool. The swimming pool will be open to members of the center only. There is planned a clubhouse that can be used for civic club meetings, women's club meetings, bridge clubs or any other groups or club that might be formed and approved by the board of directors.

The recreation club will be governed by the board of directors. The board of directors will

be voted on by the membership of the center with each family (Continued on Page 3)

THE LESSON OF EASTER

Easter gives vitality to life. Without the fact of Easter, life would be dull, flat and meaningless; there would be no more value to human life than there is to brute life, simply living on a better physical plane, and with less real enjoyment, for the natural, universal dream of humanity is toward the idea that Easter reveals immortality brought to light. 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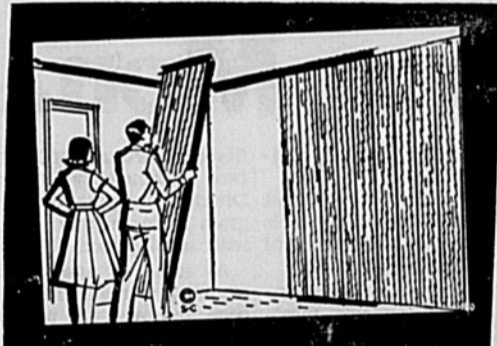
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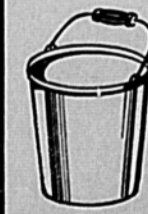

membership having one vote. This board of directors will form the rules by which the center will be operated.

The location of the center will be about half-way between Baird and Clyde. It will be on a 100-acre tract of land owned by the City of Baird. There will be a long-term lease on the land, which also includes the water rights. There is more than

an ample supply of water available in wells that already exist on the property. A manager's apartment will be built in with the clubhouse so that the property will be supervised at all times.

The money for this project will be borrowed from the Farmers Home Administration. It will be a 40-year loan with interest at 5 per cent. The payment on this loan will run about \$58 a year for each \$1,000 borrowed. There are no restrictions on the type of recreation for which this money may be used. If enough of the members want a particular type of recreation and it is approved by the board of directors, then it may be added to the facilities. There will never be any kind of intoxicating liquor sold or used on the property.

The membership fee has been set at \$25 per family. The monthly dues have been set at \$7.50 per family. This can be changed,

but it is felt that this is a maximum and might be lowered at a later date. This includes all charges for any activities that the family might enter into.

The \$25.00 fee may be paid in full, or if you prefer, \$5 may be paid down and the remainder at \$5 per month until the \$25 is paid. If the project does not go through, then the full amount of the membership fee will be refunded. This money is held in escrow at the First National Bank of Baird.

There have been approximately 100 families signed for the project on March 30. A closing date of April 20 has been set. If enough members have been signed to complete the project at this time, the membership fee will be raised to \$100. The membership may be restricted to 225 families. There is no legal provision for a family to have to pay the \$7.50 per month dues. They may discontinue their membership at any time. The \$7.50 dues will not begin until the project has been completed and has been accepted from the contractors.

An engineering and architect firm has been employed to oversee the project. This firm is now working on about 14 other projects like this in the state of Texas. In most every case, the membership had to be restricted after the project got underway.

It is felt that this project will help the towns of Baird and Clyde. The location is ideal for both; and, also, it is located on Interstate 20.

Omar Burleson For Re-Election

Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State, and the Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense", gained through his years of public service.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, with duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent as wisely, and as judiciously, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions, I have found myself in the minority -- especially on needless spending of the taxpayer's money. I am proud that I have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best."

"At every session of Congress, I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the World," he said.

Burleson said he feels there are those other things for which the Government was designed and, of course, it costs money. "Such things as the conservation of our natural resources -- caring for God's gift to people that they may be preserved for future generations," he said.

Burleson also said that the individual - groups of individuals or local governmental entities are unable to cope with matters of flood control and, in many cases, an adequate water supply. "We have got to look to the future if our area progresses. For one thing, this means water is a priority concern."

"The Federal Government has

assisted our area in numerous respects in coping with some of these problems. We have our share of flood control projects and our share of attention to those now in the planning stage. An example is the effort to find an answer to the flood threat in Abilene and several other places.

"An example of other Federal activity in our area is, of course, our military installations, new Post Office buildings and other Federal interests which are proper and needed."

Further, Burleson said that he "certainly subscribes to the idea that the Government should help the elderly and those people who are unable to help themselves."

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and the confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress -- and to violate that trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made -- "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He

attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School. Later, he studied postgraduate law at the University of Texas.

Burleson married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Reverend R. D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist churches in West and South Texas.

Most Veterans Benefits Tax-Free

The Veterans Administration said today that practically all veterans' benefits are tax-free and need not be reported on income tax returns.

However, interest earned on GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with the VA, is not classified as a benefit but as earned income, and must be reported on tax returns. Proceeds of the GI policy and the dividends themselves are tax-free and need not be reported, according to the VA.

Other VA benefits which are not taxable include education and training allowances, subsistence payments to disabled veterans in vocational rehabilitation training, compensation and pension payments, grants to seriously disabled veterans for "wheelchair" homes and motor vehicles, and all benefits to families of deceased veterans.

