Special Election To Be Held Next Tuesday

Five Amendments; Representative Place to Be Filled

There will be a special election over the state on Tuesday, November 13. The primary purpose of the election is the submission of five amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas. Here in the 91st Legislative District, we will select a successor to R.E. (Peppy) Blount, who resigned to become an assistant football coach at Texas University. There are three men in the race.

The three men in the race for state representative are all from San Angelo. William E. Davenport, an attorney, and W. A. (Bill) Stroman, ex-attorney and abstract man, are in the race as is young Jerry Johnson, a Naval veteran, who is seeking the post. No doubt the vote will be somewhat close, due to all three candidates being from the same city.

One of the proposed amendments would let the Board of Regents of Texas University invest part (up to half) of the Permanent University fund in common stocks and bonds of commercial companies or corporations. Now the board is limited to investing the fund in only bonds of the State of Texas and political subdivisions, such as counties, cities, schools, road bonds, etc. The backers of the amendment argue that a larger net return would result. Not too much stock could be taken in any one company, and such companies would have to have paid a dividend for ten years previous to the buying of such stock.

Another proposed amendment is a re-submission of the once defeated amendment allowing counties to set up a retirement pension plan for appointive workers of the various counties. This amendment was submitted once before and was defeated.

Another proposed amendment is the issue of letting rural communities form a rural fire prevention district and levy taxes for the upkeep thereof. Such a tax would be kept at a minimum of 50c on the \$100 valuation, according to the proposed amendment.

Of course there is one dealing with old age pensions. This proposed amendment would lift the \$35 million dollar ceiling on the yearly payments by the state to \$42 million. Also it would make the list of people receiving pensions be open more publicly and denying aid if a recipient gives his property to a son or daughter or anyone, in order

The fifth amendment proposed is one to raise the amount of money in the Veteran's Land Bank setup from \$25 million to \$100 million. This money is used for buying up land to resell to Texas veterans of the wars or to loan them to buy the land with.

On November 10 there will be a tour of all 4-H lambs now on feed. The tour will leave the court house at 8:00 Saturday morning, then again from the courthouse at 1:30 p.m.

Approximately 110 lambs will be seen during the day. All of the boys will have available at their pens the figures which show how their lambs have gained during the first part of the feeding period.

The purpose of this tour is to acquaint everyone with the fact that the club boys are doing a good job of feeding very good quality lambs.

The public is invited to attend this tour. It will be possible to attend either the morning tour or both. The route to be followed is as follows:

MORNING—
Garden City Road
Big Spring Road
Colorado City Road

AFTERNOON—
Robert Lee Road
Town Lambs
Big Lake Road.

Posted on each barn will be found a chart showing the weighing dates, individual lamb weights, the total and average daily gains between weighing periods. The feeders will be on hand to answer any questions which they can answer.

On the tour, some 21 stops will be made by the group to inspect the lambs. At the News-Record office there may be found a list of the stops in the proper order so it will be possible for anyone to join the tour if it is impossible to start at the beginning.

I would like to urge all who can to attend this tour. Let's get behind these boys and show our interest in their effort.

NAMED COLLEGE RODEO OFFICIAL

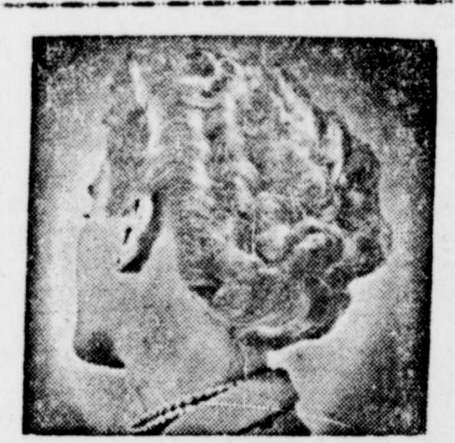

More About Mental Breakdowns

Many mental "breakdowns" are strictly mental, that is without any physical changes anywhere in the body. But there are other mental disorders which stem actually from physical changes that are reflected in the capacity of the mind to maintain the proper level of thought processes.

