Burbank, 10th Infantry, is appointed Judge Advocate of the Court.

Life Lost by the Lurid Light-Ning.

One Man Killed and Two others Badly Injured.

News reached this city of a frightful accident during the storm Monday night last, by which one man was killed outright, and two others were badly injured.

The wagon train of Smith & Perez, en route from this city to Fort Concho, was camped on Joshua Creek, about nine miles from Hereford, Monday night, when the storm burst over them. A iron pole to the camp was struck by lightning during the storm, the electricity glancing off and into the midst of the camp, instantly killing a teamster named Dominguez, and badly injuring another named Muzey, and one whose name our reporter failed to learn, all three, we understand, being residents of this city.

We failed to learn whether any of the stock was injured, or whether other damage was done.

The injured men were brought to this city yesterday.

Some Snake.

It was on Sunday morning last that Mr. John Copeland was treated to the exhilarating exhibition of a huge snake issuing from a hole in the floor of the Circulating Library on Main street, and crawling around the room. The reptile was dispatched, and found to be a rattlesnake, and four feet in length. His snakishness made his appearance a week or two ago, but escaped back to his hole before he could be "rounded up." What makes Copeland so cheerful and easy in his mind concerning this matter, is the knowledge that it is within the bounds of possibility for there to be a nest of several hundreds of the poisonous creatures under his floor.

Police Court.

George Miller, one of the men arrested in Stephens' stable yesterday morning was adjudged a vagrant and fined \$5.

Geo. Binivas and Frank Fisher were found guilty of keeping vicious dogs, and were fined \$5 each and ordered to kill or remove the dogs from the city within six weeks, under penalty of another \$500.

A colored teamster named J. R. Grant was fined \$15 for disorderly conduct.

Mr. Hill Has a Grievance, and States It.

A colored recruit of the 10th Cavalry named Wm. Hill, confined in the poorhouse for the theft of twenty-seven cigars, is making an effort to bring about a serious clash between the civic and military authorities. He wrote a communication to Gen. Ord, yesterday, demanding the interference of that officer to release him from the power of the minions of civil law, and beseeching the gallant 10th to rally to the rescue of their comrade in what he seems to regard, the vilest kind of endurance vice. Mr. Hill broadly intimates that he joined the army on account of a constitutional antipathy to manual labor; yet he now finds himself obliged to pay the penalty of his rashness in the civil courts, for eating his "grab" by the sweat of his brow, the said sweat being accelerated in its course as it pours from his pores by his exertions in the matter of grave-digging. He being a soldier, whose duty he considers it to fill graves, not make them, he demands to be relieved of his invidious task. He also asks the General to go to some one and get a watch and razor taken from him.

Tuesday, Hill broke the head of a Max-load imprisoned with him, and Tuesday night broke the handcuffs put upon him to restrain him in his passion.
