TRUCK DRIVER MEETS INSTANT DEATH

Doyle Ray Bailey, 20, of Stephenville was instantly killed when his truck crashed near Bob's Creek Tuesday night. He had gone to sleep and ran off the road. The truck was crashed and wrecked as badly as one could be. The accident occurred at 2 a.m. Tuesday.

A Lowe ambulance brought the body in and later a Stephenville ambulance came for the victim. The Higginbotham ambulance took his body to Stephenville, where the funeral services will be held.

A single man, Bailey is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ruth Bailey of Stephenville, and three brothers, John A., Kenneth and Quinton.

The victim was employed by Jack Moreland Trucking Co. of San Angelo.

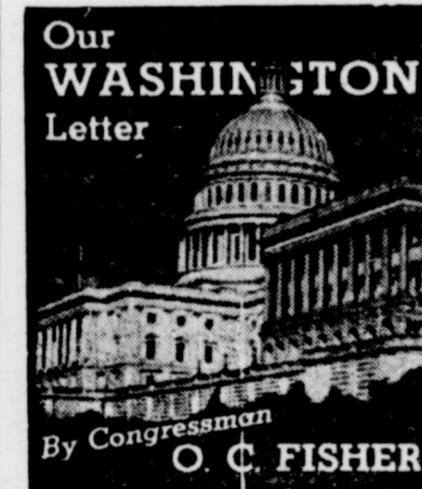

OF MAJOR PUBLIC CONCERN is the new wage boost the President's Wage Stabilization Board recommended last week for the steelworkers. It would be the biggest single government-supported wage raise in history, and it came at a time after the consumer cost-of-living index had dropped two cents the preceding month.

The steelworkers now get an average of \$2 per hour along with other benefits. The new hike, if it goes through, will add an immediate 18 cents, and an additional 8 cents by next January 1. Other benefits figured in the WSB formula, along with a recommendation for a forced union shop, regardless of the bargaining agreements between the steel companies and the unions. The steelworkers have had five raises in the past five years.

Now, all of this can have serious repercussions upon the public, as I see it. The entire public becomes involved. Your taxes are effected. The purchasing power of your dollar may be lowered. What you pay for a spool of barbed wire, a cook stove, a hay bailer, or a tractor, will be higher. Because steel is a basic industry and a jump in steel prices is reflected all down the line when you go to the store and buy any kind of hardware.

It seems unfortunate that Phil Murray, the Big Boss of the Steelworkers, would blind himself to the far-reaching effects of this action. It seems even more unfortunate that the government would be a party to it. A moderate increase or adjustment of differences might have been justified. The big steel companies said if the Government had kept out of the picture, they could have done business with Murray and made an acceptable agreement. But sustained by the influence of the Government itself, Murray seems to be determined to take full advantage of the situation. After all, now, if the big steel companies balk, and a strike takes place, Murray can say: "You see, they won't even do what the United States Government asks them to do."

Uncle Sam may lose heavily in taxes, too. The Treasury expects

HEALTH TALKS

If your doctor asked you "How does your garden grow?" instead of "How are you feeling?", you might think him a little childish. But the development of your health is very similar to the development of a garden.

You are made up of three things, fluids, gases and solids. These three substances are constantly undergoing change, getting used up, being replaced, and having the waste eliminated. Like a garden of many plants, you are a hodgepodge of seeds, the solids of your body. Like the garden, those seeds must have air and water in order to reach full bloom. Like the garden, when the blooms have died, there must be air and water in your body to remove the dead parts and salvage the seeds that can be used again.

Air is essentially a gas and most of the fluids of the body are comparable to water. Air serves not only to feed oxygen to the seeds scattered in all parts of the body but as gas may be considered a fuel that provides the heat which the body needs to cultivate its seeds. Heat is also supplied by calories in

to collect about \$28 billion in taxes from corporations in the coming fiscal year. But the wage hike will cut into that, and a considerable share of the proposed new wage increase will likely be taken from what would otherwise have gone to the government in taxes. It is estimated that this action may mean as much as \$11 billion in less taxes from corporations.

Moreover, John L. Lewis has never let Phil Murray out-do him when it comes to wage increases. And he will be scowling across the bargaining table again in the near future. Now, what will he demand? A new pattern of general increases is threatened.

