Some people point out that the Republicans have a sure fire winner for the November election—that with Ike as presidential candidate, they can't lose. BUT on the other hand some people point out that the Democrats can't lose—that any party that has been in power for 20 years couldn't possibly lose, due to the hold on governmental employees and their families, etc.

Such being the case, I expect we will have to wait until after the election and all the votes are counted before we know the winner.

8-BALL

While thinking along the line of elections, we have one here on Friday of next week, July 26. This Democratic primary, which is the same as election in Texas comes off in the usual manner and at the same places.

Among the exceptions to the usual is the fact that you can vote by drawing a line through all the candidates you DO NOT want to vote for or you can mark an X in the little box beside the candidate's name on the ballot.

Heretofore many ballots in places had been invalidated by the voter marking an X by the candidate of his choice. Particularly was this true when people who had lately moved to Texas from other states voted for their first time. Now, they may vote in the good old Texas way of blacking the man or men they don't want or by checking an X in the box beside the name of their favorite candidate.

8-BALL

A person who will not vote in the Democratic primaries in Texas just because he wants to vote Republican in the fall, is just disfranchising himself. He most likely would vote the state ticket of the Demo slate, even if he wanted a Republican president. The only time the state voted for a Republican president was in 1928 when it went for Hoover. BUT the full slate of Texas nominees were in. This is what is called "splitting the ticket." The courts have held that the presidential nominees are not the nominees of this Demo primary.

The moral assumption is that a person who votes in a Democratic primary election is a Democrat and will vote the ticket straight in the general election. But party lines get weak at times. Some people think that the man is more important than the party. But, in Texas, all offices are filled in the Democratic primaries. (Continued on Back Page)

8-BALL

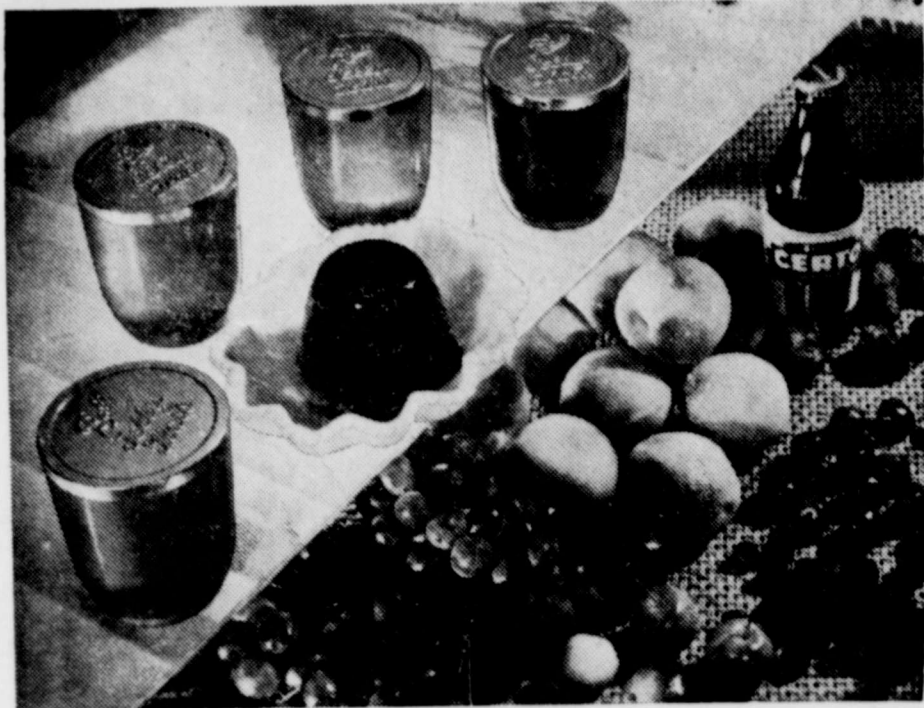
Midland finally got some rain. They got more last week (in three rains) than they got in the past 12 months.

Jelly Making—Easy and Rewarding

Spend a little time during the summer making jelly to be used on breakfast toast, hot biscuits, between-meal sandwiches for the children, and lop a sizeable food expense item from your next winter's grocery bill!

Excellent jelly is easily made from the juice of tart apples, grapes, currants, blackberries and several other fruits and berries. They contain enough pectin, the substance in fruits which makes jelly "set." But, some fruits are low in pectin, notably cherries, peaches, strawberries and sweet apples, and the amount of pectin in a fruit may vary from season to season. It is also influenced by the degree of ripeness.

You may mix fruit juices known to be low in pectin cup for cup with those known to contain a great deal

of pectin, but it is usually better to add pectin—the kind you buy in liquid or powdered form—when making jelly of low-pectin fruits. It is also faster. A one-minute boil is enough for jelly-making when you use either Certo or Sure-Jell, well known brands of natural fruit pectin.

You may even make jelly from canned or frozen juices and fruits by using pectin. This is one of the easiest ways of making jelly because it eliminates preparation of the fruit and permits you to make jelly any day of the year in about 15 minutes time.