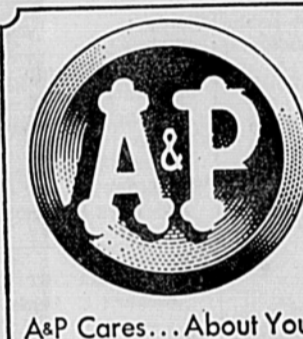

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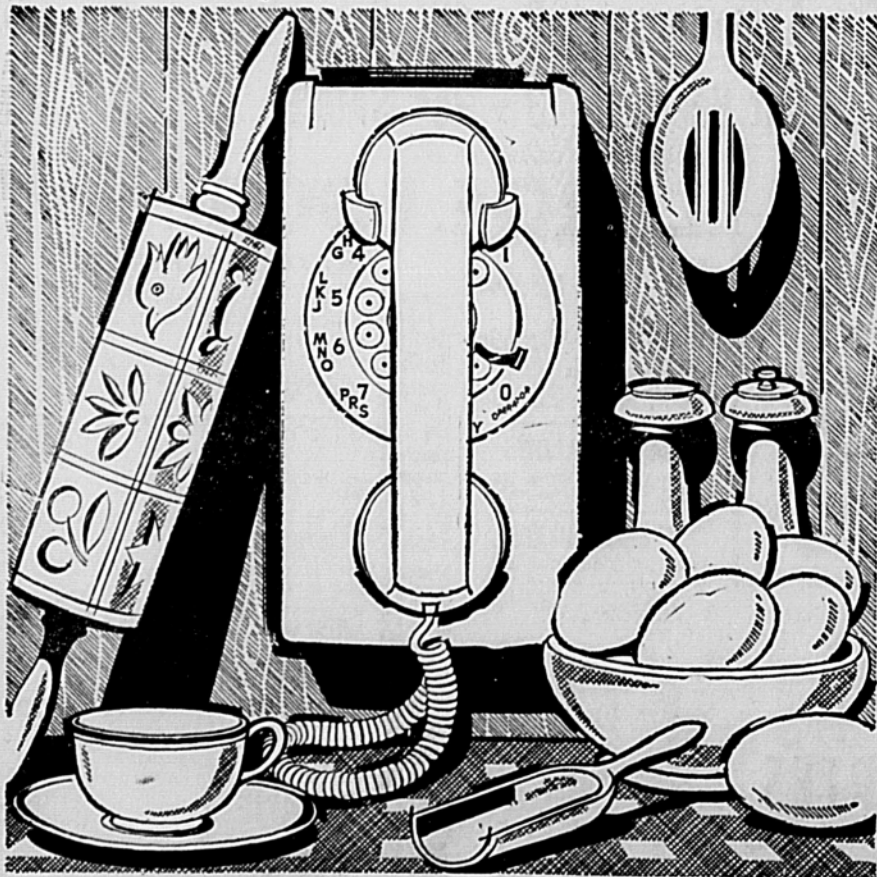

Defense, Disaster Conference To Be Held In Sweetwater April 14

Defense and disaster relief will be the subject of a three-hour conference to be conducted in Sweetwater, Thursday night, April 14.
 The conference will be held at the County Health Unit, 12th and Elm, beginning promptly at 7:00 p. m. Registration will begin at 6:30 p. m.
 Nelson Geron, Civil Defense Director of the Sweetwater-Nolan County, said the conference would include 10 counties in this area. County judges and commissioners, mayors and councilmen, Civil Defense directors, members of city and county government services, school officials, and business and industrial leaders are expected to attend.
 In addition to Nolan, representatives are expected from Callahan, Fisher, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Scurry, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor Counties.
 "Although the conference is directed to loyal government officials, all persons interested in defense and disaster relief are invited to attend," Geron said.
 Primarily, the conference will point up defense and disaster relief responsibilities of local government officials, and provides other information that is valuable to the community in normal times or during periods of stress and tension.
 Geron commented, "This information will be of value in

disaster from natural cause, or in the event of nuclear chaos."
 The program includes of demonstration on the effects of radiation, the development of shelter in new school construction, organization for defense and disaster relief, and the channels for obtaining State and Federal assistance when it might be needed.
 The conference, one of 20 being conducted throughout the

State, is presented in an interesting and educational form through the use of films and color slides. It is conducted by the Civil Defense training staff of Texas A&M University's Engineering Extension Service in cooperation with the State Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, Texas Department of Public Safety.
 Participating in the conference will be Dr. W. R. Bodine, Gus White, and Larry Fisher, all of Texas A&M University; and John Christian, Training Specialist, and Kenneth Tooley, Public Information Officer, both of the State Office of Defense and Disaster Relief.

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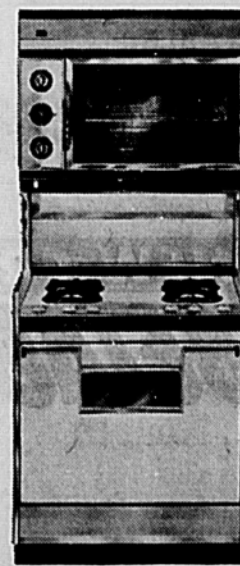
