THE REPORT OF SIR MOSES MONTEFLORE—WHAT A MAN NINETY-TWO YEARS OLD SAW IN PALESTINE.

Sir Moses Montefiore, now in the ninety second year of his age, a few months back, paid a seventeenth visit to Jerusalem for the purpose of collecting information relating to the actual condition of the Holy Land as to their capability and inclination to engage in mechanical and general agricultural pursuits.

We feel deeply with the Southern people in their troubles. We have done all in our power to help a genuine work of reconstruction. The Southern States have the elements of a great empire. In another generation this war need be no more of a memory than the disease of infancy to the strenuous, lusty man.

The French and American Consuls also assured him of their willingness to assist. Sir Moses states that a great struggle will arise in the future between the educated or Protestant party—those who do not come to the Holy City from religious motives, but from reasons connected with special circumstances—and the strictly Conservative party, whose sole object in going to Jerusalem was the preservation of their religion.

During his short stay at Jaffa, Sir Moses Montefiore noticed some indications to that effect. Sir Moses gives a long account of the different institutions established in Jerusalem for the benefit of the poor. There is a soup kitchen, a loan society, whose object it is to make advances without interest; a hospital, which provides every poor person coming to Jerusalem with gratuitous board and lodging until he may have procured for himself a suitable residence, three building societies, etc.

He told me that all the refuse of the city is now carried into the pool of Bethesda, which, strange to say, I was informed, is close to the house intended for the barracks, and the soldiers living there appear not to experience the least inconvenience on account of its vicinity. If arrangements could be made to clear that pool entirely, to admit pure water only, and to dig special pools for the purpose of conducting there the city drains, Jerusalem might become free from any threatening epidemic.

All the doctors in Jerusalem assured me that the Holy City might be reckoned from the purity of its atmosphere, one of the healthiest of places. Sir Moses speaks of the skill of Jewish mechanics in Jerusalem, whereas it has been said that there are no Jewish mechanics in the Holy City. Sir Moses saw watchmakers, engravers, lithographers, sculptors, goldsmiths, bookbinders and carpenters, and he says, "all did their work most satisfactorily."

A watchmaker into whose hands he gave a valuable repeater, for repair, put it, in a very short time, into excellent order. The same man, in addition to his skill as a watchmaker, displayed also a great talent as a Hebrew calligraphist. He presented Sir Moses Montefiore with a grain of wheat on which were written sixteen lines, forming an acrostic on the name of the venerable philanthropist.

The traveler states that he had every opportunity of convincing himself that the Jews are eager and willing to engage in any kind of labor, agricultural or otherwise—which will obtain for them the necessities of life and place them above the need of the charity of their benevolent co-religionists.

Sir Moses says that the great regard which he has always entertained towards his brethren in the Holy Land has now become, if possible, doubly increased, and he emphatically asserts that they are deserving of assistance; they are willing and able to work, their mental powers are of satisfactory nature, and all Israelites ought to render them support.

THE MASSACRE OF PRISONERS AT GIDDINGS.

Below we give the testimony of the jailer of Lee county in regard to the execution of prisoners confined in the Lee county jail, on the sixteenth of February:

"I am jailer for this county. Beverly Shaw, commonly called 'Pot Shaw,' the man here lying shot dead, was in my custody as a prisoner yesterday and last night till between twelve and one o'clock. At about that time I heard footsteps and I jumped up to the window. Just as I got to the window a man called me by name. I answered 'and ask him who he was; he told me his name was Jenkins, from Burleson county, with a prisoner he wanted to look up in jail; that he was very tired. I told him I had been looking for a mob there and did not wish to open the door. He insisted that I should; said I knew him; that he had met me in Houston and went from there to Huntsville with me. I told him I recollected going with Jenkins but I could not recognize his voice nor could I recognize him in the dark, and told him I did not like to open the door unless I could see all around the house. He then declared that he was all right; that there was no one about except himself and his prisoner and guard. I then told him that I would open the door. I went down carrying a lamp which I set on the steps, and opened the door, and the first man that stepped in I found was not Jenkins, and then I knew that I was sold out. Four or five men rushed immediately in. I looked at them but did not know them; I said them that I would recollect them for this hereafter; only one man was disguised that I noticed; he had a white handkerchief tied over his face. I had the key in my hand and was backing out to put the key in a barrel in the hall, but they surrounded me and saw the key and took it from me. They told me to be quiet, that they did not intend to hurt me; I told them I knew they did not. They told me to unlock the door; I replied to them that I would not; that they might kill me, but could not make me unlock the door. After they had caught me, my wife came down and thought she would come out and give the alarm; they stopped her and made her go back; told her they were not going to harm me; she insisted on going out, and I took her by the arm and led her back up stairs; one man then had hold of my arm and another followed right behind me with a shot gun. They then opened the door; I could not see them to do it, but heard the click of the lock. After I got up stairs I was afraid they would take out the men they were after and leave the door open, so that the others would get out, and I said to them not to leave the door open. The man that had hold of me replied 'we want five men.' I heard them ask David Wilkenson (I think they had him in the hall at the time) if he thought he could be a good boy hereafter—he told them that he could and that he had always been a good boy. They told him to go back. I heard nothing said by the men to Shaw, but heard him say that if he had done anything to be killed for he would not mind, but that he hadn't done anything to be killed for. After they had got the men they wanted, they said, 'let that man come down and lock his door.' I then went down and three men were standing in the outer door; the men who had been up stairs with me stepped in the door and stood there until I locked the door. I started to step out but they told me to hold on and not come out. One of them told me to shut the door, then took me by the hand and made me good night. I shut the door, ran up stairs and got my gun and pistol and shot them off for the purpose of giving an alarm. At about the first or second shot I made I heard shots in the direction where Shaw was found dead this morning. (Witness refuses to answer the question as to whether he had recognized any of the men.) Jim Tom Irvin, the oldest person hanged, had a ring on his finger last night. When I saw him this morning about sunrise the ring was not on his finger. The boy who was hung was named Tom Irvin. Jim Irvin's true name is Jim Irvin.