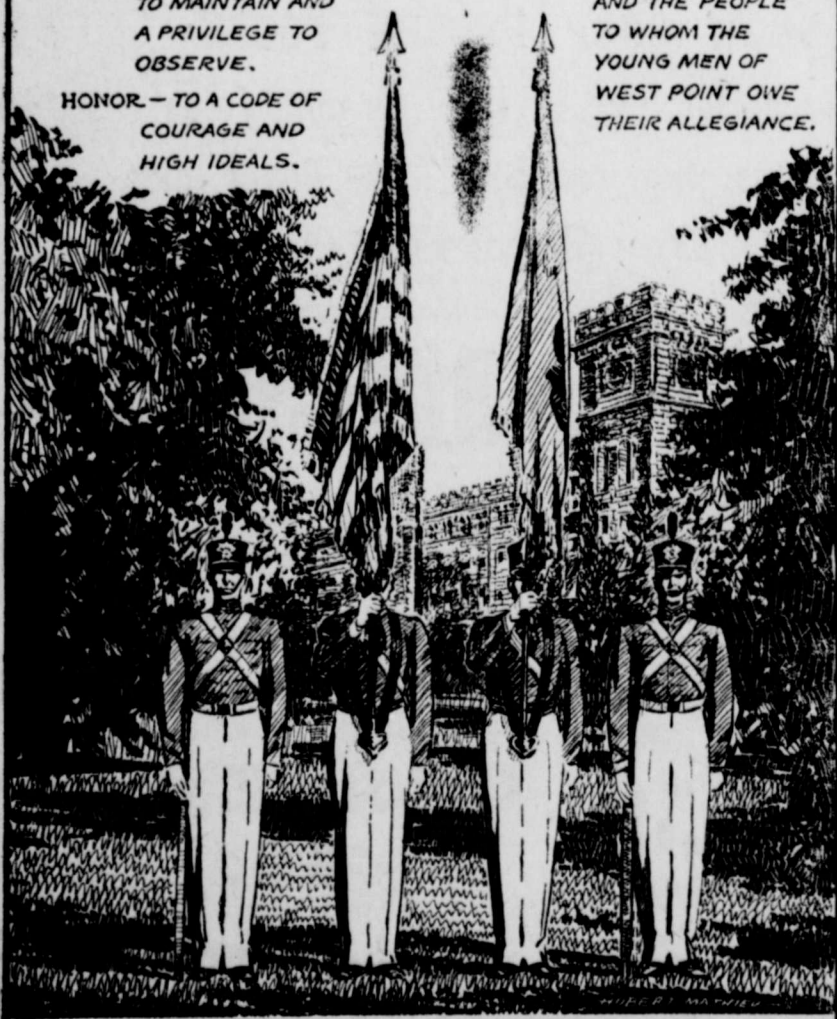

Spring In A Pie Shell PIE OF THE MONTH

If there are strawberries on your table, spring is here! There is no surer harbinger of spring—nor any more welcome—than lovely, plump, red strawberries. If, like one of Mother Goose's heroines, you prefer to feed upon just plain "strawberries, sugar and cream," nobody will challenge your choice—never was there a finer dessert. But if, on the other hand, you will venture to use them in this Coconut Strawberry Pie, you will not regret it. Creamy vanilla filling with juicy fat strawberries added, and fluffy meringue topped with lacy coconut and additional strawberries, tender flaky pastry! Put them all together and there you have Spring in a Pie Shell!

Coconut Strawberry Pie
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup sifted flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 3 cups milk
 1 cup shredded coconut, cut, if desired
 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 2 teaspoons vanilla
 1 tablespoon butter
 1 pint strawberries, cut in halves
 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
 2 egg whites, unbeaten
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoons water
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup shredded coconut

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, flour, and salt in top of double boiler; add milk gradually, stirring until smooth. Add 1 cup coconut. Cook over rapidly boiling water 15 minutes, stirring constantly. Mix small amount of mixture with egg yolks, return to double boiler, and cook 2 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and butter. Cool. Place 1 cup of berries in pie shell; then add filling.

Place egg whites, sugar, salt, and water in top of double boiler; beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat 1 minute; then remove from heat and continue beating 2 minutes, or until mixture will stand in peaks. Add vanilla. Pile lightly on filling. Sprinkle with coconut and garnish with additional strawberries. Serve at once.

