Last week the club voted to get two new highway signs for each end of town on the highway. The club voted to order the signs, and two members agreed to pay for them.

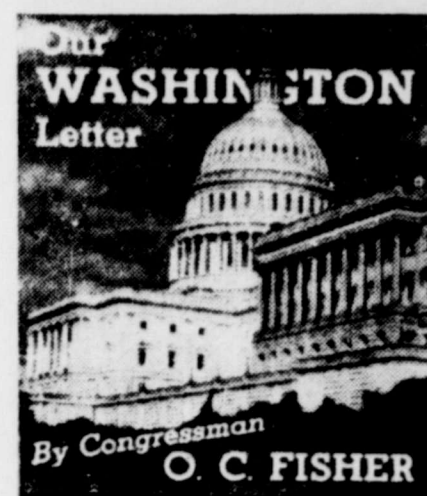

GRINDING TOWARD an adjournment, the House last week worked day and night on legislation that has stockpiled in recent weeks. The House adopted a House Senate conference report limiting new public housing starts to 2,000 during this fiscal year. The report included language prohibiting any additional commitments for new units to begin after the present year. It all adds up to the probable end of socialized housing, a year hence. The experiment has been very expensive for taxpayers and in the metropolitan areas has been mixed in politics and some corruption.

The House also passed a bill providing funds in the sum of \$150,000,000 for drought relief loans. This will be used along with Farmers Home Administration activities to make up a revolving fund, and should allow ample money to meet the needs for disaster loans.

The House put its approval on the foreign aid bill for \$4 1/2 billion. This was a substantial reduction below the requests that were made. I voted against it because of the inclusion of a billion dollars for purposes which I consider foreign to military assistance. The war has been over for 10 years and the various nations have had ample time and assistance in economic recovery. Most of them are as well or better off than they were before the war and I cannot see the justification for pumping more and more money into such places except where for military reasons it is to the interest of security. Entirely too much of the appropriation is to be used for purposes that have only remote connection with military preparedness.

Nonfat Dry Milk Desserts

Here's how to make nourishing milk desserts with nonfat dry milk solids. Nonfat dry milk is the magic ingredient in many recipes today. Reliquified milk powder may be used in place of milk for economy. Or, the dry milk solids can be added along with fresh milk as a nutritional supplement.

And for you ladies (and men too) who are in reducing moods, nonfat dry milk is used in many diets. So, why not prepare desserts that are economical and also emphasize the reducing theme? Rennet desserts are excellent in this respect and here you will find complete instructions for preparation.

To use nonfat milk solids in place of whole milk, add 8 to 9 tablespoons of milk powder to 2 cups of water. Mix as directed on the package of milk powder. Then, use in place of milk.

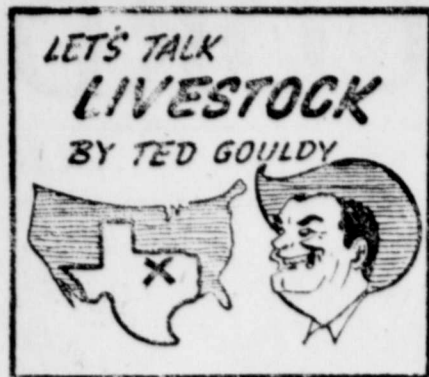
Rennet Dessert

3-9 tablespoons nonfat dry milk solids
2 cups water
1 package rennet powder

Mix dry milk solids with water as directed on package of milk powder. Allow foam to settle.

Set out 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm, (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time.

*If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding rennet powder, or it will not set.



Fort Worth—Receipts were of moderate size at Fort Worth, but were heavy around the major marketing circle Monday and cattle and calf trade developed slowly. Most slaughter cows and bulls were 25 to 50 cents lower, and fat calves were steady to 50c lower. Stocker and feeder cattle and calves of the higher grades were about steady, but the medium and lower grades were easier. Slaughter steers and yearlings were in small supply and generally steady.

Butcher hogs were 50 to 75 cents lower and topped at \$25.75 to \$26, while sows were largely steady.

Slaughter lambs drew steady to strong prices, and other slaughter sheep were fully steady. Stockers and feeders sold steady.

Good and choice slaughter steers

and yearlings sold for \$17 to \$22-75, some mixed steers and heifers at \$22.75. Common and medium kinds sold from \$12 to \$17, with cull yearlings from \$8 to \$12.

Fat cows cleared at \$9.50 to \$12.50, and canners and cutters sold for \$6 to \$9.50. Bulls cashed at \$8 to \$12.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$16 to \$18.50, a few outstanding calves to \$19 and \$20. Common and medium slaughter calves sold from \$10 to \$15, and culls cashed at \$8 to \$10.

