Left-Over Dishes

Many a wonderful treat may be made from left-over foods, touched up with the proper seasoning. Not only will such dishes please the appetite, but the saving will be appreciated by those trying to make their budget stretch to the end of the week.

Here's a recipe for that old favorite — corned beef hash. The addition of Lea & Perrins Sauce to the list of ingredients, gives a flavor you will appreciate. Have a bottle on your table, with the salt and pepper, so you may use it with many of your favorite dishes.

Corned Beef Hash

- 2 cups cold corned beef, chopped
- 2 cups cold boiled potatoes, chopped
- 1 tablespoon butter
- ½ cup milk
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce

Mix corned beef and potato. Heat butter in frying pan and turn hash into it. Stir around with a knife or spatula for a few minutes, adding more butter if necessary. Then press lightly down in pan. Over hash pour the milk mixed with Worcestershire Sauce. Cover and cook over a low fire 30 minutes. Do not stir during this time, but move the pan around so that the heat is evenly distributed. There should be a rich but not hard or scorched crust on the bottom. Fold as you would fold an omelet and turn out on a heated platter. Serve with Worcestershire Sauce.

"Covering the County"

William Foster, Billy Ralph Bynum and Garlyn O. Hoffman, attended the Beef Cattle Center dedication at A&M College last Friday and Saturday. About 500 cattlemen attended the dedication. D. D. W. Williams, vice-chancellor, dedicated the center to the betterment of livestock interests in Texas. Ray Willoughby, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Ransers Association, accepted the building. Chancellor Gilchrist outlined the large building program that A&M has underway. Dr. M. T. Harrington, newly elected president of A&M, gave the functions of the college and what it meant to the Texas people.

The beef center is the first of four units to be completed. The other units are sheep, horses and poultry. The units cost \$110,000.00 and have a classroom, 31 pens, concrete slabs, a large feed barn and mill, fenced pastures, and steel pens.

A barbecue supper was served. D. W. Williams gave an interesting talk about his trip to South America last spring. From what Mr. Williams stated, South America is a large beef producing part of the world. Some of their pastures will carry one cow for every 2 to 2½ acres, but the price of beef was only about 3½ cents per pound.

Those not attending the field day at Spur missed an interesting program. The station had results that a cleared range would produce 43% more beef per acre in a dry year than a range covered with mesquite.

What most of the people were interested in was the mesquite control. The methods of control were grubbing, cabling, root cutting, heavy cutters, and chemicals. The cost of these ranged from \$2 to \$14 per acre.

The chemicals may prove to be the most effective. At the present no recommendations has been made for a sure kill on mesquite. The most promising was 2,4,5T ester in water and oil sprayed when trees were in full foliage. Mr. Fisher stated that if the people could be patient for awhile longer, maybe they could get the answer.

Bradley Wheeler was billed on a drunk driving count. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced for five years and paroled to Tom Green County.

The Sterling City Eagles swamped the Mertzon Hornets last Friday night at Mertzon, 35-0 for the third consecutive conference win. Sterling City struck early with a 20 yard pass from Don Gann to Leroy Butler for the first touchdown. Leroy Butler made the extra point. In the second quarter a fast play from Leroy to Elroy Butler for 15 yards and a touchdown. Henry Bliznak made the extra point. With the quick pass again to Leroy going for 10 yards and going for another touchdown. Sterling missed the extra point. Two minutes before the half, when the pass play, Gann to Leroy, going for 25 yards for a touchdown. A pass, Gann to Pascal Brown, made the extra point, and brought the score to 27-0 at the half.

The Eagles started the second half with a quick opening play by Leroy Butler going for 40 yards. The play was called back and Sterling was penalized. Leroy Butler took the ball again and scored from the 25 yard line. Gann kicked the extra point making the score 35-0. The Eagles scored three more touchdowns that were called back on penalties. Leroy Butler, Charlie Davis and Don Gann were outstanding on offense. Elroy and William looked good on defense. One of the largest crowds ever to follow the Eagles from Sterling witnessed the game.

North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

There will be an election on October 17, of a supervisor for zone 2 of the North Concho River Soil Conservation District. Zone 2 of the district covers the territory north of the Concho River in Sterling County and all of Howard County that drains into the North Concho River.

