Clyde Home Building Set

Plans for developing a new residential area in southeast Clyde were announced Saturday.

J. O. Martin, Abilene businessman, and H. E. (Chic) Swofford, Clyde real estate and insurance man, said they planned to build 40 FHA houses.

Work on the streets will start this week, Martin said. Construction on the houses will begin in approximately two weeks, he added.

The houses will be two and three bedroom structures with one bath and contain from 900 to 1,100 square feet of floor space.

Named the Oak View addition, it will cover 40 acres. It will be a restricted district with paved streets and all utilities, Martin said.

Martin believes Clyde is coming to the front as a suburban town. Several new houses have been built there he pointed out.

There is a possibility of a swimming pool being built along U. S. Highway 80 north of Clyde, Martin said.

202 Votes Polled In City Election

The voters of Baird turned out in somewhat unusual numbers Tuesday to elect three City Aldermen. Two hundred and two votes were cast in this election where normally a City Officials Election draws approximately 100 votes or less.

Two aldermen, F. E. Neel and W. C. White were up for re-election and Medford Walker was a candidate in place of W. L. Ray who did not seek re-election.

Nine write-ins received a total of 16 votes. The results of the balloting were as follows: R. E. Neel, 177; W. C. White, 186; Medford Walker, 180; Frankie Crow, 1; Ray Black, 2; Russell Warren, 2; W. L. Ray, 2; J. L. Ault, 2; Jerry Loper, 3; Jerry Loper, Sr., 1; Lowell Boyd, 2; Homer McIntosh, 1.

Arthur W. Maxcey, 67, former Abilene city policeman and resident in Abilene 19 years, died of a heart attack at 12:15 a.m. Wednesday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Funeral was held at 3 p.m. Thursday in the Kiker-Warren Funeral Chapel.

Burial was at Midway Cemetery in Jones County.

Mr. Maxcey had been in ill health, having retired from the police force on account of his health in 1950 after eight or 10 years' service.

He was a member of the I.O.O.F. and Rebekah Lodges and of the Christian church.

His wife was the former Lonnie Camp, whom he married at Eastland Feb. 5, 1936. They came to Abilene immediately and established their residence at 1342 Poplar St., where they lived ever since.

Local Polio Chapter Ready For Vaccine

The local chapter of the National Polio Foundation is making final arrangements to begin the polio vaccine shots as soon as possible, if the vaccine is licensed by the National Institute as effective on April 12.

If licensed, the vaccine will be shipped to the State Health Department at Austin. The local chapter will get the first two doses of the vaccine as soon as it is received in Austin and bring it to Callahan County. This will have to be done with the 3rd dose which follows 4 weeks later.

The vaccine has to be refrigerated until ready for use.

Soil Conservation District News

Questions are being asked about desirable grasses that may be seeded in this vicinity. Weeping Lovegrass is a grass that is finding favor with many that have used it in the past.

Weeping Lovegrass is a perennial bunch grass with long narrow drooping leaves. It is used for hay and grazing. It appears to be especially well adapted to deep, coarse, sandy soils of the area.

About one-half pound of good quality seed should be planted per acre in regular width rows. Seed should be planted in a sorghum stubble cover where there is danger of severe-blowing. A clean firm seedbed is best where blowing is not a hazard. Cover seed not more than one-half inch.

Cultivate when seeded in rows and apply nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizer after plants are established. Fertilization increases the palatability of Weeping Lovegrass.

Weeping Lovegrass should be planted after danger of frost is over and before hot dry weather arrives.

Questions and Answers

Q—I understand that veterans disabled in service after Jan. 31, 1955, may receive disability compensation at peacetime rates—80 percent of the wartime scale. Are there any conditions under which these veterans may get the full wartime rate?

A—Yes. Disabilities resulting directly from armed conflict, or from extra-hazardous service—including service under conditions simulating war—may warrant compensation payments at the full wartime rate.

Q—Has the Presidential proclamation, ending the establishment of entitlement for wartime GI benefits, had any effect on the cut-off date for starting Korean GI Bill training? I am a Korean veteran, already out of service.

A—The proclamation has no bearing on when you must begin your Korean GI training. Under the law, you still must start within three years from the date of your separation from military service.

Henry Betcher No. 1 Flippen Discovery

Operator was swabbing and testing at Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Henry Betcher, et al, Section 8, Block 6, SP Survey.

The prospective Flippen Sand discovery is located seven miles northwest of Oplin in Callahan County.

Completion is from 24 perforations from 1,780 to 1,795 feet in the Flippen, topped at 1,780 feet. During 12 hours No. 1 Betcher recovered 13 1/2 barrels of fluid, being 50 to 70 percent oil.

