

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer led quite an argument in Washington last week when he fired two prominent employees—reportedly because of loyalty checks. A Senate Committee had threatened a scale investigation of possible Communist infiltration in the Commerce Department unless these two subjects were released. The Secretary promptly ordered them out. The two involved are Michael J. Chief of the Department's Far Eastern Division, and William Remington, another Commerce employee.

The latter was under attack last week after having been named by Elizabeth Bentley, an ex-Communist, as corroborated Whittaker Chambers in exposing Alger Hiss and other government workers when they were before congressional committees. Mrs. Bentley, it will be recalled, was one of the underground couriers a few years back, having delivered secret documents from Communist workers in the government to Soviet agents. She reported that one of her sources of information in that job was Remington. However, he was eventually "cleared" of these charges by the Loyalty Board and was reinstated in his government position.

More recently, however, new disclosures have shown up and that Remington attended meetings of a CP cell with them in 1936 and 1937 when he worked for the Tennessee Valley Authority. Some witnesses claimed that one day, a former TVA employee held Communist meetings at her home which were attended by Remington. The other day the American Activities Committee subpoenaed Betty Todd to find out if this was true, but when she appeared before the committee, she refused to answer questions on the grounds that by doing so she would incriminate herself.

The upshot of this refusal to testify was that Betty Todd, an Associate Director of the Columbia Broadcasting System, was promptly fired from her job, and this along with other evidence apparently prompted Secretary Sawyer to give Remington the gate.

The second Commerce employee to be discharged, Michael J. Lee, has refused to quit and a law suit may

Youthful Burglar Caught

Neel, a one man crime wave in himself, has confessed to stealing 13 autos and breaking into 7 business establishments in recent months. Two of the cars were stolen in Howard County and one of burglaries was here and one was in San Angelo.

It will be recalled that last year, China's Nationalist Military Mission to this country bought from the Cities Service Co. and paid for in American dollars, a large quantity of aviation gasoline. When they called on Lee for an export license, he demanded details regarding ships, planes, and other uses to be made of the gasoline. The effect of this delay was to keep the Chinese Generals waiting for months until he obtained considerable data of a military nature which he could then have turned over to the Communists. After doing all that, he denied the export license.

Speaking of Communist infiltration in government, the recently published book "Seeds of Treason" has been acclaimed very widely in Washington as a fairly reliable report on the Alger Hiss-Whittaker Chambers connections and the manner in which the Communists infiltrated and obtained power and influence in the government during the depression years.

The pecan nut casebearer has just hit and all trees should be sprayed immediately with three pounds of 50% wettable DDT, eight pounds of wettable sulphur, and 2 pounds of zinc sulphate in a hundred gallons of water. Be sure and wet all of the foliage completely. If you have trouble getting your trees sprayed call my office and I can tell you those who are spraying trees in the county.