Anyone who has a question as to the results of a grass planting in this area should go by Tommy Humbles' ranch and see his results. Humble made the planting last fall on an old field north of the highway on the road to Claude Collins, Jr.'s Lower Ranch.

All of the grasses are introduced except blue grama. They are Lehman's lovegrass, sand lovegrass, and K.R. bluestem.

Last week all grasses were in good shape, the K. R. bluestem being up to 4 feet high from clumps 1 to 1½ feet across. The blue grama has made good growth and there is an even stand of it. There is more Lehman's lovegrass than sand lovegrass, but both are very vigorous with very abundant seed.

Two dams were completed last month. One was on Riley King's ranch and the other on Lester Foster's Home Ranch.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Here's a fact about the recent cigarette price boost that is receiving congressional attention.

The Marshall Plan has just given 1,050 metric tons of tobacco valued at \$1,600,000 to France; 4,640 tons valued at \$6,674,000 to Ireland, according to ECA Bulletin No. 1696. Tobacco gifts out of Marshall Plan expenditure of \$10 billion now total \$349,500,000.

Many Congressmen privately say, if they had known American tax dollars would be used to give luxuries such as tobacco and swank hotels to Europe, instead of the necessities to prevent starvation, they would have never voted for the Marshall Plan.

The gift of tobacco to Ireland seems to especially rankle. Many Congressmen share Winston Churchill's viewpoint that Ireland's refusal to let the Allies use her ports caused a great loss of life and cargoes in World War II.

Congressional decision to do nothing in an election year to revise corporation taxes upwards to meet defense needs apparently dooms all chance of cuts in the wartime excise taxes. Therefore, the 20% tax on baby powder; baby oils, will continue.

Says one solon, "my colleagues feel irritated babies may cry, but they won't vote for at least 20 years, while we must avoid irritating big campaign contributors whose donations are needed now."

at Frantschach, Austria, for modern machinery.

This company is the only paper mill in Austria . . . therefore, a monopoly. Lack of capital over the years eliminated independent American paper producers; eliminated competitive newsprint prices. Hence the protests over this latest ECA action by independent American publishers.

From California reports are pouring into Washington of alleged profiteering that may set in motion a full scale investigation of the California oil industry, which is closely held and controlled by a few large combines to the virtual exclusion of independent concerns.

While the Department of Defense, since the start of the Korean War, is paying 8% more for needed supplies, on the West Coast, the government is paying 54.5% more for fuel oil, 12.4% more for gasoline, than paid in April . . . this means independent business must assume a still greater tax burden.

At the same time, a leading California broker specializing in oil stocks, released a report stating prior to Korea the California oil industry was plagued with a surplus of heavy fuel oil.

Now, the report states, the average daily refining of crude has jumped from 892 thousand barrels to 975 thousand barrels; crude oil inventories in California have dropped 2 million barrels.