The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 1,860 feet. Total depth was 4,881 feet in shale. The hole was plugged-back to 1,810 feet for completion in the Flippen.

Oil flowed in 15 minutes during a drillstem test from 1,781 to 1,790 feet in the Flippen. Recovery was 250 feet of oil-cut mud, and 60 feet of salt water.

Sorrells Oil Co., et al, of Abilene and Ft. Worth No. 1 Frank Windham, S. C. Pittman Survey 237, was drilling below 3,792 feet in shale and lime. The wildcard, located 16 miles south of Baird, has a proposed depth of 4,400 feet.

Location for a Herr-King (Cross Cut) Field project was staked six miles northeast of Baird. It is Gulf Oil Corp. No. 5 R. D. Williams, et al. Permit depth applied for is 2,650 feet with rotary.

Site for No. 5 Williams is 990 feet south and 330 feet west of the northwest corner of Section 62, BOA Survey, but in Section 2, I&NO Survey.

April 15 Deadline For Car Inspection

"Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection deadline is drawing near", said Captain G. L. Morahan of the Abilene Texas Highway Patrol District office today.

The last day that a motor vehicle can be operated on the gold safety inspection sticker is April 15, 1955. The new safety inspection stickers are green and must be displayed on all vehicles by April 16, 1955.

Capt. Morahan stated that enforcement by Highway Patrolmen will start on April 16, 1955. Anyone operating a vehicle without the new Safety Inspection Sticker displayed will be subject to a fine of \$1.00 to \$200 plus court costs.

Inspection of vehicles has been moving at a rapid pace the last few weeks, but there are still a number to be inspected stated Capt. Morahan. He urged the owners of these vehicles that have not been inspected to secure their safety inspection stickers before the deadline to avoid the possibility of having to pay a fine.

Inspection stickers may be obtained at any authorized inspection station.

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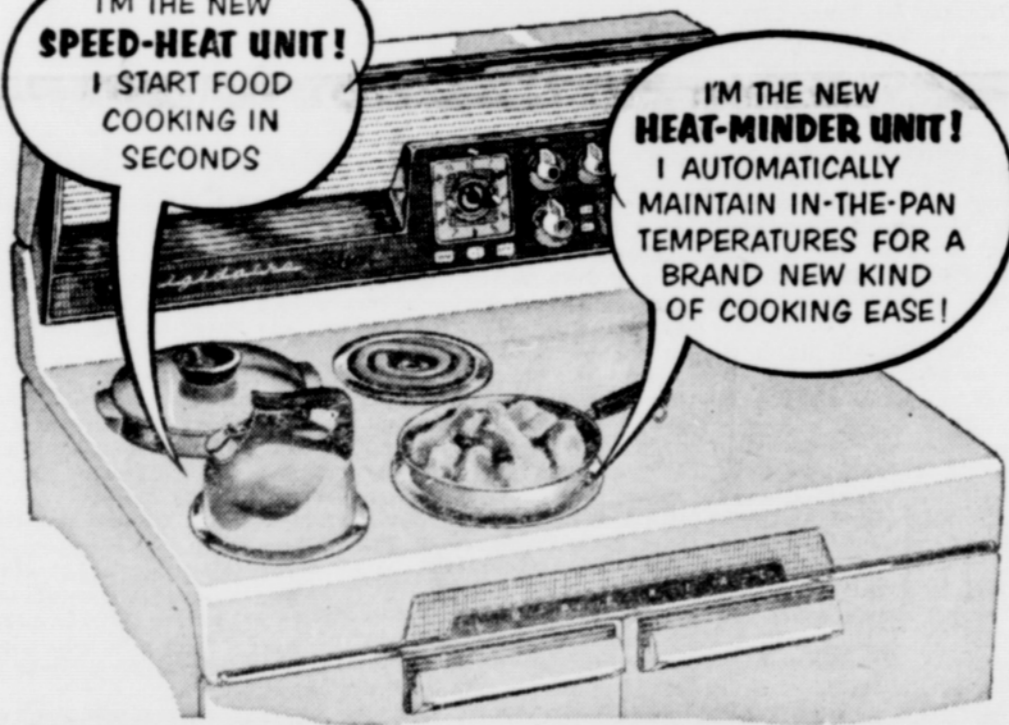
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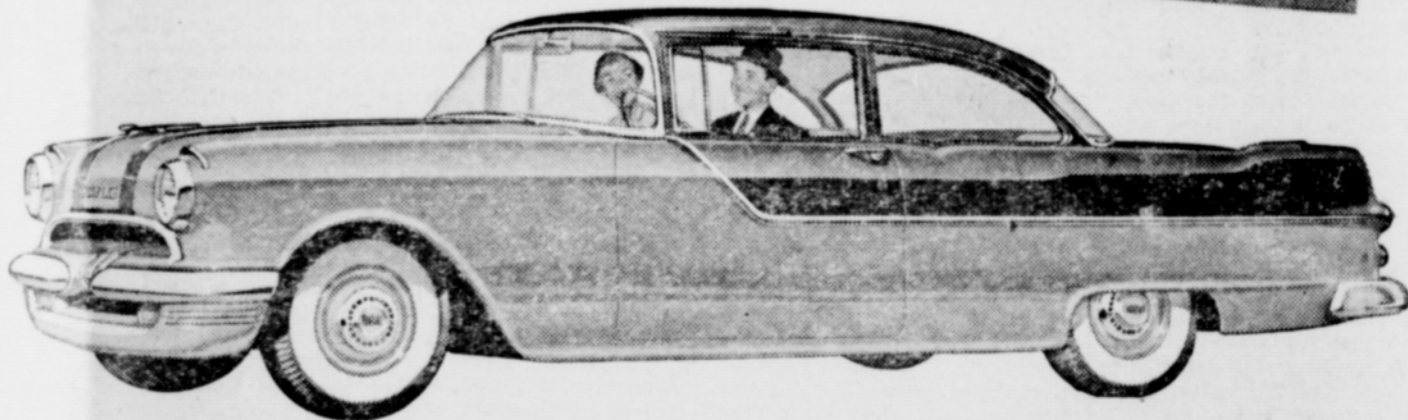

