Telegraphic Gleanings. TOTANDES BIOTINA

Shelbyville, HI., Sept. 2,-The old settlers of Shelby county held a grand reunion and mass meeting grand reunion and mass meeting here to-day, at the Fair Grounds, about one mile from this city. Fully 20,000 people, young and old male and iswale, from all parts of the county, attended. Orations from promisent orators and old settlers, combined with picknicking and marriagent were the combined. and merriment, were the complet

order of the day.

Everything passed off quietly and pleasantly until the afternoon, when al lreturned to town, when a young countryman was arrested for some offense, 'He resisted the officers and tought vigorously for release, but he was hurried to the calaboose amid the exciting yells of his friends the countrymen, who followed in a complete mob.

The abouts of definance from the crowd soon proved that a riot was eminent. They aurrounded the building and made several attempts to break the door, all the while yelling savage vengeance on the city and its authorities. The Marshall, with his deputized officers, then raided the crowd, when a hand-tohand bloody conflet ensued, during which rocks and clubs were freely used; bloody heads and bloody shirts were seen falling to the rea on every side. The rioters in the meantime having eleaned out the officers, the Sheriff, Mr. Marsh Howard, then came boldly to the relief He read the riot act and swore in 100 citizeus to assist. him in enforcing the law . This put a stopper on the excited people. Saveral citizens, fearing a renewal, went for arms; some had shot guns and others clubs. Bix rioters were arrested, and are guarded to-night by fifty citizens, and police lamps are hung around the calaboose, as there is some fear of an sttack, news to that effect having reached the

THE NEW YORK POSTORFICE.

The New York Postoffice is finished and opened for public use.

The business of this office is immense. Three bundred thousand domestic lefters are received and distributed daily, and about thirty thousand foreign letters are received and about thirty-five thousand. ed and about thirty five the dispatched. Six hundred clerks are continually employed, exclusive of those delegated to the different stations. Three hundred and niney carriers are employed. The new oflice, in the lower part of the City Hall Park, covers 340 feet on Broadway, 320 on Park Row, 200 on the north and 130 on the south side. north and 130 on the south side. It is built of granite, with chateau roof, and at the height of 105 feet is surmounted by a lantern. Congress has appropriated \$8,000,000 toward the erection of this office building. The third and fourth sloors are occupied by the United States courts and offices. It may not be generally known that so important is this New York office to the equatory at large, that it stands 40 lbs. more Bread to bhi Floor.

Mr. Degener's Letter to Mr. Wmider.

When we published Mr. Degener's letter, we omitted to publish the section of our present Constitution together with the additions as proposed by Mr. Degener. handed to me with the letter. We publish below the section of the Constitution referred to as it now stands, togethar with the amendments he proposes. These amendments are distinguished by being printed in Italies, so that all can understand them. It will be seen that Sec. II is entirely new.

Sec. I. Every male person who shall have stained the age of twenty-one years and who shall he (or who shall have declared his intention to become) a citizen of the United States, or who is, at the tivic of the acceptance of this Constitution by the Congress of the United States, a citizen of Texas, and shall have resided in the State one year next preceding as n citizen of Texas, and shall have resided in the State one year next preceding an election, and the last vix months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, and who shall be able to read the English or any other European language understandingly, and write his same, and is duly registered, (Indians not taxed excepted) and has paid his State and county taxes thirty days previous to an election. copied) and has poid his State and county taxes thirty days previous to an election, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and should such qualified elector happen to be in any other county, eitnated in the district in which he resides, at the time of an election, he shall be permitted to vote for a district officer; provided that the qualified elector shall be permitted to vote anywhere in the State for State officers; and provided further, that no soldier, means, or marine in the army or novy of the United States, shall be entitled to vote at any election arented by this Constitution.