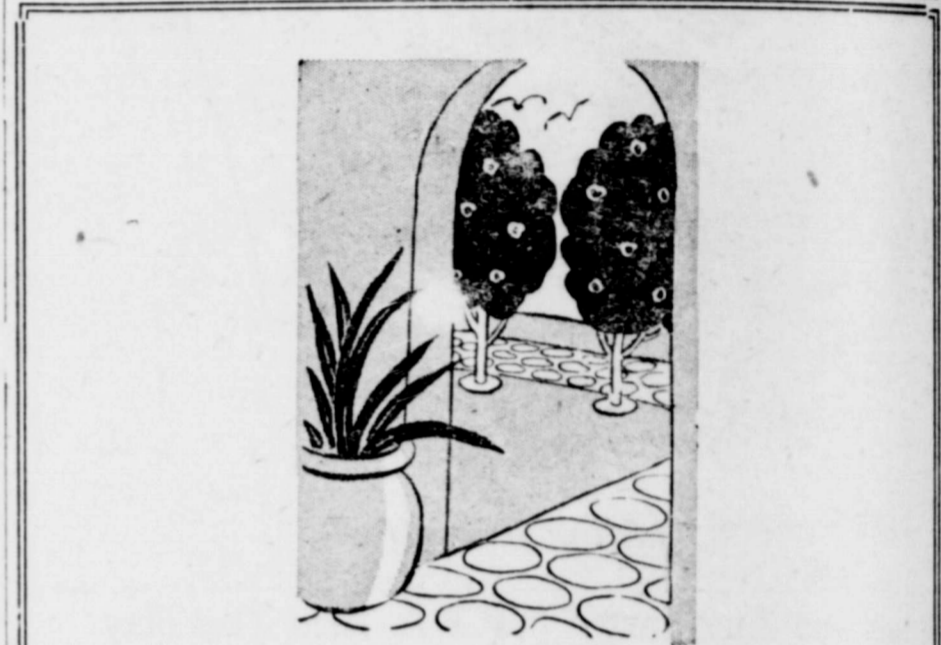

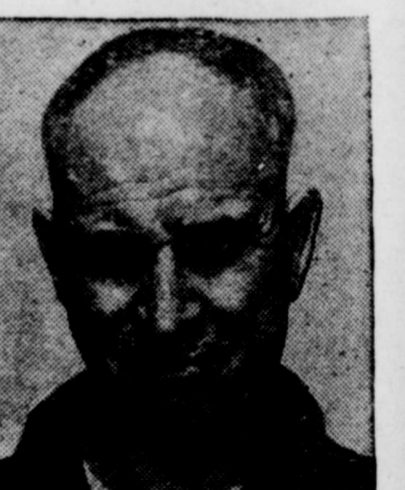

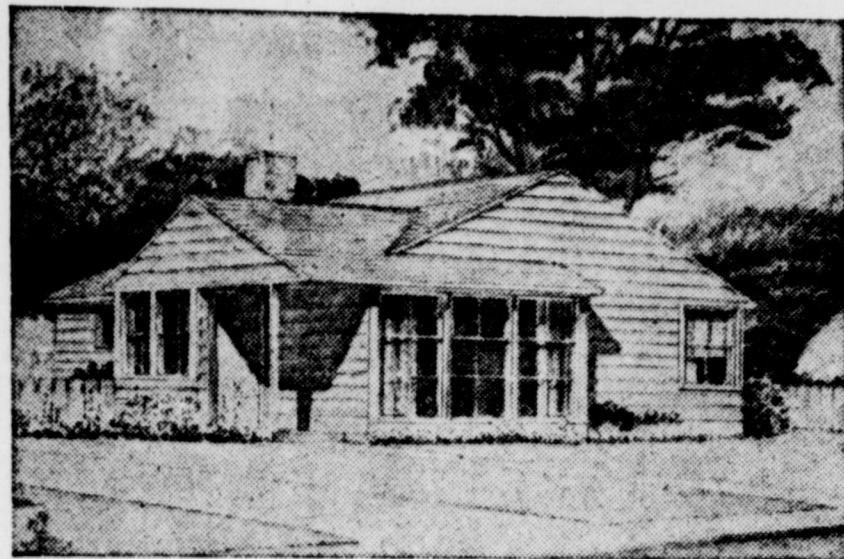

Exterior Lines Agreeable



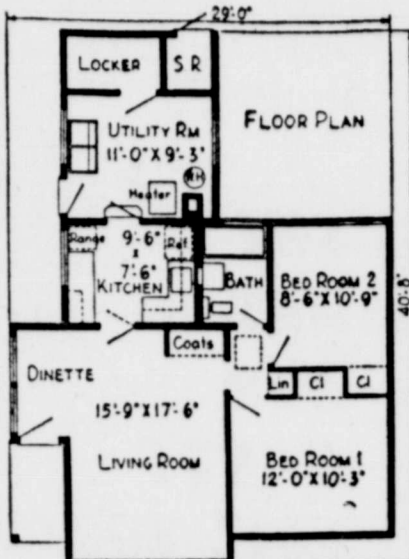
Imaginative treatment of the exterior of this house led to its being selected as Plan No. 202 by American Builder magazine, 30 Church St., New York.

The roof line is the principal distinguishing mark, making the house appear different from most other dwellings in the moderate-price class. The two roof sections differ in height, deliberately increasing the informal atmosphere of the house. The lower section, the ell, covers the entrance way and part of the dinette and living room.

