

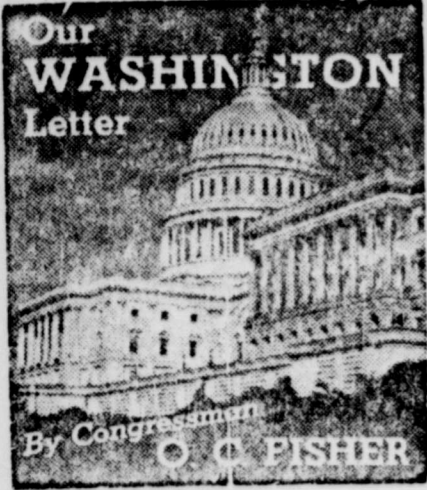

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**

By Congressmen

**PRESIDENT EISENHOWER'S** removal of the blockade against the Chinese Nationalists, which will permit them to use their navy in amphibious raids against the Chinese mainland, is packed with significance. It is designed to help remove the Korean stalemate by stepping up pressure against the Chinese Communies. Others, we are told, will follow. It is believed the psychological value of this move will be felt immediately in the Far East and the will to resist on the part of anti-communists in China will be bolstered.

The Nationalists on Formosa are strong in manpower and the desire to fight is strong. Through American aid, nearly 100,000 of Chiang's troops are now ready for combat. Another 100,000 can be ready within four months, and a half million can be made battle-worthy within 18 or 24 months.

The big bottleneck is equipment and supplies. We have given them a lot during the past year, but the hardware has moved much slower than the pace of the training program. The rate of supply is much better now than six months ago when I was in Formosa.

If the pressure of concentrated manpower from the Chinese in Korea is to be relieved, a second front is necessary. The Chinese Nationalists can provide that, given a little more time and more equipment. It can be in the form of hit-and-run attacks on the mainland, attack on supply lines, revitalized guerrilla warfare and perhaps eventually a new front by the Nationalists in South China.

It seems to me we would do well to provide Chiang with a few destroyers, if they can be spared without danger to our own mission and security. Those destroyers, along with what the Nationalists already have, could impose a virtual blockade of shipping now pouring into Chinese ports. I have heard that shipping estimated at up to 17,000 tons per day.

We have promised the Nationalists jet fighter planes, but none have yet been delivered. Chiang has a fairly good air force, but no jets. I saw their dive bombers in action in Formosa and they looked good. Most of their flyers have been trained in the United States. If we were in a position to do the same for the Nationalists in the way of jet planes that the Russians have done for the Chinese Reds, the Chinese could do plenty of damage from the Formosa base.

There are hundreds of miles of unprotected coast along the China mainland. Transportation and communication on the land along this area is very poor, and therefore more difficult to defend. The Nationalists occupy 31 islands within sight of the mainland. Some 75,000 troops are said to be stationed there. They have made hundreds of nuisance raids, and they can now do much more in that way. The Eisenhower order may very well be one big headache to the Communies.

## Texaco Discovers New Oil Field in Reagan

The Texas Company announced the discovery of a new oil field three miles west of Big Lake in Reagan County, West Texas, upon the completion of a wildcat well, State of Texas AC Well No. 1, which flowed at the daily rate of 238 barrels of 51.70 gravity oil through a 1 3/4 inch choke on the latest test.

Perforations were made between 9410 and 9500 feet in the Ellenberger lime. The gas-oil ration was 2340 to one.

Nearest production in the vicinity of the discovery well is old Big Lake Field, nine miles south-east of the wildcat location.

## "Walking Blood Bank" Ready To Be Started

The "Walking Blood Bank" program is ready to be put into effect at the Sterling County Hospital. Such was the announcement made this week by John M. Stuckwisch, administrator.

The plan is to type all the citizens of Sterling County as to their blood types and the record of such typing will be kept on file. When that person needs blood, his type will be known immediately, AND if blood is needed for a patient in a hurry, a person who has the corresponding type can be called to donate blood for a transfusion. Thus, it eliminates the need for a blood bank—as is kept by larger hospitals.

The other day George Davis donated blood for D. P. Glass following an operation on his hip. Wednesday night, D. D. Garrett gave a transfusion to Lee R. Randolph, a boy that was seriously injured in a wreck near here. The hospital officials can scan through their list of blood types and call until they find a willing donor each time one is needed.

Mr. Stuckwisch expressed his and the staff's appreciation to the two mentioned above for donating blood when needed.

The cost of the typing is borne by the hospital. It is to everyone's advantage to be typed. The hospital staff urges people to begin the program now.

