"Covering the County"

Ticks, flies and lice have been troublesome during the past few weeks. Sprays for flies in some cases have not given the protection they should have, particularly around corrals and barns. In many cases, the heavy fly infestation is due to the failure to eliminate fly breeding places. Spray alone will not eliminate flies or control them. Around water troughs and other wet places, flies breed in the damp manure. Maggots can be found by the thousands by digging into some damp manure. Here the trouble really lies instead of with the chemical. In some cases where DDT is not effective, the use of other insecticides may be more beneficial. In this case, spraying should be done more frequently because DDT has the greatest residual effect.

Ear ticks should be controlled with any remedy which contains benzene hexachloride with pine tar oil as a base.

For body lice on cattle, a toxaphene spray can be used for good results. This should be followed as to directions and should be used sparingly on young calves.

The Sterling County Hospital Auxiliary will meet in a called meeting on next Thursday, June 19, said Mrs. Horace Donalson, the president, this week.

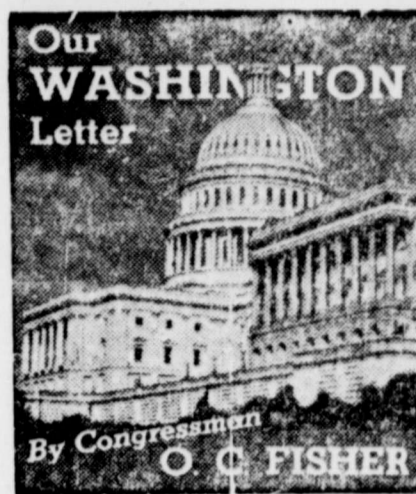
The regular meeting on the first Thursday was not held, said Mrs. Donalson and the called meeting is to discuss some needed matters, she said.

LAST OCTOBER the House passed a bill to clarify the law against dumping of foreign products in this country where such exports adversely affect a domestic industry. Since 1921 we have had an anti-dumping law, but it has been so interpreted that its effect has been useless.

The amendment to that law, which we passed in the House, has been pending in the Senate Finance committee since last October 16. It requires the Secretary of Treasury to impose a countervailing duty on merchandise brought in "by reason of a payment or bestowal of a bounty or grant" by the government of the exporting country. This is an attempt to cope with the subsidized practices of Argentina and Uruguay with respect to wool and wool tops. Those countries have been giving exporters of wool tops (raw wool which has been processed) a special exchange advantage when they ship to the United States.

But the Secretary of Treasury (who handles customs) held that the 1921 anti-dumping law did not contemplate subsidies brought about by preferred exchange manipulations. Our amendment of last October expressly stated that such bounty or grant would include subsidies brought about "through multiple official rates of its exchange in terms of United States dollars, or otherwise."

The Senate committee has held some hearings on our bill but up to this time has taken no action. This is regrettable because the South American wool tops that have been dumped in our country have played havoc with a substantial part of our domestic wool market during the past few months.

THE HOUSE passed a House-Senate conference report on a foreign aid bill last week. The House had previously trimmed the President's aid bill from \$7.9 billion down to \$6.1 billion, but the conference committee upped the figure to \$6.4 billion—increasing economic assistance (as distinguished from military aid) to \$1.8 billion. Since much of this is for the purpose of bolstering the economies and to provide public works in so-called depressed areas around the world, I voted against the conference report. The deeper we get into this international WPA business, the more difficult it will be to stop it. Our taxpayers are in no condition to pay such bills for other people.

LIONS CLUB SPONSORING SPRAYING OF TOWN ON JUNE 21

The spraying of the town on Saturday, June 6, is under the sponsorship of the Lions Club. Such announcement was made this week at the luncheon meeting. The club is asking ranchmen with sprayers to come in early Saturday morning with their spray machines and to help spray the town. The town will be divided in sections and material is on hand for the work.

It is hoped to cut down on the crop of flies that seem excessively numerous here, and to beat polio or other diseases to the draw. This is the most practical and sensible approach to the warding off of polio attacks, it is pointed out. Flies have been found to be carriers of the polio germs. Health officer W. J. Swann points out that intestinal diseases caused by flies is a dead-end, too. Especially is this true in the case of children.

Won't You Bring in Your Sprayer? If you have a stock spray machine and will use it in the spraying on June 21, please notify Fred Campbell, County Agent or the News-Record.

Spraying should begin at 9 o'clock or thereabouts on the day set.

At the luncheon meeting Wednesday of the club, the Rev. Bruce Medford was a new member. W.S. Leslie of San Angelo and W. S. Goodlett of Big Spring were guests.

Lion Roland Lowe told of the plan to put a water pump at the city park. The water would be sold to paving firms, water haulers, etc. to help pay for cost of installation and maintenance. The county is to help the park board with the initial cost. The county then would be allowed to have water for its own use.

Rainmaking Film to Be Shown At Club Next Wednesday

Clyde Hoyt, regional representative of the Krick, Inc. Rain-cloud seeding firm, will show a 19 minute film on the seeding of clouds for rainfall, it was announced. Bill Green has the program and the Krick representative will be his guest. The film deals with cloud seeding to cause additional rain. Such seeding and "rainmaking" is still in an experimental stage, yet has been proven, said Hoyt.

