## Mailing Tips COOPERATION OF THE PUBLIC IN PREPARING CHRISTMAS MAIL

It is highly essential that the public cooperate with the postal service in the preparation of their Christmas greeting cards and gift parcels in order to facilitate their expeditious handling and avoid unnecessary delay and disappointment. The manner in which requests for such cooperation have been responded to in the past has been gratifying indeed. Perhaps the following information will be of some value to mailers in guiding them on matters concerning postage, addresses, limit of size, weight, etc.

**POSTAGE**—Save time by purchasing an adequate supply of stamps in advance of the rush period. Prepay postage fully on all mail.

**ADDRESSES**—All mail matter must be plainly and completely addressed, preferably in ink, giving street address, including apartment number, if any, or post office box or rural route, and rural box number whenever possible. Mail intended for delivery in the larger cities should be addressed to include the delivery zone number when applicable. It is important that the sender's return card appear in the upper left corner of the address side. Address tags should not be used unless absolutely necessary, in which cases a slip containing the name and address of the sender and name and address of the addressee should be placed inside the parcel for purpose of identification, if necessary. Address labels and tags should be free of any extraneous written or printed matter.

**GREETING CARDS**—Send holiday greetings as **FIRST-CLASS** mail to obtain the many advantages which this service affords. Such greetings prepaid at the first-class rate may be sealed and contain written messages; they are dispatched and delivered first; forwarded, if necessary, without additional charge, and if undeliverable are returned at no further expense to the mailer provided the sender's return address is shown on the envelope.

Unsealed Christmas greetings sent as third-class mail without unauthorized writing enclosed are chargeable with 2 cents postage (if weight does not exceed 2 ounces). However, a minimum charge of 3 cents is applicable to such greetings which measure less than 4 inches long or 2 3/4 inches wide.

Patrons having a number of greeting cards are urged to tie them in bundles with addresses all faced one way before mailing so as to facilitate their handling in the post office.

**PACKING AND WRAPPING**—Pack articles carefully and tightly in strong, durable containers. Wrap and tie packages securely with good quality paper and cord, but do not seal them unless name and address of sender are shown together with the printed description reading, "Contents, Merchandise—Postmaster; This parcel may be opened for Postal Inspection, if necessary", as sealed parcels not so labeled or endorsed are subject to the letter rate of postage. The name and address of the sender may be hand-stamped or typewritten on the labels.

**LIMIT OF SIZE**—Parcels sent by air or as fourth-class matter are limited to a maximum of 100 inches length and girth combined.

**LIMIT OF WEIGHT**—The limit of weight of first and fourth class mail, including air parcel post, is 70 pounds.

**PERMISSIBLE ADDITIONS & ENCLOSURES**—To encourage early mailing, senders are permitted to mark parcels "Please Do Not Open Until Christmas." In addition, written salutations, such as "Merry Christmas", "Happy New Year", "With Best Wishes" as well as symbols, etc. for the purpose of description, may be enclosed with third or fourth class mail. A simple dedicatory inscription not of a personal nature may be written in books but other unauthorized written additions subject parcels to the letter rate of postage.

sages, no matter how brief, in parcels, as so doing would subject the entire parcel to the letter rate.

Communications enclosed in envelopes prepaid at the letter rate may be securely fastened to the outside of parcels sent at the third or fourth class rate.

**PERISHABLE MATTER**—Articles likely to spoil within the time reasonably required for transportation and delivery are not acceptable for mailing. Parcels containing perishable articles must be endorsed by the sender directly above the name of the sender.

**SPECIAL FEATURES**—For those mailers who may wish to expedite handling and delivery of their cards or gifts, there are the air mail, special delivery, and special handling services. Upon payment of the proper special delivery fee, in addition to postage, mail matter of any class is entitled to the most expeditious handling and transportation practicable, as well as prompt delivery by special messenger at the office of address. The special handling service is provided for fourth-class mail (parcel post) only, and provides the most expeditious handling and transportation practicable but not special delivery at office of address.

Christmas gifts should be registered or insured. Parcels containing small articles of considerable value, such as watches and other articles of jewelry, etc., should always be registered. Other packages should be insured according to the value.

Your local post office force will do all that is possible to help you with your mailing problems, and it will be our pleasure to give our very best services to our patrons during the approaching holiday season.