The program is being sponsored by the hospital auxiliary, the hospital and one or two of the local clubs are behind the move.

LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH—Slaughter steers opened the week at Fort Worth with around 50 cents higher prices, making advances above the low time of the previous week fully \$1 to \$2. Cows sold 50 cents higher, or \$1 above a week earlier. Calves and stocker and feeder classes revealed similar strength and some to better advantage. Bulls gained 50 cents.

Slaughter sheep and lambs ruled fully steady, lambs holding to the substantial advances of a week ago. Feeders also drew firm prices. Hog shipments were resumed following a week-end shutdown caused by a suspected case of VE appearing on the yards. The suspected vesicular exanthema hogs were destroyed and yards cleaned and disinfected. Demand for good hogs has been strong.

A feeling persisted around the Fort Worth stockyards that more orderly marketing of fed cattle and less bunching of shipments

would be seen in the coming weeks and this should strengthen the market on those classes.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$18 to \$23.50 in most sales, just a few above that range. Common and medium slaughter kinds sold for \$13 to \$18, a few shelly kinds lower. Beef cows drew \$13.50 to \$16.00 and canners and cutters sold for \$10 to \$13.50. Bulls cashed at \$10 to \$17.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves drew \$19 to \$23 and common and medium slaughter grades sold for \$13 to \$18. Culls sold from \$10 to \$13. Good and choice stocker steer calves drew \$18 to \$23. Stocker steer yearlings sold mainly from \$22 downward. Stocker cows cleared at \$13 to \$20.

Medium, good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$16 to \$20, a few at \$21. Shorn lambs cashed at \$19.50 downward. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$13 to \$16, some choice fleshy and fat shearing type lambs upwards to \$19.50. Slaughter yearlings and older wethers sold mainly from \$10 to \$15, a few yearlings to \$16.

Although no hogs arrived at Ft. Worth for sale Monday because of the embargo, the markets were generally higher over the nation and top hogs were considered quotable in the \$19.50 to \$20 level.

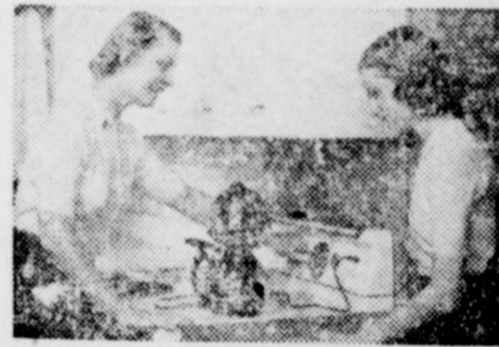

### Festive Chocolate Pudding

1 cup coarsely chopped candied cherries; 1 cup coarsely chopped candied pineapple; 1/2 cup coarsely chopped candied orange peel; 1 cup finely cut seedless raisins; 2 1/2 tablespoons rum extract.

2 cups sifted flour; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup butter or other shortening; 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg, well beaten; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; 1 cup milk.

Combine cherries, pineapple, orange peel, raisins, and flavoring. Let stand in tightly covered jar 24 hours, stirring fruit occasionally to distribute flavoring.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, and cream together well. Add egg and chocolate, beating until smooth. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating well after each addition. Fold in fruit mixture. Turn into 2-quart or two 1-quart molds, cover tightly and steam 2 1/2 to 3 hours, depending on size of mold. Turn into greased 2-quart casserole or 8-cup 1 1/2 tube pan. Cover with greased brown or heavy waxed paper and tie securely. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 2 1/2 hours, or until done.

Place each pear half, cut-side down, on crisp lettuce. Use large end of pear for face and tapered end for ears. Cut round pieces from red cherries for eyes and half a ring of red cherry for mouth. Arrange eyes and mouth on face.

Spread cream cheese on tapered end of pear half for cap and at base of large end for whiskers. Cut green cherries in half and place one half at tip of each cap for tassels. Sprinkle cap and whiskers with coconut. Serve with mayonnaise, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

