Our WASHINGTON Letter



The meaning of a disaster cannot be fully appreciated until it gets close to home. Our telephone rang all day on Tuesday of last week following the announcement Monday evening of the tornado which had struck in San Angelo. People wanted details, and, due to the cut-off of telephone service, they were slow coming in. The American Red Cross, however, kept us informed and at intervals sent special messengers up with detailed reports as the tragic news was assembled.

To alleviate local suffering in cases of great disasters, the Federal government makes certain types of assistance available for the victims of such tragedies. The object of this is to supplement the efforts of the States and local communities where the burden is unusual and severe.

The law permits the RFC to step into a community that has been struck and make 3% loans for the repair or rebuilding of homes and 5% loans on similar business loans. Even churches and schools may be eligible for this type of aid.

There is a provision under Civil Defense for direct grants to aid in reconstruction, provided a showing is made that the State and local agencies have exerted their own efforts. This program is in its nature supplemental to local assistance.

Then, of course, the American Red Cross lends its aid not only during and immediately following the storm, but during the reconstruction period when grants are sometimes made to assist needy people in rebuilding.

Here in Washington every agency, from the White House on down, has been contacted concerning the various forms of supplemental aid when the need is shown. We have been given assurances of solicitude and the promise of sympathetic consideration when the facts are in and the need for outside help is demonstrated.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth—Fed steers and yearlings ruled strong to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday. Stocker cattle and calves were active and uneventfully higher. Cows drew unchanged prices. Fat calves drew firm prices. Bulls were 50 cents to \$1 lower.

Spring lambs and shorn slaughter lambs sold strong to 50 cents higher. Milk fat lambs topped at \$27.50 a new high for the current crop. Shorn old crop lambs topped at \$23.50, a new high for the year.

Butcher hogs were 25 cents lower and topped at \$24.25 to \$24.50. Light sows were 50 cents higher and heavier weights sold weak to lower. Pigs \$21 down, sows \$19 to \$22.

Sales included a load of 1,078-lb. steers from J. H. Harrison & Co., Childress County; some \$21 and \$22 steers from Ellis Stark, Clay County; some 796 lb beeves from Ray Agnew, Rising Star and C. S. Anchicks. Calvert, had a load of 391-lb. steers at \$14.50. Weldon Flennikin, Marshall County, Oklahoma, sold a package of 527-lb. yearlings at \$18.50. A. Z. Goodwin, Gordonville, had a load of 453-lb. steers at \$22; and M. D. Rhoades, Dawson Co., had 22 steers at 857-lb. at \$23. Sam Gilbreath, Castro County, had 77 heifers at 695-lb. at \$21; W. G. So now "Doc" says that the

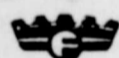
whole PTA is thinking of signing up for night school!

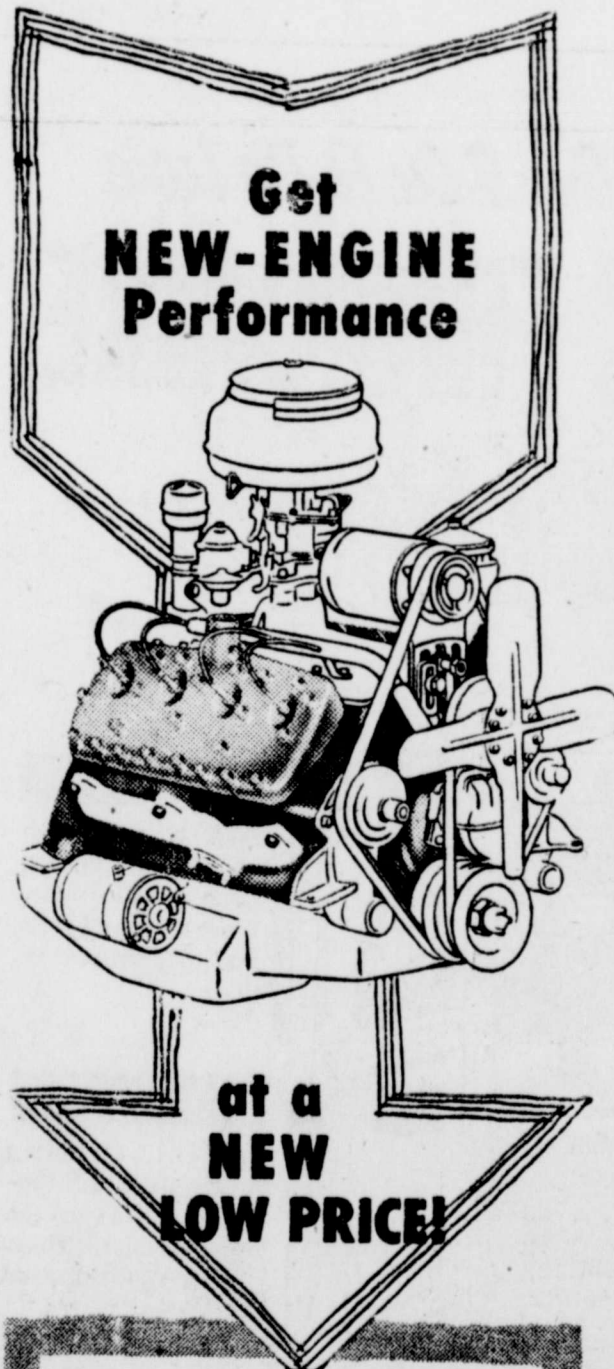