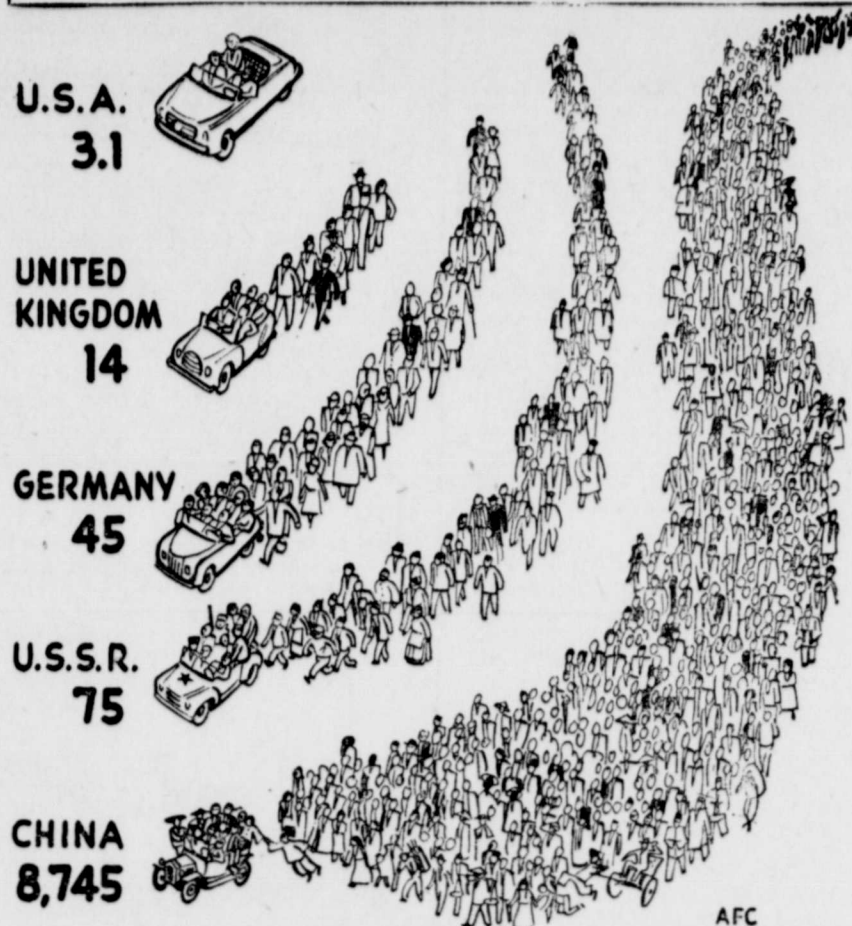

Fruit Delight

1 package prepared vanilla or orange coconut tapioca pudding; 1 1/2 cups fruit juice and water; 1 cup well-drained cut or crushed canned fruit, sweetened if necessary; 1 to 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Place pudding powder in saucepan. Add fruit juice and water and mix well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is slightly thickened. (Do not overcook, pudding thickens as it cools.) Add fruit and lemon juice as needed for tartness. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Turn into sherbet glasses or serving bowl. Chill. Serve plain or with cream. Makes 5 servings.

Calling All Mothers!

HERE is an "alarm clock" that will get your family up even on Sundays! Granted it isn't the usual variety, but the results are the same. Works very simply, too. Just whip up a batch of luscious Log Cabin Muffins and be sure that the kitchen door is open, so that their delightful fragrance as they bake can make its way to the bedrooms. By the time you are ready to take these muffins out of the oven, we're willing to bet your family will be up and ready to get em!

Log Cabin Muffins
2 cups sifted flour; 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup shortening; egg, well-beaten; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup maple-blended syrup.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Put in shortening. Combine egg, milk, and syrup and add all at once to flour mixture. To mix, draw spoon from side of bowl toward center (15 times), turning bowl gradually. Chop spoon through batter (10 times). Then stir only enough to dampen flour (5 strokes). Turn into greased muffin pans, filling each about 3/4 full. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 25 minutes, or until done. Makes 10 large muffins.