## HEALTH TALKS

Prepared by the Texas Medical Association

Between the states of behavior known as mental health and mental illness there are classifications which are a combination of both, in which a person on some phases of life is quite normal, quite healthy, and on other features behaves poorly.

The psychopathic personality is not all mentally healthy nor all mentally unhealthy. In many phases of life the psychopath behaves quite normally, and even in the same situation he does not always behave the same way. He is usually more against people and situations than he is for them and the broadest definition of a psychopath is an antisocial person.

He's the kind of person who may know the rules of the game of life but refuses to apply them to himself. He is morally irresponsible, not because he doesn't know what morals are but because he fails to make them a part of his life. The extremes of psychopathic personalities usually include such people as the sexual perverts, the alcoholics, the dope addicts, the kleptomaniacs, those who constantly start fires, and the "lone wolf" criminal. There are less serious characteristics of psychopathy, too, such people as the oversensitive, the unpredictable, the cranks, the moody, the sourpusses, and the stuffed shirts. The person who refuses to assume independence, who enjoys the dependence of relief and charity, any one who forces himself into the life of others either by brute force or by complete dependence may fall into the broadest definition of psychopathic personality.

How does a person get to be a psychopathic? It is possible that some people might be born without the capacity to learn right from wrong, though developing normally in other ways. It is possible that a rough part of town where everyone is out to get whatever he can by fair means or foul would breed children who assumed that same "survival of the fittest" philosophy. It is possible that home abuse or neglect in training would keep a child from ever seeing anything good to model his actions on. It is more probable, however, that a combination of all of these, heredity, environment and home training, with emphasis on the home, play a part in the development of an antisocial personality.

All children go through a phase when they must have their way, punishment or not. When an adult has no regard for anyone or anything besides his own desires, his own aims, he has failed to develop beyond a normal childhood state and would quite likely fall into the category of psychopathic personality. Mental health is adjustment to oneself, one's fellowman, and one's role in life; the psychopath usually fails to adjust to his fellowman.

1 can (12 ounces) spiced ham, cubed; 2 tablespoons chopped onion; 2 tablespoons butter; 1 1/2 tablespoons flour; 2 cups milk; 1 cup cooked peas; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon pepper; 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.  
Combine rice, water, and 1/2 teaspoon salt in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, uncovered, fluffing rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes.  
Sauté cubed ham and onion in the butter until golden brown. Add flour and mix well. Then add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook and stir over medium heat until smooth and thickened. Add rice, peas, and seasonings and heat thoroughly. Makes 4 servings.

**Brownies Put On Party Dress**

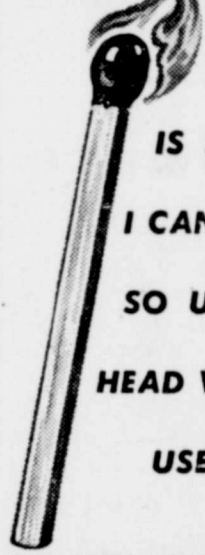

NO cookie enjoys greater popularity than Brownies. However, here are Brownies with a difference. For along with the usual rich chocolate-nut flavor combination, these Brownies have donned a party dress—frosting in swirls or rosettes, to make these little dessert squares worthy of some special occasion. Serve them when Aunt Jane comes for dinner, as bridge club sweets, or when you want to give your family an extra-yummy dessert. Then sit back and enjoy the compliments that are bound to follow after the first mouth-watering bite.

**Tea Brownies**  
 ½ cup sifted flour; ½ teaspoon double-acting baking powder; ½ teaspoon salt; ½ cup butter or other shortening; 2 squares unsweetened chocolate; 1 cup sugar; 2 eggs, well-beaten; ½ cup broken walnut meats; 1 teaspoon vanilla Butter Frosting.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Measure shortening and chocolate over boiling water. Add sugar gradually to egg-beating thoroughly. Add chocolate mixture and blend. Add flour and mix well; then add nuts and vanilla. Bake in greased 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 minutes, or until done. Cut in 1-inch squares. Remove from pan and cool on cake rack. Swirl butter frosting on top, or force frosting through pastry tube to make a rosette on each square. Makes 2 dozen small brownies.
