

County Gets New Locations

R. Clay Underwood of Wichita Falls staked No. 1 Ludie Hill Owen as a 2,420-foot rotary wildcat one and a half miles southwest of Rowden.

Location spots 2,960 feet from the east and 2,300 feet from the north lines of William Wood Survey 227.

Forrest Dunlap, Jr., et al, of Dallas staked No. 1 W. B. Barton as a 1,500-foot rotary project in the regular field three miles south of Baird.

Site is 1,475 feet from the north and 2,278 feet from the west lines of Thomas Asher Survey 528.

Completed as a producer in the Herr-King (Moran) Field was Texas Gas Exploration Corp. of Houston No. 1, Tract 1, N. M. George, four miles northeast of Baird in J. Poitevent Survey 1.

Daily potential was 152.79 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus 2 per cent water, flowing through a 16/64-inch choke. Casing pressure was 500 pounds, with 200 on tubing. Flow was from 132 perforations at 2,582-2,604 feet. Total depth was 2,700 feet, with casing set at 2,660. Gas-oil ratio was 325-1.

Tom G. Donaca of Dallas completed No. 3 W. E. Kennard as a regular field pumper six miles TC&RR Survey.

Daily potential was 12.70 barrels of 33 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water. Flow was from 27 perforations at 1,514-1,517 feet. Casing was set at 1,598 feet.

Plugged at 1,013 feet was Forrest Dunlap, Jr., of Dallas No. 2 J. W. Brown, regular field project eight miles southwest of Baird in Section 1, Block 2, SP Survey.

Mobley Outlines Baird-Admiral Road

A proposed farm-to-market road from Baird to Admiral, connecting the Cottonwood-Cross Plains road was the topic of a talk by I. G. Mobley, Precinct 3 commissioner, before the Callahan County Luncheon Club.

Mobley said a route has been adopted and is now in the process of being surveyed.

The road will run from Baird east seven miles to the Premier Oil Refinery on U. S. Highway 80. It will then run south to an intersection on the Baird-Cottonwood highway. Point of intersection will be where Callahan City was once located. It will pass by the old Callahan County Cemetery.

Baird Minister Moving To Rule

The Rev. Riley Fugitt has resigned as pastor of First Baptist Church. He will go to the First Baptist Church at Rule, June 2. He has been pastor three years, 7 months, coming here from Rule. During this time there has been 328 additions to the church, 157 by letter, 171 by baptism and some awaiting baptism.

At the time of his coming there were only 12 Sunday School classes, 2 general assemblies with an average of 112 in attendance, this including the Mexican Mission. Now we have Sunday School enrollment of 402 with an average in 1954 of 211. We have 29 Sunday School classes, 6 departments and general assembly for each department. Training Union has more than doubled, so have W.M.U. and Brotherhood.

A \$35,000 Educational Building has been added and plans are being drawn for a new auditorium.

Baird To Receive New Houses

George Steakley, developer of Ross Acres Housing Addition to Baird announced this week the addition would receive further development in the immediate future. He plans to begin work on several 2 bedroom brick homes. Plans and specifications for G. I. homes will be submitted to the Veterans Administration in the next two weeks.

Mr. Steakley has just completed a housing development program in Abilene of homes of the same type of construction and floor space that he plans to build in Baird. The area is located on North 14th Street and Briarwood which lies 2 blocks west of Mockingbird Lane. Mockingbird Lane is the new road serving the new Abilene High School area.

Homes to be built in Baird can be financed through the GI or FHA program or homes can be built for specifications for individual financing. The new Abilene area is open for inspection on Saturday and Sunday of this week and the public is cordially invited to inspect these homes between the hours of 1-5 p.m. on Saturday and 3-5:30 p.m. on Sunday. Guides will be on the corner of North First and Mockingbird Lane to help the public find the houses.

A nation-wide reduction of four cents a pound on its own brands of coffee was announced today by A&P Food Stores.

These reductions, company officials said, bring premium coffee prices down to the lowest point in approximately five years. Just a year ago A&P coffee was selling for as high as \$1.17 per pound.

The new prices per pound effective in all A&P Stores Monday will be Eight O'Clock, 75c; Red Circle, 79c and Bokar, 81c. The company's own brand of A&P vacuum-packed coffee will be reduced from 89c to 85c a pound.
