### RETURN FROM REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

### DURHAM SERVES ON DEMO COMMITTEE TO NAME 21st DISTRICT PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS

Worth B. Durham, delegate to the State Democratic Convention which was held in San Antonio Tuesday, was named to an important committee while attending the session. Worth served on the committee to name the presidential electors from this district (21st) and also the at-large presidential electors. He said C. P. Northington, Lampasas banker was named from this district.

Durham said the theme of the conservative group (which controlled the convention) was to restore the Democratic Party to the place it ought to be, and place in the national platform a plank putting the welfare of the whole nation (the north as well as the south) and further to nominate the proper nominee for presidency—for the good of the country, rather than the good of the party.

## MIDLAND RODEO JUNE 4 -- 8

MIDLAND—Midland Rodeo, the big entertainment event of the Permian Basin Empire, will open its 18th annual engagement Wednesday June 4. A gigantic parade at 4 p.m., led by Red Ryder and Little Beaver, in person, will feature bands, decorated floats, novelty units, rodeo contestants, officials, Sheriff's Posse units from numerous West Texas cities, cowboys, cowgirls and scores of miscellaneous riders.

The first performance of the famed world championship rodeo is scheduled at 8 p.m. Wednesday, when the colorful grand entry will swing through the arena. It will be followed by seven thrilling cowboy events, including bronc riding, bull riding, wild cow milking, steer wrestling and cutting horse contest.

The world's best cowhands will contest the wild and woolly stock furnished by Gene Autrey and Associates for purses and prizes totaling more than \$9,000. The stock is said to be the toughest in the rodeo world, assuring an over abundance of thrills, spills and chills.

Everett Colburn, recognized by Nation's Business as one of the four top rodeo producers of the world, again this year will produce the Midland Rodeo, known as the best and fastest moving show in the southwest.

Specialty acts, highlighted by the Beeswax Moore Family, will be presented each of the five nights.

## APPOINTED COUNTY CHAIRMAN OF OIL INDUSTRY INFORMATION COMMITTEE

(Special)—R. P. Brown of Sterling City, associated with the Texas Company, has been appointed Sterling County chairman of the Oil Industry Information Committee. He will administer the American Petroleum Institute information program in this community for 1952-53 and is in charge of plans now in their formative stage for Oil Progress Week, October 1-18, according to an announcement today by Joe T. Dickerson, OIIC West Texas area chairman.

Mr. Brown is a veteran of over 40 years in the petroleum marketing business. He started his selling career in 1912 with a gasoline barrel as his filling station. "In prosperous times," Mr. Brown recalls, "I might sell 50 gallons a week in those days." The original gasoline barrel marked "Danger—Gasoline-1912" is now located at his modern station in Sterling City and is a classic example of the progress of the petroleum industry.

Mr. Dickerson, who is Vice President of the Shell Oil Company in Midland, was in Sterling City May 22 for an organization meeting of the local OIIC committee.

"In broadening the OIIC program in Texas this year," Dickerson said, "we feel fortunate in enlisting Mr. Brown's leadership in the Sterling City community."

Dickerson explained that Texas has been divided geographically into 14 OIIC areas this year with almost 700 oil and gas men serving on 331 volunteer community committees throughout the state.

Men and women from all segments of the petroleum industry over the nation have been banded together since 1947 as volunteer workers to keep the public informed about their industry.

In commenting upon his appointment as the new community chairman, Brown said that his objective and that of the local committee men serving with him was:

"To help re-affirm the faith of the American people that their individual interests, as well as those of the nation, are best served, in peace or in war, by competitive, privately-managed oil and gas companies."

**Vote-Winning Dessert**

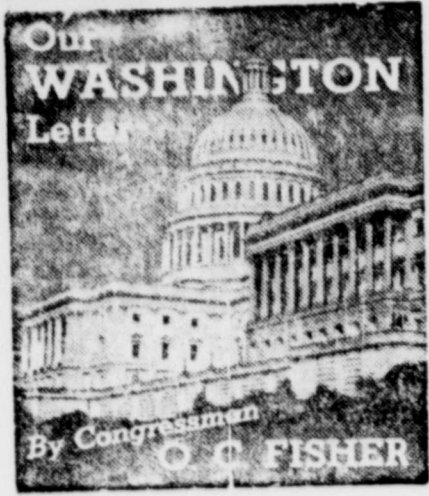
Yes-siree, this is an election year—and although it may seem a bit early, the air will be filled with campaign ribbons and buttons of all kinds, before you know it. Even the kiddies will be vote conscious as a result of newspapers, magazines, radio and television—or from hearing "Dad" and the next door neighbor engaging in a word battle over various parties and policies.

