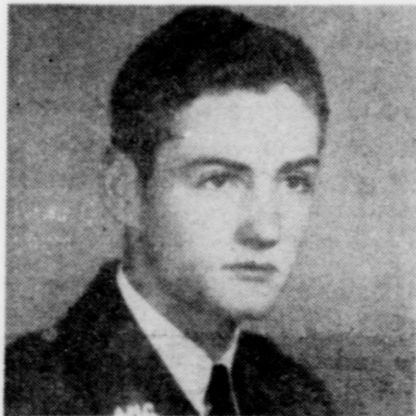

North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

George Demere completed the conservation plan on his 8 section ranch north of Water Valley last week.

Recognizing the condition of the range grasses as one of the most valuable assets which a rancher has, he plans to follow management practices which will insure a vigorous cover of the more productive grasses over his entire ranch. He plans to graze an average of 36 units per section. He plans to defer for winter use two pastures with a high percentage of overflow and deep soils which normally produce a vigorous growth of winter weeds and grasses. He has recently dug a new well and erected a mill and plans to add two or three watering places as labor and equipment permit.

Engineering surveys to be used in planning terrace systems for two cultivated fields on Preston Barker's ranch north of Water Valley were made this week reported T. A. Revell with the Soil Conservation Service.

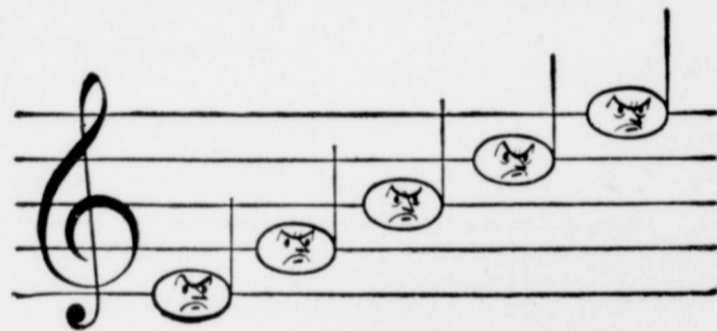

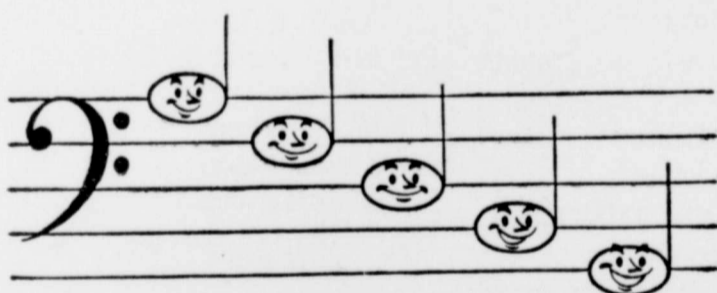