Top Kick's Re-Enlistment Vet oed By Son



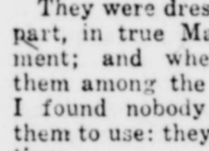

Wyckoff-Schaffer Wedding Set

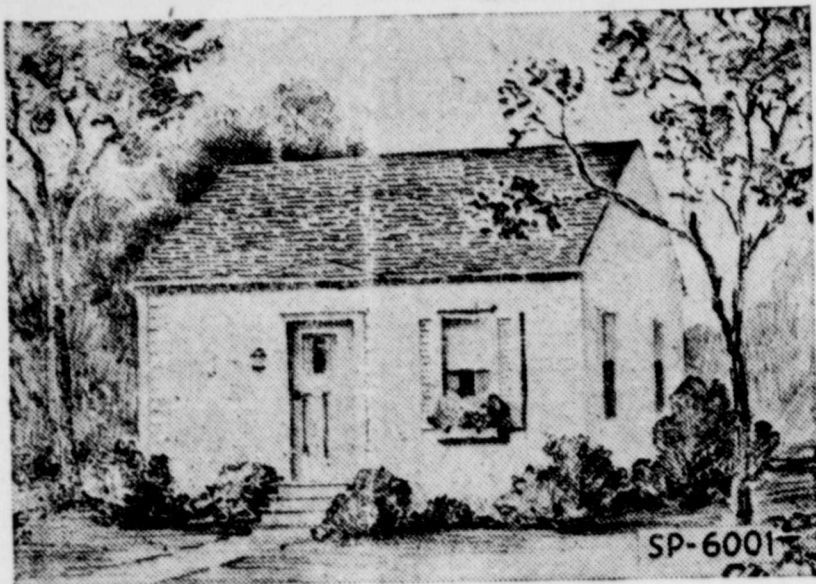

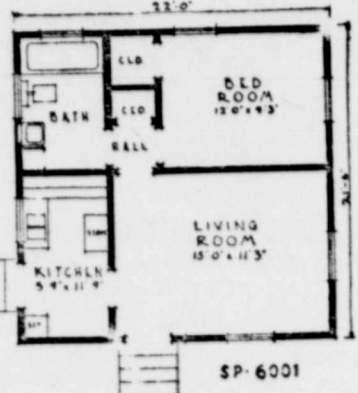
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Golden Wreath For The Bride

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Cake Intrigue



By JANE ASHLEY

Fillings and frostings add appetite appeal to every cake. Corn syrup makes such smooth delicious fillings while frostings are always light and fluffy. For "tops" in flavor and attractiveness, try these delightful corn syrup recipes.

Creamy Chocolate Cake Filling

- 1 cup milk
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 3/4 cup Karo Syrup, Red or Blue Label
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon butter or margarine
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Place milk and chocolate in top of double boiler. Place over boiling water. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary beater. Combine corn starch, corn syrup and salt. Add to chocolate mixture and cook until thickened, stirring constantly; cover and cook 10 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Stir small amount hot mixture into egg. Return to double boiler and cook 2 minutes longer. Remove from heat; add butter, vanilla. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Fluffy Frosting

- 1 1/2 cups light corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 egg whites
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

Place corn syrup in small saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until syrup boils. Then cook until syrup spins a 2-inch thread when dropped from tip of fork. Meanwhile add salt to egg whites. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Pour syrup slowly over egg whites, beating constantly until all syrup is added. Add vanilla, beating in well. Makes enough for top and sides of two 8-inch layers.

Coconut Frosting: Follow above recipe. Cool slightly. Fold in 1/2 cup shredded coconut. Frost cake. Sprinkle with an additional 1/2 cup shredded coconut, if desired.

Orange Frosting: Follow recipe for Fluffy Frosting. Omit vanilla and use 3 teaspoons grated rind.

HOME OWNERS QUESTION BOX

Q—Must old wallpaper be removed before new is applied?

A—If there is only one layer of old wallpaper and it is firmly attached, removal is not necessary. In hanging the new paper, use a minimum amount of paste. Removal of old wallpaper is necessary if there are two layers or more.

Q—Can ordinary house paint be used on a wood floor?

A—A special floor paint or enamel should be used instead. Ordinary house paint is too soft and will wear off.

Q—Cane in the seat of a chair has stretched and sags. The cane is not broken. Is there any way to tighten it?

A—Turn the chair upside down and sponge the bottom of the cane seat with hot water. Let the cane dry outdoors or in a room with good air circulation.

Q—How expensive is it to color a roof?

A—The greatest variety of roof colors, both solid and blended, is available in asphalt shingles. The color is an integral part of the material. There is no additional expense to the home owner.

Q—What kind of cleaning materials should be used to wash painted exterior sidewalls of a house?

A—Soap and water usually are sufficient. Where there is a good deal of soot in the air, it might be necessary to add a commercial paint-cleaning agent to the water. In either case, wash a small, inconspicuous area first to make sure that washing will not harm the paint. In scrubbing a wall, start at the bottom and work up.

Q—How can the surface of an electric iron be cleaned?

A—Rub it gently with the finest grade of steel wool.

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