However, when voting for your favorite dessert, here is a tried and true campaigner that will appeal to ALL AGES. So you good people who are in favor of a "food platform" calling for tastier dessert treats that are healthful as well as delicious—just cast your culinary "vote" for the following:

**Fruit Cocktail Rennet Dessert**  
 1 package vanilla rennet powder  
 2 cups milk (not canned)  
 1/2 cup well-drained fruit cocktail  
 Whipped cream

Divide fruit cocktail among 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time. Just before serving, top each dessert with whipped cream and a maraschino cherry.

\*If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding powder, or it will not set.



WHILE THE WEATHER along the Potomac has remained cool thus

far, already there are outcroppings of frazzled nerves and irritation in some quarters. That has been particularly true in the case of President Truman who of late has been snapping impatiently at Congress and at most all others who do not see eye to eye with the Executive.

In the mood of a setting hen, with the hatch over-due, the President lashed at Congress when he made a major speech before the left-of-center American for Democratic Action at their annual convention the other night.

Speaking to a group of liberals who look upon States' rights as something that belonged to the dark ages, Mr. Truman paid his respects to the Congress for again

passing a bill confirming title in the States to their tidelands. In his words, "This would be robbery in broad daylight—and on a colossal scale." In his enthusiasm, he committed mayhem upon facts by saying the Congress had voted to turn over to a handful of States all of the country's great offshore petroleum and gas deposits—a national asset that "may be worth as much as \$40 billion."

He either did not know, or overlooked reporting, that from 70 to 80 percent of offshore oil reserves is beyond the area covered in the tidelands bill—in other words, is within that part of the continental shelf that Congress has not acted upon at all.

Appearing before another audience a few nights later, the President blasted what he calls the "so-called economy bloc" for trimming his budget in many details. He said his \$85 billion budget was a "good budget and an honest budget", and the Congress was misbehaving very badly by tampering with it.

In still another appearance the President said if the Congress did not give him all he wanted in the way of money, he would call a special session every day if necessary until he got what he wanted.

In the meantime, the Congress went about its business, reviewing the cuts that have been made and some members searching for more fat that can be removed. It's the weather, most of them say, and the Potomac is known for unruly nerves and upset tempers—especially about this time of the year.