Eventually, through further experimentation, results may be achieved regularly, thinks Hoyt.

The Leaky Trough

**"Company Meals" on Short Notice
—with Home-Canned Chicken!**

Chicken put up in your own canning jars means "company meals" on short notice. You can celebrate a birthday or anniversary with an extra special dinner; or you can give the family an unexpected treat any time if you have a supply of home-canned chicken on hand.

You may can chicken on or off the bones. The boneless pack takes a little more time but canned boned chicken is more useful because it's ready for instant use, either for sandwiches or a main dinner dish.

To can chicken without bones, put 4 or 5 cups of water in a steam pressure cooker and steam plump hens at 10 pounds pressure until they are cooked through but not tender. Cooking time depends upon age and size of hens; 30 minutes is about average. Take hens out of cooker and put cooker where broth will cool.

Use sharp knife to cut chicken from bone; then cut meat in neat pieces and place in clean, hot Ball Mason Jars. Leave about 1 inch headspace. Add ½ teaspoon salt to each pint. Next, skim the grease from the broth in the cooker, pour the broth into a kettle and put it on the stove to heat to boiling. Wash

the cooker; add measure of water needed for processing and set cooker on stove.

Pour the hot broth over the chicken and run knife down inside jar to get out air bubbles. Wipe top of jar free of grease. Apply Ball Dome Cap according to directions. Process pints 75 minutes and quarts 90 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. It takes a little longer at high altitudes.

To can chicken on the bone: Boil, steam or bake from one-third to one-half done, then separate at joints. Pack into hot Ball Mason Jars. Cover with boiling broth. Salt to taste. Process 75 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. This is the hot pack method.

If you want to pack the chicken raw, cut it in serving size pieces. Pack into hot Ball Mason Jars. Add one teaspoon of salt to each quart. (Add no liquid.) Process pints 75 minutes and quarts 90 minutes at 10 pounds pressure.

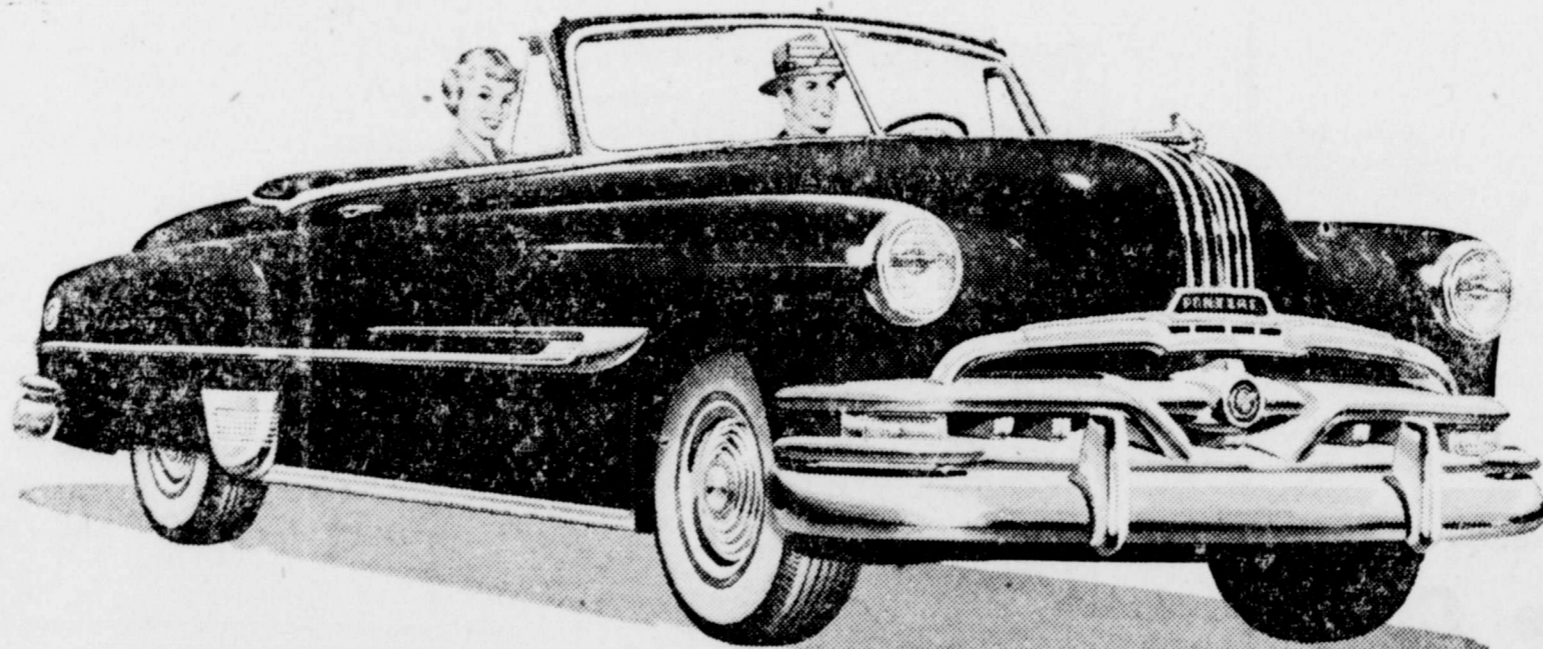
Quick Chocolate Sauce
