Boys Fat Stock Show Held Last Saturday

Ten-year-old Bill Davis swept the fat lamb division of the Sterling County 4-H Club Livestock Show here last Saturday. He showed champion and reserve champion finewool lamb and champion pen of three in both fine wool and crossbred classes. He also won the American Legion trophy as top showman.

Davis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Davis.

The grand champion finewool lamb was bred by Fowler McEntire and the crossbred by Riley King.

Other breeders stock represented in the lamb classes included W.N. & L.R. Reed, Wesley Ellebracht, Worth Allen, L. F. Hodges, Mud Allen, Tom Humble and Leo Radde.

Esther Bird showed the reserve champion, bred by her father, Gordon Bird. Humble had the top heavyweight calf and Delmar Radde the top lightweight calf. Esther had second place in each of the classes.

W. G. Fincher showed the only two fat hogs of the show, both Duroc-Hampshire crosses bred by Sam Simmons.

In that class of Rambouillet breeding sheep David Durham took the top three places with his ewes and rams.

High School Students Take Preference Tests

Superintendent O. T. Jones and High School Principal George Blackburn have just announced that the Sterling City high school graduates for 1953 have been given the Kuder Preference Test provided by San Angelo College without cost.

This test is one of the guidance services for high school graduates of this area which San Angelo College has been giving for the past five years.

As a follow-up to this test, the College will send a team of its expert counsellors, Mrs. Frances Carter and C. A. Roberson, Jr. to the Sterling City high school to explain the results of the test with specific interpretation to each boy and girl and at the same time point out use the student can make of the information whether he goes on to College or enters business.

The San Angelo College Counsellors will be here Thursday, February 12.

This Kuder Test is not an intelligence or an aptitude test. It simply indicates the students' preference in nine different types of vocations. This information is of vital importance to each boy and girl in planning future studies or activities.

Basketball Notes

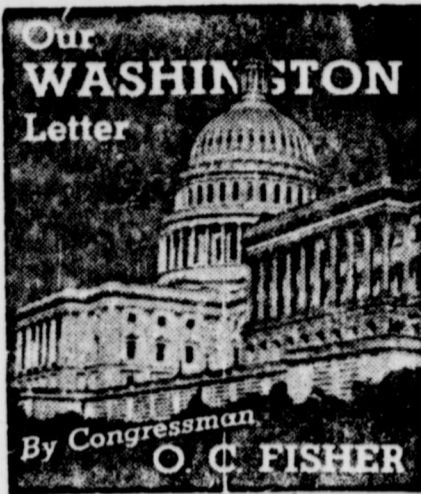
The Sterling City Eagles basketball teams are nearing the end of the current season, having shown steady improvement along through the months.

Out of Army

Buddy Sutherland returned home last week, having received his discharge from the army. He had been in Europe. His wife, the former Charlotte Berry, will proceed to finish her high school work here the remainder of this year and Sutherland plans to roughneck. Next fall they both plan to go to Lubbock and enter Texas Tech.



OF INTEREST to every American was the recent appointment of Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor to replace General Van Fleet as commander of the Eighth Army in Korea. The importance of this assignment is underscored because of the likelihood of a change in tactics which would be designed to break the Korean stalemate this year. The success of such a venture will, of course, depend in no small part on the caliber of the man in command.

The Taylor appointment was announced by General Collins at a luncheon at the Pentagon, where our Committee on Armed Services had gone for a briefing on the Army's Research and Development program. Taylor, a calm, calculating sort, made a little talk in which he commended General Van Fleet and said those shoes would be hard to fill.

"However," he continued, "in taking over the command I feel that I will have the home-front viewpoint. I think I know something of the American people about the war in Korea. I am a soldier, and I shall go there as a replacement in our military program and shall do my best to maintain the great reputation of the 8th Army."

Taylor, now only 51, has behind him a brilliant record in World War II where he commanded the 101st Airborne Division. He parachuted with his Division into Normandy to become the first general American officer to land there. He was acclaimed for his generalship in the Battle of the Bulge, and in 1944 was chosen to fly behind the German lines to negotiate with the Italian government.

Following the war, General Taylor was Superintendent at West point for three years, then in 1949 took over command of both the American Military Government and Army forces in Berlin. More recently he has been Deputy Chief of Staff of Operations. He speaks four foreign languages—French, Spanish, German and Japanese.

Thus, our troops in Korea will be under command of a man who has proven his competence under the test of battle. He has demonstrated his qualities as an educator, negotiator, and administrator, as well as a strategist and military leader. There is a lot of comfort in the knowledge that General Van Fleet—one of the very greatest combat leaders in the American Army—will be succeeded by a man so capable and so highly respected as is true of General Taylor.