Pectin may be bought at the food store in either liquid or powdered form. Be sure to follow the directions which come with the bottle or package when you make your jelly.

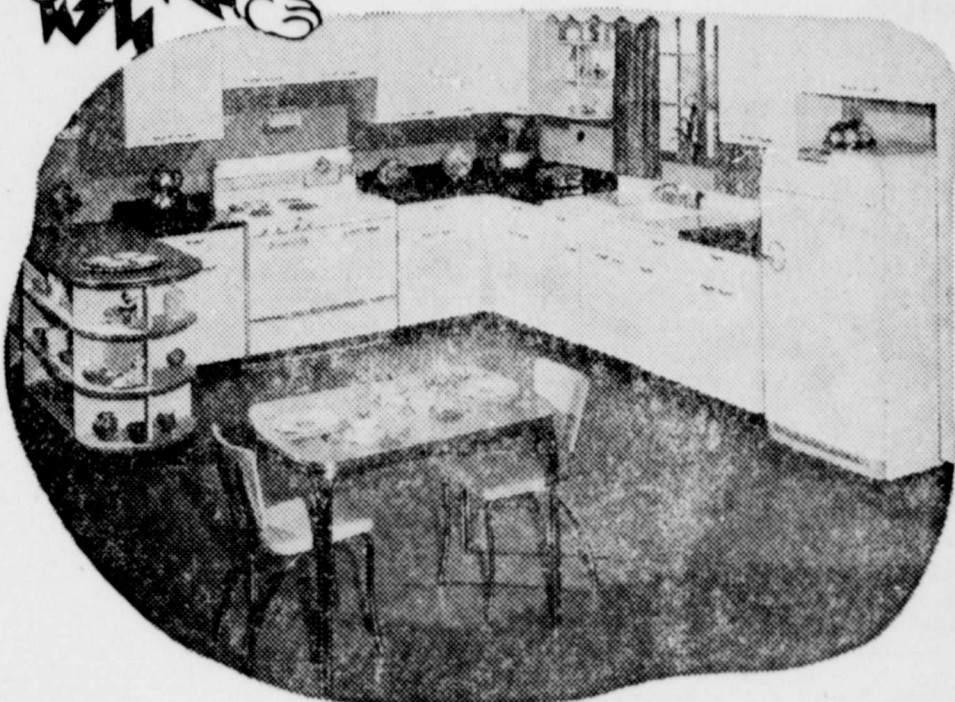

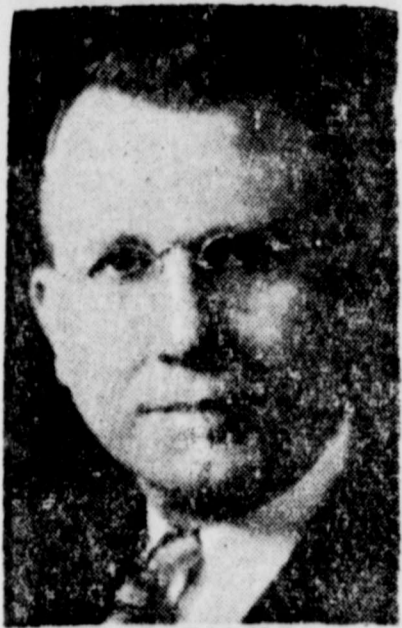

Hamburger Toasties
½ pound ground beef, 1 cup Grape-Nuts Flakes, slightly crushed; 1 teaspoon salt; dash of pepper; 3 to 4 tablespoons milk or water.

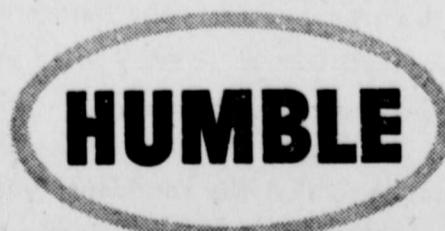

How To Can Cranberry Sauce



1. Examine jars. Tops and edges must be smooth. Get jars, lids and everything else ready. Wash and stem cranberries. Put 4 cups sugar and 4 cups cranberries in large kettle. Boil 5 minutes. Add 2 quarts berries. Boil without stirring until skins of berries burst.

2. If jellied sauce is preferred, boil about 3 more minutes. Pour boiling hot sauce into hot Ball Mason Jars. Fill almost to top. A funnel will make filling easier. Wipe off anything spilled on jar. This is open kettle canning, so work fast!

3. Put hot Ball Dome Lid on jar. Screw metal band tight to hold lid firmly against jar. Band must be down evenly all the way around. Use ordinary hand strength. A tightly folded cloth will help to hold the hot jar steady.

4. After the jars have cooled 10 or 12 hours, take off bands and test seal by pressing on lid. If the Dome of the Ball Dome Lid is down, or goes down when pressed and stays down, the jar is sealed. Leave bands off.
