## Making A Newspaper.

"How to make newspapers" There are a great many readers who are quite sure that the editors don't know how to do it. If these sagacious and critical readers could only do the editing, how many blunders and libel suits would be avoided, how many able articles would be written, what a tone the papers would have, how many shining little hatchets would be ground! The newspapers which these critical readers are constantly seeking to edit are like old batchelors' children—the best governed and the best behaved in the world. But a Texas schoolboy has visited a Galveston office and found out "how to make a newspaper." Here is his composition, read before the school after his return: "The head men sit down to their desks and write on square pieces of paper what to print in the paper. They put them in a box and sent them up stairs. When they get up stairs a man takes them and gives a lot of other men every one a piece of this paper that is written on. The man that the paper is given to takes the type and fixes them one after another so they read what the paper reads. A man then takes the words and puts them in a box as they are to be in the papers; then he takes the box and places it in some machinery that makes it go back and forth; then there is a boy who stands over the machinery and puts the paper on the machinery, and then some hooks bring it down over the box with types in, and the types have ink on, the types print on the paper, there is hooks that takes the paper up and lay it on another machine that folds it up, and then they sell them. The end."

**John Quincy Adams' Ways.**

The Hon. W. H. Steward, in a letter describing his first interview with John Quincy Adams, said: "The house is very plain and old fashioned; no Turkey carpeting, no pier table, no pillar and claw pianos. Very plain ingrain carpeting covered the floor, very plain paper on the walls. A short, rather corpulent man of 60 and upward, came down the stairs and approached me. He was bald, and his countenance was staid, sober, almost to gloom or sorrow, and hardly gave indication of his superiority over other men. His eyes were weak and inflamed. He was dressed in an olive frock coat, a cravat carelessly tied, and old-fashioned light colored vest and pantaloons. It was obvious that he was a student, just called from the labors of his closet. Without courtly air or attitude, he paused at the door of the parlor. I walked quietly up to him while he maintained his immovable attitude, and presented my letter of introduction. Our interview lasted three hours; he was all the time plain, honest and free in his discourse; but with hardly a ray of animation or feeling in the whole of it. In short, he was just exactly what I before supposed he was—a man to be respected for his talents, admired for his learning, honored for his integrity and simplicity, but hardly possessing traits of character to inspire a stranger with affection. Occasionally, indeed, he arose into a temporary earnestness, and then a flash of ingenuous ardor was seen, but it was transitory, and all was cool, regular and deliberate. As I left the house I thought I could plainly answer how it happened that he, the best President since Washington, entered and left the office with so few personal friends."

**How To Make A Lactometer.**

Pittsburg Dispatch: Any house keeper who desires to test the purity of the lacteal fluid furnished daily by the milkman can provide herself with an impronito and, to all purpose, an efficient lactometer in this easy way: Procure a glass bulb and stem, both hollow; load it with quicksilver, sand or even bird shot until the instrument will float upright in milk known to be pure. Mark on the stem the point to which it sinks—the surface point. Remove it from the milk and float it in pure water, marking the surface point as before, which will be considerably higher on the stem than the other mark. Now take a narrow slip of paper, capable of being rolled lengthwise, and insert it in the stem of the instrument so that the figures on it will be visible through the glass. Lay off on this, in the direction of its length, a space equal to the distance between the two

surface points, numbering the first point 0 and the other 100. Subdivide this space into ten or twenty proportional spaces correspondingly numbered; roll the slip and insert it in the stem until the 0 is at the surface point of the milk, the 100 at that of the water. Your lactometer is now complete. Float it in your milk-can every morning, and the depth to which it sinks will register the percentage of dishonest water, if any the milk contains. Suppose, for example, the instrument sinks till the surface line cuts the figure fifteen. The milk contains fifteen per cent of added water.

**A New York Sampson.**

A novel athletic entertainment will shortly be given by a well known amateur of this city. Among other feats that he proposes to perform are juggling with dumb bells and ring-weights, none of them to weigh less than forty pounds, and lifting enormous weights. He will raise and hold in his hands a cannon weighing 1,000 pounds while it is being loaded and fired. He will also lift a horse, fifteen hands high, six inches from the ground by main strength, standing over the platform. He will then lift a team of horses in the same manner, and will next lift a platform containing a dozen persons. While suspended in mid air by one hand, he will put up at arm's length over his head a 10 pound dumb bell with the other.