FOOTNOTE: Speaking of the rotation program when he appeared before our committee recently, Gen. Bradley mentioned a road sign he read near the front in Korea: "Drive Carefully! Remember, the man you hit may be YOUR replacement!"

FROM THE OFFICE OF SENATOR LYNDON B. JOHNSON

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas has urged the "prompt confirmation" of Robert B. Anderson of Vernon, Texas, as Secretary of the Navy as soon as President Eisenhower sends the nomination to Congress.

In a letter to Senator Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, Chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, Senator Johnson said that his fellow Texan "will make a fine contribution to our Nation's defense."

President Eisenhower has announced that Mr. Anderson is his selection as Secretary of the Navy and a hearing has been held by the Senate Armed Services Committee already. But the formal nomination has yet to be sent to the Senate.

The text of Senator Johnson's letter is as follows:

"My dear Mr. Chairman: "As a long-time friend of Robert B. Anderson, I am taking the liberty of writing you to urge his prompt confirmation as Secretary

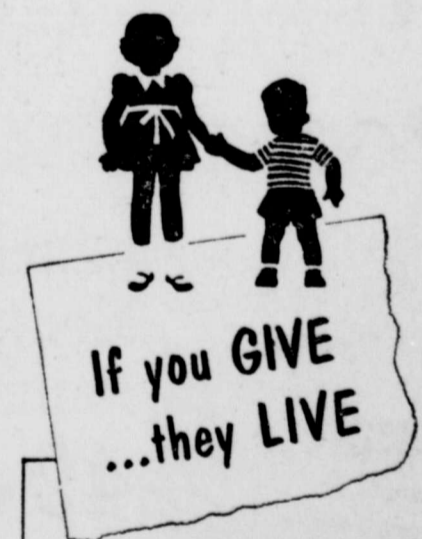
PERFORM FOR GARDEN CITY SCHOOL

Square Dance to Meet Saturday

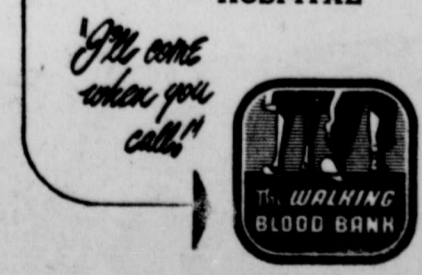

A Salad At Night

YES, these luscious winter salads will delight both children and adults alike. They are fun to make and delicious to eat—a colorful and tasty combination of juicy canned pear halves, cream cheese, shredded coconut and maraschino cherries. Wonderful to serve at night when, in spite of a hearty dinner, everybody inevitably wants "a bite to eat" before calling it a day.

Winter Special Salad

1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese; 2 tablespoons cream; 6 canned pear halves, drained and chilled; 6 red maraschino cherries; 1 green maraschino cherries; ½ cup coconut (about).

Mash cream cheese with a fork until softened. Add cream gradually; then beat until cheese is light and fluffy.

Place each pear half, cut-side down, on crisp lettuce. Use large end of pear for face and tapered end for cap. Cut round pieces from red cherries for eyes and half a ring of red cherry for mouth. Arrange eyes and mouth on face.

Spread cream cheese on tapered end of pear half for whiskers. Cut green cherries in half and place one half at tip of each cap for tassels. Sprinkle cap and whiskers with coconut. Serve with mayonnaise, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

A Perfect Ending

FESTIVE Chocolate Pudding is indeed a fitting climax for your "special" dinner. A luscious combination of dark, rich, chocolate and candied fruits, your family and guests are sure to be glad they "left room for dessert!"



Festive Chocolate Pudding
1 cup coarsely chopped candied cherries; 1 cup coarsely chopped candied pineapple; ½ cup coarsely chopped candied orange peel; 1 cup finely cut seedless raisins; 2½ tablespoons rum extract.

2 cups sifted flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; ½ teaspoon soda; ¼ teaspoon salt; ½ cup butter or other shortening; ¾ cup light brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg, well beaten; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; 1 cup milk.

Combine cherries, pineapple, orange peel, raisins, and flavoring. Let stand in tightly covered jar 24 hours, stirring fruit occasionally to distribute flavoring.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, and cream together well. Add egg and chocolate, beating until smooth. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating well after each addition. Fold in fruit mixture. Turn into 2-quart or two 1-quart molds. Cover tightly and steam 2½ to 3½ hours, depending on size of mold. Or turn into greased 2-quart casserole or 9-inch tube pan. Cover with greased brown or heavy waxed paper and tie securely. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 2½ hours, or until done. Serve hot.