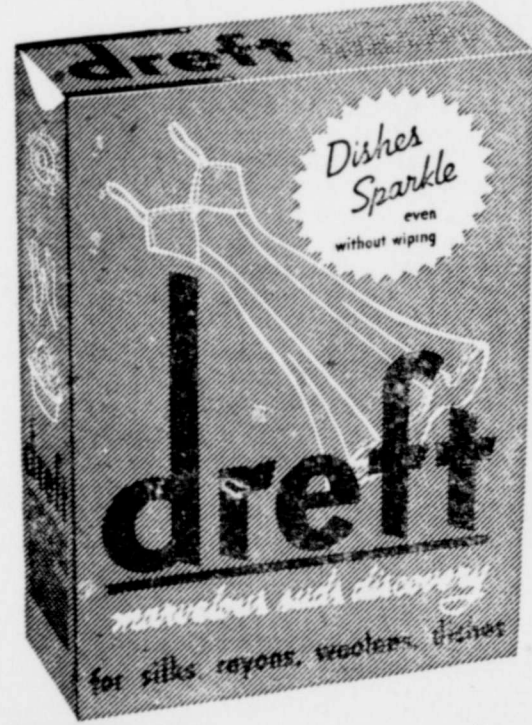

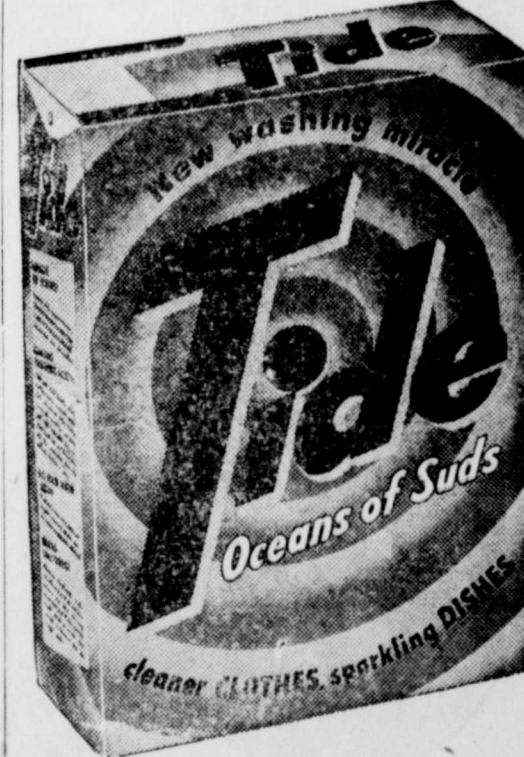

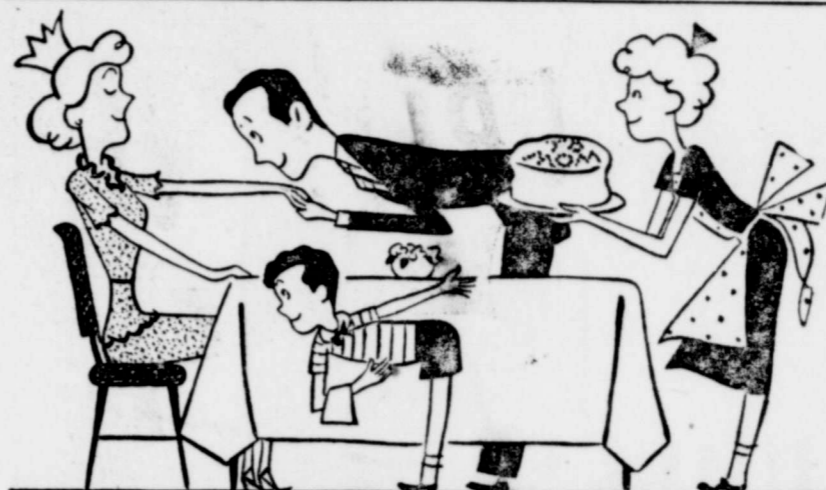

**Let's Work for Mother**

Let's do some chores on Mother's Day that will mean less work for Mother and will give her a surprise or two on her day. How about some of these tasties?

- Chocolate Spice Cake**
- 2 cups sifted cake flour
  - 3/4 teaspoon soda
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon cloves
  - 1/2 teaspoon allspice
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/2 cup shortening
  - 1 1/2 cups sugar
  - 3 eggs, unbeaten
  - 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
  - Buttermilk (see below for amount)
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - With butter, margarine, or lard, use 1 cup buttermilk. With vegetable or any other shortening, use 1 1/4 cups buttermilk.

Sift flour once, measure, add soda, salt and spices, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add melted chocolate and blend. Then add flour, alternately with buttermilk, a small amount at a time, beating after addition until smooth. Add vanilla; blend.

Turn batter into two round 9-inch layer pans, which have been lined on bottoms with paper. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 20 minutes, or until done. Spread tops and sides of layers with Seven Minute Frosting. While still soft, carefully press down chocolate chips into the frosting to spell out the words "To Mom."

- Chocolate Caramel Icing**
- 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
  - 2/3 cup cocoa
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 2/3 cup light or dark corn syrup
  - 1/4 cup butter or margarine.
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Sift together confectioners' sugar, cocoa and salt. Combine corn syrup and butter in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Add sifted dry ingredients all at once to syrup mixture in saucepan. Beat with

a wooden spoon until icing is smooth. Add vanilla and blend well. Pour and spread on cake. Makes enough to cover 10-inch tube cake or 9x13-inch loaf cake.

**Note:** Three squares unsweetened chocolate may be substituted for cocoa. Add chocolate to corn syrup-butter mixture. Stir while mixture is heating. Cook until chocolate is melted and mixture comes to a full boil.

- Pear Rennet Dessert**
- 2 cups milk (not canned)
  - 1 package lemon rennet powder
  - Canned pear slices
  - Currant jelly

Set out 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time. Just before serving chilled rennet desserts, top with thin slices of pear, and currant jelly.

•If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding powder, or it will not set.

- Coconut Fruit Roll**
- 3/4 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
  - 2 teaspoons light corn syrup
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1/2 cup chopped raisins
  - 1/2 cup chopped dates
  - 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut

Combine sugar, corn syrup, and milk. Place over low heat and stir constantly until sugar is dissolved and mixture boils. Continue boiling until a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 234° F.). Remove from heat. Cool slightly. Add vanilla and beat until creamy. Add fruit and coconut and knead well. Shape into rolls, 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper; chill. Cut in slices. Makes 3 dozen slices.

Three cups shredded coconut may be substituted for raisins, dates, and coconut in this recipe.