WHY BE BAPTIZED?

These are some questions that we should keep in mind as we study the subject. Notice but a few of the many scriptures on the subject of baptism.

"Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins . . ." (Acts 2:38)

"And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." (Acts 22:16)

"And he commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord . . ." (Acts 10:48)

"He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16:16)

"The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now SAVE us, (not the putting away of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God) by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 3:21)

"For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. FOR as many of you as have been baptized INTO Christ have put on Christ." (Galatians 3:26-27)

But is baptism the only thing we must do to be saved? No. The same Bible teaches that we must believe (Heb. 11:6), repent of our sins (Luke 13:3), confess Jesus as God's son (Acts 8:37), and then be baptized.

The Bible does not teach that baptism is the only thing one must do but it very definitely teaches we must be baptized to be saved. Will we accept this part of the plan of salvation? Baptism is an expression of our faith, and when we rebel at baptism we show lack of faith. Baptism then is essential to salvation because God says so, and that makes it right. Will we accept it?

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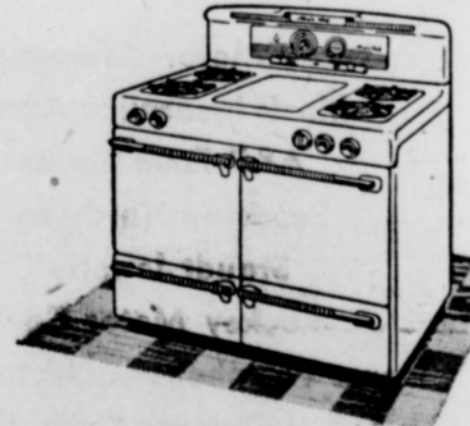

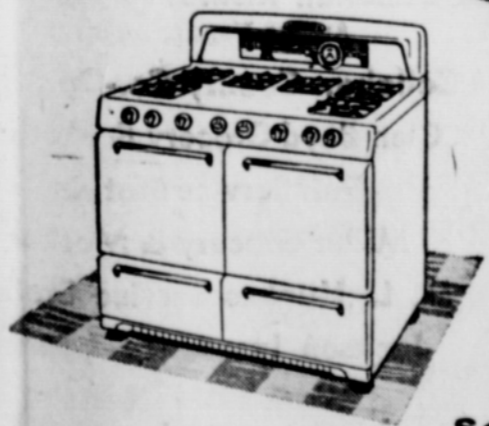

Pineapple Cream Cheese Pie
1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 Tablespoons 1/2 cup sugar
cornstarch 2 eggs
1 1/2 cups canned, 1/2 cup Fat
crushed pineapple, Evaporated Milk
undrained 1/4 cup water
3-oz. pkg. white 1/4 cup finely cut,
cream cheese unsalted nuts
1/4 teaspoon salt
Mix 1/2 cup sugar and the cornstarch in a saucepan. Stir in the pineapple. Cook and stir about 5 min., or until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and cool. Put into a bowl the cheese, salt and vanilla. Blend in gradually 1/2 cup sugar. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in milk and water. Spread cooled pineapple mixture in bottom of 9-in. pie pan lined with unbaked pastry. Pour milk mixture carefully over pineapple. Sprinkle top with nuts. Bake on rack slightly below center in 375 oven (high moderate) about 35 min., or until top is brown and custard is firm.

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
