Centennial—San Antonio.

We have several times endeavored to awaken an interest in the minds of the people of this city in relation to the importance of their being represented at the Centennial of American Independence, to be held at Philadelphia next year.

Unless there should be some failure in the programme, preparations or management, the Centennial will be, by far, the grandest world's exposition of the arts and industries of all nations that has ever occurred.

Among the cities of Texas, Houston is especially active and energetic in her arrangements for the Centennial. She has organized what she calls a Texas Auxiliary Association, for this purpose.

San Antonio should form an association of her own, or she adopt the humblest method of acting as an auxiliary to a central association at Houston. Even that would be far better than doing nothing at all.

1. The different varieties of soil common to their respective localities; its average depth and adaptability for production, with kind, quantity and quality of produce, and such other information germane to the same as may be deemed important.

2. Specimens of every variety of valuable timber growing in their respective counties, and to include especially the best specimens of all kinds of oak, pine, cypress, walnut, box, etc., ash, magnolia, elm, gum, cottonwood, hickory, pecan, linn, sycamore, chestnut and other valuable timber.

3. Specimens of all kinds of ores and minerals, such as gold, iron, lead, silver, copper, coal and deposits of rock salt, beds of gypsum, also all kinds of valuable stones and marble, granite, etc., etc., clays and ceramic materials and petrifications.

4. Specimens of soil productions, to include corn, wheat, rye, oats, barley, peas, beans, cotton, sugar, rice, potatoes, etc., etc.

5. Specimens of native grasses, showing those which are best adapted for grazing and those which are best for making hay; also, such other native and foreign grasses and storage plants as have been developed by cultivation, with the botanical names of same when they can be ascertained.

6. Collections showing the fauna and flora of Texas; also, collections of insects, whether advantageous or prejudicial to agriculture.
