WHAT A NAME !- The new Russian circular fronclad, built for coast defence; is said to be a terrible vessel. With a burden of 2,-494 tons, she sinks but four meters deep in the water, and, being circular, presents no point of particular vulnerability. The two twentyeight ton guns are placed on a turret in the center of the vessel, and being open to view, can be accu rately aimed and fired either to gether or separately. The ship is propelled by two engines with a possible capacity of 3,000 horse power. This terror striking craft was constructed at Nicolaieff, and her name inspires more dread than her armament. 