... as the saying goes in France—across-the-sea. On this side of the ocean we say "Everybody to his own taste." But a family taste test will give a happy vote of approval to this recipe for Frozen Crunch, a delightful new cooler that is as refreshing as a sea breeze itself. It's a mixture of ice cream, nut meats, and the new candy-coated rice cereal that lends itself so well to recipes:

Frozen Crunch

2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup chopped nut meats
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, crushed
Dash of salt

2 teaspoons gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups hot milk
1/2 cup sugar
Dash of salt
1 cup cream, whipped
1 teaspoon vanilla

Melt butter in skillet over low heat. Add nut meats and brown lightly. Add brown sugar and cook, stirring constantly, until sugar melts and caramelizes slightly. Add cereal and salt; mix well. Cool and crumble.

Combine gelatin and cold water; mix well. Add hot milk and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add sugar and salt and mix well. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in whipped cream and vanilla.

Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, setting control for coldest freezing temperature. When partially frozen, turn into a chilled bowl and beat with rotary egg beater until fluffy and smooth. Fold in 1/2 of the cereal mixture. Return to tray and freeze 30 minutes longer; stir. Then sprinkle remaining cereal mixture over the top and freeze until firm. Freezing time: 2 to 4 hours. Makes 1 quart.

You can even European-ize this interesting treat: for Mock Biscuit Tortoni, simply turn the ice cream and cereal mixture into 4- or 6-ounce paper cups. Top them with the remaining cereal mixture and freeze them until firm. This makes 12 to 16 servings.

Combine sweet cocoa mix and cornstarch in saucepan. Add milk gradually and mix well. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat and add vanilla. 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup melted butter or other shortening.

Crush about 4 cups corn toastics with rolling pin. Measure 1 cup. Combine crushed toastics, sugar, and cinnamon. Add melted butter and mix well. Press firmly on bottom and sides of 8-inch pie pan.

Stocking Cents!

NYLON, rayon, or silk—your stockings cost money. Besides that, they are much in the public eye; as your stockings appear, so your laundry habits are judged!

Now is the time to check your stockings: Colors faded? A run here, a run there? Unslightly snags? These are stocking tragedies (and personality indications!) you'll be interested in preventing . . . and the time to start is at the moment of purchase. Even before wearing, give those brand new stockings a good sudsing. You'll need only the fragrant bluing that comes in bead form and is detergent-based. The United States Department of Agriculture clothing specialists say that sudsing before wearing insures a closer, neater fit the first time the stockings are worn. In addition, this first sudsing removes the finish applied during manufacture and helps stockings wear longer.

For complete color protection, make this bluing wash a routine step after every wearing. Put about a quarter cup of bead bluing in a washbowl of warm water. Squeeze the sky-blue suds through and through the stockings . . . rinse twice and hang by the toes to dry. You can help prevent many snags and runs by removing your rings, and filing rough nails before laundering.

You'll be delighted with color-saving results when you use just these blue beads in the daily rinsing of other underwear . . . yes, you can solve many another laundry problem with this dramatic method.

Sorrento Tomato Sauce is not only delicious and zesty but versatile as well. Serve it with broiled or pan-fried fish, with green salads or as a sauce for a seafood cocktail.

Sorrento Tomato Sauce

- 2 1/2-inch slices fresh white bread
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup Mazola Salad Oil
- 1/4 cup cider vinegar

Remove bread crusts. Cut garlic in thin slices and insert in bread. Let stand one hour; remove garlic. Crumble bread into small bowl and add tomato sauce, salt, sugar, paprika and pepper. Beat in salad oil and vinegar. Cover. Chill well. Stir before serving. Serve on simple green salads or as a sauce for seafood. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