Window area is generous, in keeping with contemporary architectural preferences. However, because most windows are grouped together or placed at corners, the rooms retain ample wall space for furniture.

The two bedrooms and bath are arranged around a small, central hallway. A linen closet opens on the hallway, too. A special coat closet in a corner of the living room is an extra convenience.

The dwelling has no basement. A utility room with more than 100 square feet of floor area is provided for heating plant, water heater and laundry. A storage



locker opens off the utility room. A small storage room opening to the outside is intended for lawn mower, hose and garden tools.

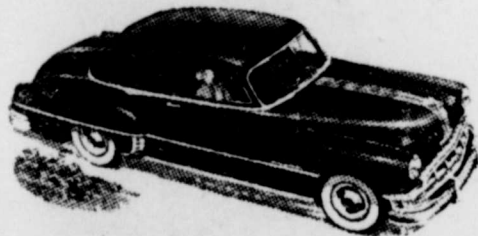

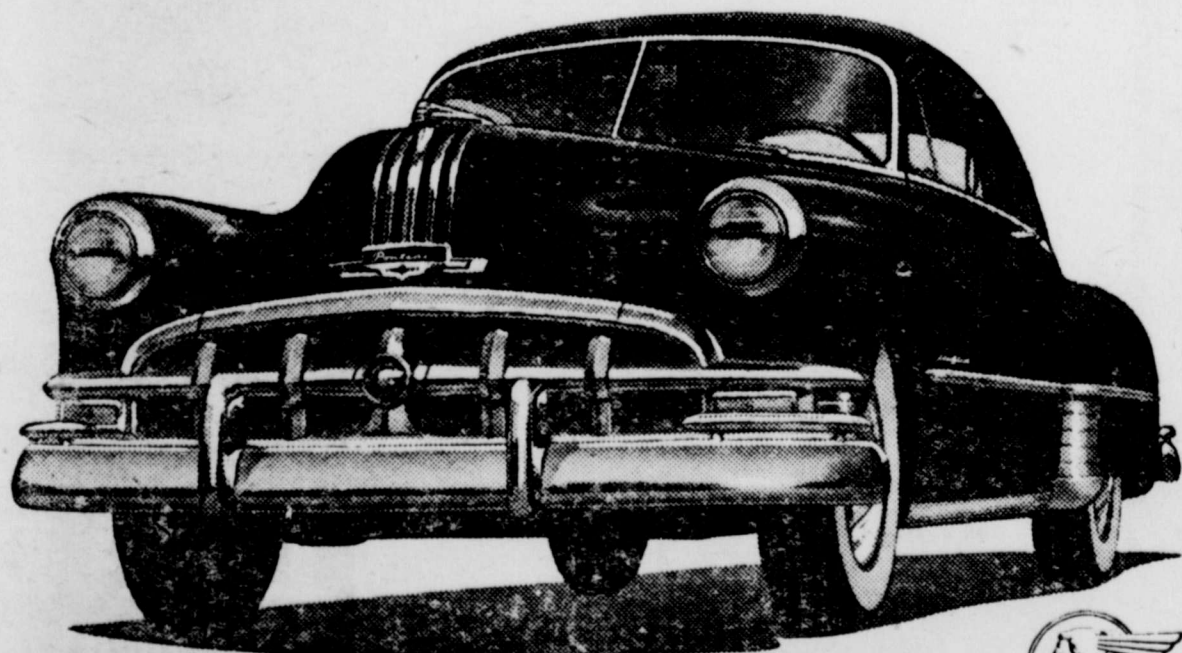

To me, the weather is nearly as important as the engine in my plane. Next to a sudden, disheartening silence from up front, the worst thing I can imagine happening to a pilot is to find himself locked up in bad weather without a fix on his position.

Fighter planes don't carry navigators. The pilot is the whole

works. Under these conditions a guy can get pretty busy. That, of course, is his job, and just one of my private worries.

However, not all flyers are military pilots. Civilians can get

snafued by weather, too. It has no favorites. When the weather socks in, it takes all comers.