Some mental disorders result from faulty formation of the brain structure, some result from alterations in the brain structure, and some result from improper function of other parts of the body which in turn affect the function of the brain.

Mental deficient are those born without the proper "ingredients" for the full development of the mind. These persons, also called feeble-minded, remain "childish" all their lives, never achieving independence. There are three degrees of feeble-mindedness: idiocy, imbecility, and moronity. The idiot, often speechless and helpless, unable to guard himself against common physical dangers, remains an infant capable of accomplishing only such things as a three-year-old child might achieve. The imbecile may grow mentally only as far as the pre-school child, from 3 to 7 years of age, usually learning to talk and to perform very simple tasks such as the normal child of that age group can do. The moron, while still a "child," may be taught many of the things that a 7 to 12 year old child but fails to apply his learning in an intelligent way.

With mentally deficient individ-

uals the mind just stops developing at the age levels mentioned above. Like children, they remain always in a "self world," never replacing or adjusting that "self" in association with others or with life situations. When people and problems come in contact with them, they become confused and react in a number of different ways, nearly always extravagantly.

This can best be explained by the examples of emotions or general changes which affect the whole mind, in both normal and abnormal people. Excitement, depression, apathy, sleep walking, loss of memory, hallucinations, delusions of grandeur, or persecution, obsessions of fear and suspicions are all "feelings" which affect all parts of the mind. In mental deficient or persons with mental disorders of many types these "feelings" are greatly exaggerated with excitement becoming a wild, abandoned excitement; with depression becoming an extreme of misery; with apathy becoming a complete blankness of feeling without any excitement or depression, etc.

Any one or all of these feelings may be the predominant characteristic of a mental deficient; he may swing rapidly from one to the other extreme but it will be an extreme of each feeling. The mental deficient has the instincts of the normal person but none of the restraints of mature mental attitudes.

Dementia is the name applied to those mental changes or deteriorations that occur during life. The best example, perhaps, is senile dementia, in which the structure of the brain undergoes changes that replace the world of other people and the world of situations with only that world of self.

It is interesting to note that sometimes the aged person who actually shows the most extreme changes in the physical structure of the brain maintains the reality of the other worlds and his relation to them. On the other hand, some aged persons who show slight deterioration of the physical structure of the brain will retire completely into that "one world," the self world of "childishness."

So obviously, once the mind has achieved mature development, it takes more than physical changes of the brain to cause deterioration. Each person's adjustment to the world during his active life has a definite bearing upon his capacity to remain mentally healthy when the aging process changes the structure of the brain.

The mental changes associated with old age may be a reflection

of physical changes in the body other than in the brain which in turn affect the mind. Improper function of parts of the body may, at any time of life, create changes in the mental processes, just as injuries and illnesses may cause brain changes.

Your doctor is aware of the many illnesses and injuries which have a direct bearing upon mental processes. The nervous system itself, carrying messages to and from the brain, is intricately involved in mental health and the neurologist is the medical doctor who is versed in the study of the nervous system; frequently your doctor will call in a specialist in neurology or psychiatry to help trace the origin of some mental disorder.

The first search in medical treatment of mental ill health of any kind is to see if there is some physical stumbling block which may be the cause or a contributing factor to a lack of mental coordination. If a physical cause can be located, and can be diagnosed as the first source of the difficulty, then that original cause must be treated as well as restraining the other functions of the body which were diverted from their proper function by that first stumbling block. And it stands to reason that the earlier the physical defect is found and retraining undertaken, the more hopeful is the outlook.

Many mental illnesses seem to be purely mental, however, without any sign of physical involvement. Here the psychiatrist and the psychoanalyst are the specialists who have been trained to help you discover and overcome the first mental stumbling block that is keeping your mental processes from coordinating as they were meant to do.