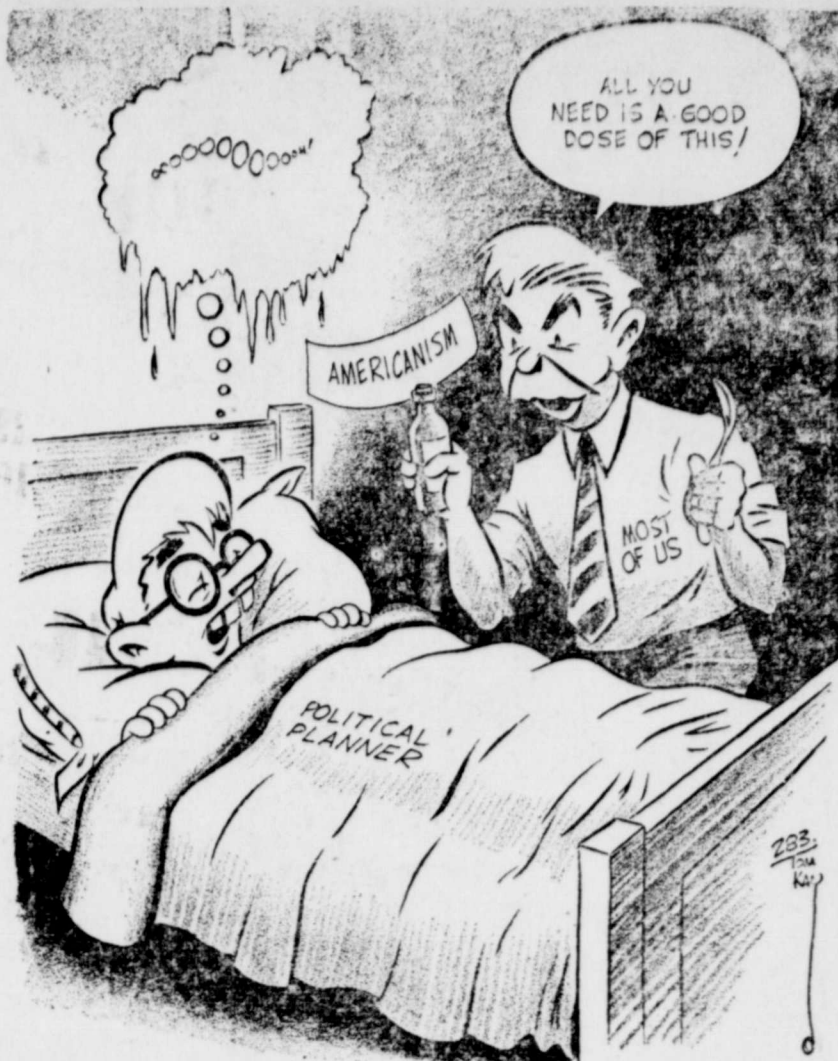

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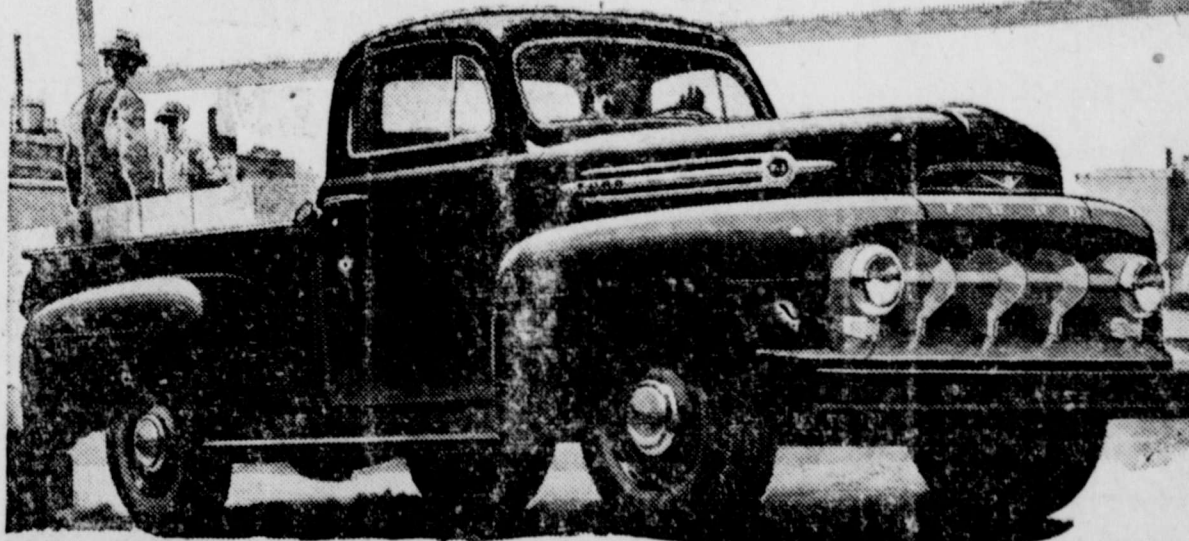
