DRAMATIC.—It is no little degree of satisfaction that we are able to announce the completion of the Dramatic Association during the Fair week. On Thursday evening the "Inhabitable Face of 'Whispering' First" and "Raising the Wind," were splendidly rendered to a full house, and gave more general satisfaction than any plays yet put on the boards. The acting was as near perfect as any amateur acting we have ever seen, and every one taking part deserves special credit for the manner in which each performed his part. Marriage in Law Life.—On Wednesday afternoon a singular and very ludicrous marriage took place in the office of the District Clerk, between Otto Schulenburg and Anna Patten. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. S. G. Burton. The word "humbug" is very common here among many persons. Disputed Court.—The Hon. Geo. H. Noon, presiding. A NEW WAY TO COLLECT DEBTS. The State of Texas upon the relation of J. E. Lockwood vs. H. D. Bonnet, Sheriff of Bexar county. This was an application for a writ of habeas corpus, to reduce a bail bond fixed at \$50,000 by Justice Kloke. Mr. Lockwood testified that he knew James Lowe and J. E. Lockwood; that in August last there was a dissolution of the partnership existing between Lowe, Stokely and J. E. Lockwood; at the time of the settlement there was due from Lowe to Lockwood the sum of \$7,000 coin. Lockwood and Lowe came to terms on Sunday last to make a final settlement. The propositions for settlement were made on Wednesday, the day before the affidavit was issued for the arrest of Lockwood for embezzlement. Powers of Attorney signed by Lowe, and dated August 20th, 1875, were read in evidence. These documents gave Lockwood full power as agent of Lowe to dispose of cattle.

Lowe demanded of Lockwood the books in his possession. Lockwood declined to deliver the books, but held them as collateral security for the \$7,000 note he held against Lowe. The note given by Lowe to Lockwood is still unpaid and in possession of Lockwood. James Lowe testified that he met Stokely and Lockwood at Oakville on the 20th of August and purchased their interest in the firm of Lowe, Stokely & Lockwood for \$7,000, and gave his note therefore; but that the note was to be paid in cattle. He demanded his books from Lockwood some days ago, but Lockwood declined to deliver them to him. He said the books were worth at least \$150,000, that amount of his cattle had been sold and he could not collect the money for them without the books. He did not think Lockwood had sold very many cattle. Lockwood had no interest in or right to the books. He gave Lockwood the power of attorney to collect \$7,000 in note for the purpose of paying off the cattle for that amount. He did not know how many cattle Lockwood had sold under the power of attorney. He said Lockwood could not do anything or sell cattle or collect for cattle without the books. He said he did not want Lockwood to have the books, and that he had revoked the power of attorney he gave to Lockwood. He did not know that Lockwood had attempted to act upon the power of attorney since he had revoked it. Lockwood may have said to my agent, John Eckford, that he was willing to settle, and that he would pay me all, if anything, might be due to me.

John Eckford testified that he was the agent of James Lowe. He called on Lockwood to get Lowe's books on the 19th of October, but the books were not delivered to him. Mr. Leisinger came to him on the morning of the 19th and said he represented Lockwood, and that he was ready to make a settlement, but he demanded that Lowe should give Lockwood bank note security for the sum of 7,000, but this Lowe declined to do. All efforts at compromise were in vain.

The Court remarked that the case was one of the most remarkable ever listened to; that he failed to discover any of the ingredients of crime, and that while there was some difference between Lowe and Lockwood as to money matters, this remedy was not the proper one. The prisoner was discharged with the remark that there was no criminal case against him.
