TEXAS SHAMED BY MEXICO. Mexico is to join in celebrating and contributing to the Centennial of American Independence.

TEXAS takes no official part in the grand honors paid by all the world to the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of the Nation.

TEXAS was wrested from Mexico by revolution and Mexico afterwards lost California, New Mexico, and Arizona in a war with the United States.

MEXICO is regarded by Texas as far behind her in civilization, in material and mental development, in political and civil and social progress.

WHEN Mexico comes up to see the prosperity and glory of all the great tribes constituting our grand national Israel, who will naturally look around to examine the progress made by Texas.

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The one Great Issue.

The Express has repeatedly argued that the financial question now before the country would be the one great issue in the next Presidential canvass.

It has appeared to threaten for some time past that both the old parties were in danger of being broken up by this all-important and vital issue.

It is needless to declare," says the Times in conclusion, "what all observers of the current political phenomena see and recognize, namely, that the public mind is actually agitated upon and has a realizing sense of a single issue, that of honest money and dishonest broken rag promises."

The Galveston News reproduces the substance of the above from the Times, and, in reply, tries to prove that there is a question which is still more vital and fundamental than that question is.

The Herald and the Grangers. The Herald, of this city, utters itself in unmistakable and unadvised terms against the Order of the Patrons of Husbandry.

It says that "the Convention itself is a body of mediocre intellect," composed, with the exception of a few able men, "of excellent and honest men, but men of moderate capacity, with strong prejudices, which may or may not derive point and application from their membership in a secret society."

It intimates that the leading men of the Convention speak "with bated breath" from fear of this "association," the Grangers—many of whom are "strangers," whose acts are "regulated in secret council."

We submit that the Herald is unjust to the Convention as a body, unjust to its leading men, unjust to the Grangers, and unjust to those citizens who have sought homes among us, at our own earnest request, and to whom it gives the cold shoulder as "strangers."

We have seen no evidence of trucking on the part of the leading men of the Convention. Nor have we seen any sign of harm from the fact that many of the members represent the great agricultural interests of the country.

It is not to be wondered at, that the "strangers," so-called, are citizens of the State, and stand upon an equal footing with those who are employed by the State.

The President's speech in Full.

At the reunion of the Army of the Tennessee, at Des Moines, Iowa, held a week ago, President Grant made, for him, quite a lengthy speech. A short synopsis of it was given by telegraph at the time, but it was very imperfectly rendered.

"It always affords me much gratification to meet my comrades in arms ten and fourteen years ago, and to tell over again, in memory, the trials and hardships of those days—hardships imposed for the preservation and perpetuation of our free institutions.