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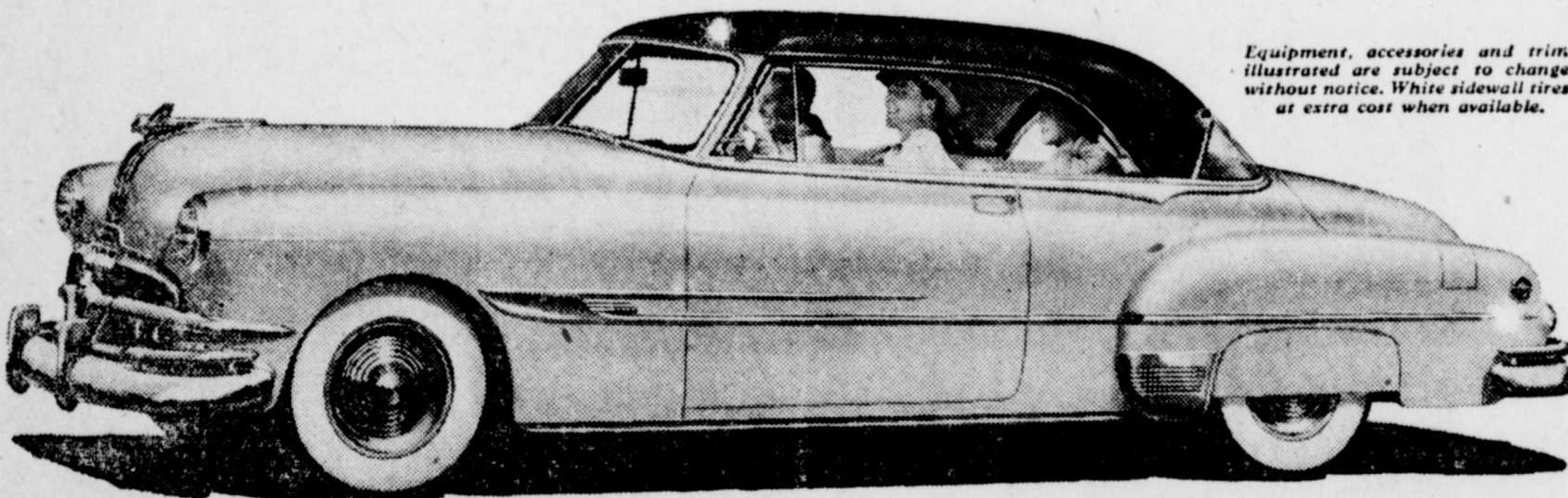

food and by vitamins, the internal version of sunlight.

Since the fluids of the body serve as the irrigation for the garden of health, they are extremely important in the safe-guarding of health.

Many centuries ago, Galen, one of the Early Greek medical scholars, took up the study of the fluids of the body and decided that life was a cycle by which the body became less moist from infancy to old age. In his expression, you are born very moist and become drier in all parts through the years, accounting for the wrinkled and brittle condition of the very old. Galen is not credited with the origin of the expression "Aw, dry up" however.

Today the medical scholars know there is a certain desirable balance to be maintained between the solids and the fluids of the body as well as a balance between the acids and the alkalines or salts of the body. Since acids may be a broad indication of the gases and the salts may be generally considered as the solids that are travelling in the body streams from one part of the body to another, this acid-alkaline relationship becomes an important indicator of the whole health of the body.

The body is about 75 per cent water. Half of the body weight is made up of water which is held in the cells of the body and one-fourth of the body weight is made up of moving water, so-called extracellular water. Your dry bones and the squeezed out organs of the body would account for only about one-fourth of your total weight if they could be weighed separately.

The gases that provide the heat in the body and the salts that form the structure of the body have a drying-out tendency so that more moisture must always be added, moisture in the form of water, internally and externally. The body streams not only deposit the "seeds" where they belong but also furnish the heat for that seed to expand and contribute to growth. Then the streams carry away the waste materials.

Such is the continuous growth in the body, however, that what is waste for one organ may be a "seed" for the next. So the fluid channels of the body, picking up material from one organ, take it to the next where it is filtered and the "good" is taken out, then carry what's left to the next where whatever that organ needs it takes out, then carry the remains on and one until finally there is only waste which no part of the body needs at that moment and the waste is eliminated from the body.

Some of the materials in the body do not move through the more

obvious fluid channel such as the blood stream. Some materials are more versatile and move through the pores of the walls from one part of the body to the next, a process called osmosis. From the deep layers of the skin certain waste portions of the underskin shove through all the layers until they get to the top of the skin, forming tiny scales that rub off and form a ring around the bathtub. As this material moves from the inner skin towards the top skin it is also undergoing changes, leaving some parts of it at each layer and becoming less and less moist as it gets to the outside skin. It dries there and warmth, moisture and solids in the form of warm water and soap are necessary to remove the waste scales.