My hobby started because I got tired of being lost. But I see now there was no need to have waited so long. Figuring out what the skies are going to look like tomorrow is kind of fun. Not too hard, either. All you have to have in the way of equipment is a weather map, a sky to look at, a radio which gives out with the humidity and barometric pressure, and a mellow Dutch Master Cigar to smoke while you're making with the brainwork.

Generally, all weather travels from West to East. There are local exceptions, naturally. That hurricane route that runs up the Florida Coast, for instance, moves from South to North.

There are just a few rules to learn for forecasting. Rain is basically caused by heat. Here's a little example: there are clear skies, hot and humid. You look out the window and don't see a single cloud. You know it can't rain without clouds, so you decide to go on a picnic. Don't.

Why? Easy. All this heat beating on the ground causes up-currents. The rising air is moist and when it reaches higher altitudes it condenses. And that's what a cloud is—a collection of water. Before you could start your car for the picnic, chances are you'd have to go back for your umbrella. If it's hot and humid, look out.

Personally, I've given up picnics on nice days. I go in the fog.

Washington, D. C. — Military demands for more manpower have stirred up a bureaucratic feud here in the nation's capitol.

You or members of your family may be caught up in it. The dispute revolves around what to do about military reservists and National Guardsmen who are doing civilian work important for defense.

So far, Defense Secretary Louis Johnson is being "tough" about deferments. He's laid down the

rule that a man called up to active duty can be deferred only for six months at a time. And that period is supposed to be used finding a replacement for him. One trouble is that the military wants, in many instances, the same kind of workers that are needed by industry. Secretary of Labor Tobin and Secretary of Commerce Sawyer both think a lot of civilian occupations are just as important to the defense effort as men in uniform.

Profound thinking must have gone into a Department of Defense treatise on deferment policy. The Pentagon Planners must have rubbed a lot of Mustelore Lintiment on their mental muscles while pondering which groups of workers they ought to study. And they came up with the idea they should consider the problem of two "broad categories" of workers:

1. Those employees who are not military reservists; and
2. Those employees who are military reservists.

One brass hat admitted sheepishly he guessed that just about covered everybody. You might wonder if it isn't an awful waste of time to have military men producing that kind of gobbledegook. But a friend of mine comments, "It's better to have that type of mind working on something harmless than on something important."

Regarding "key" men, the masterminds observed: "Some 'key' positions should be considered 'more key' than others and therefore 'key' positions should be classified according to their degree of 'keyness'."

All of which leads one to wonder if somebody doesn't belong under lock and key.

Left-Over Dishes

Many a wonderful treat may be made from left-over foods, touched up with the proper seasoning. Not only will such dishes please the appetite, but the saving will be appreciated by those trying to make their budget stretch to the end of the week.

Here's a recipe for that old favorite — corned beef hash. The addition of Lea & Perrins Sauce to the list of ingredients, gives a flavor you will appreciate. Have a bottle on your table, with the salt and pepper, so you may use it with many of your favorite dishes.

Corned Beef Hash

- 2 cups cold corned beef, chopped
- 2 cups cold boiled potatoes, chopped

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce

Mix corned beef and potato. Heat butter in frying pan and turn hash into it. Stir around with a knife or spatula for a few minutes, adding more butter if necessary. Then press lightly down in pan. Over hash pour the milk mixed with Worcestershire Sauce. Cover and cook over a low fire 30 minutes. Do not stir during this time, but move the pan around so that the heat is evenly distributed. There should be a rich but not hard or scorched crust on the bottom. Fold as you would fold an omelet and turn out on a heated platter. Serve with Worcestershire Sauce.

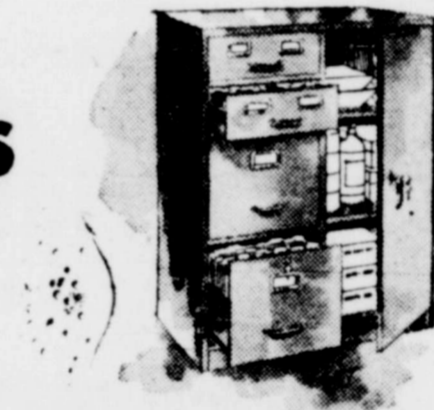