Good and choice stocker calves sold for \$15 to \$20.50 and yearlings steers sold from \$13 to \$19 down. Stocker cows sold from \$10 to \$16.

Good and choice butcher hogs averaging 185 to 250 pounds sold at \$25.75 to \$26. Lighter and heavier weights sold for \$22 to \$25.50. Sows cashed at \$20 to \$23, and pigs sold from \$22 down.

Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$20 to \$23.50, and cull to medium lambs sold from \$10 to \$18. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$12 to \$17.75. Medium and good slaughter yearlings drew \$12 to \$15, and old wethers sold from \$7 to \$9. Slaughter ewes sold from \$4 to \$5.50 and some solid mouthed ewes sold breeders up to \$9 to \$10.

Big Spring Cowboy Reunion Aug. 5-6-7-8

Plans have been completed by the Big Spring Cowboy Reunion Association for the organization's annual rodeo which will be held on the evenings of Aug. 5-6-7-8, it has been announced by Tom Good, president of the group.

This year's rodeo, which will be held in the Rodeo Bowl, in the southwest part of Big Spring, will be produced by Tommy Steiner of Austin, and will include all the usual rodeo events and a number of the rodeo world's outstanding specialty acts.

It will be officially opened at 4 p.m. Wednesday, August 5, with a parade through Big Spring which will include city, county and rodeo officials, bands and drill teams from Webb Air Force Base contestants, members of visiting posses and others. Many floats have been scheduled for the parade, it has been announced.

This year's prize money will be approximately \$3,600 and cowboys and cowgirls from many distant points are expected to enter the contests.

Each of these four performances will start at 8 p.m.

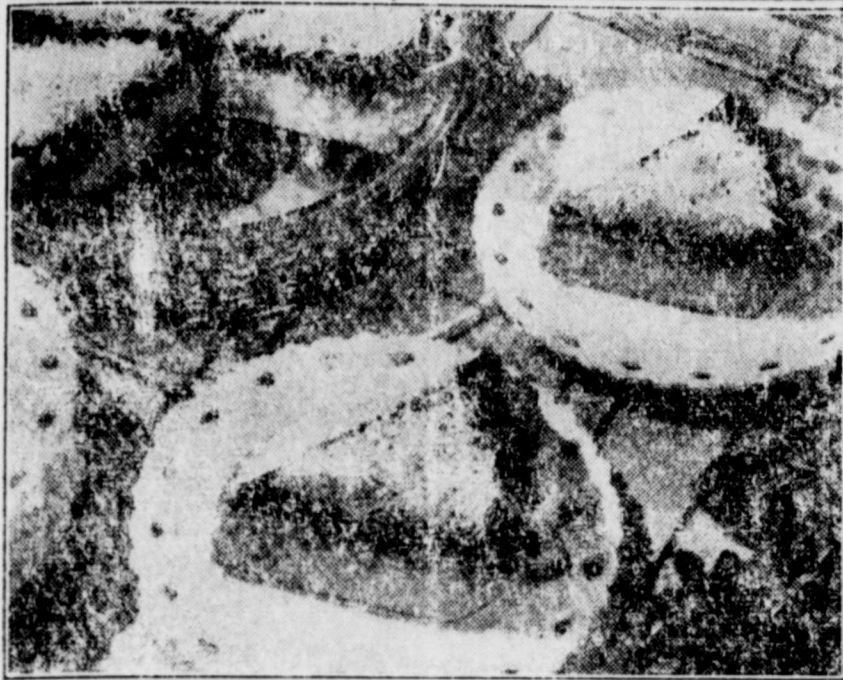

A "Worthy" Pie

Here's a pie that's worthy of you! Yes, you can truly serve this Chocolate Crested Coconut Pie with pride. Smooth, firm custard, filled with lots of tender coconut; a crest of rich, dark chocolate garnished with additional coconut; and a tender, flaky pie shell all add up to a mouth-watering dessert that's sure to be enjoyed thoroughly, requested often.

Chocolate Crested Coconut Pie
4 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 to 1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup coconut
1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell

Combine eggs, sugar, salt, milk, vanilla and coconut; mix well. Pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 30 minutes, or until custard is set.
Combine sugar and chocolate. Add hot water gradually, blending well. Pour chocolate mixture on top of baked pie. Reduce oven to 300° F. and bake 7 to 10 minutes longer, or until chocolate is set. Cool. Garnish with additional coconut.

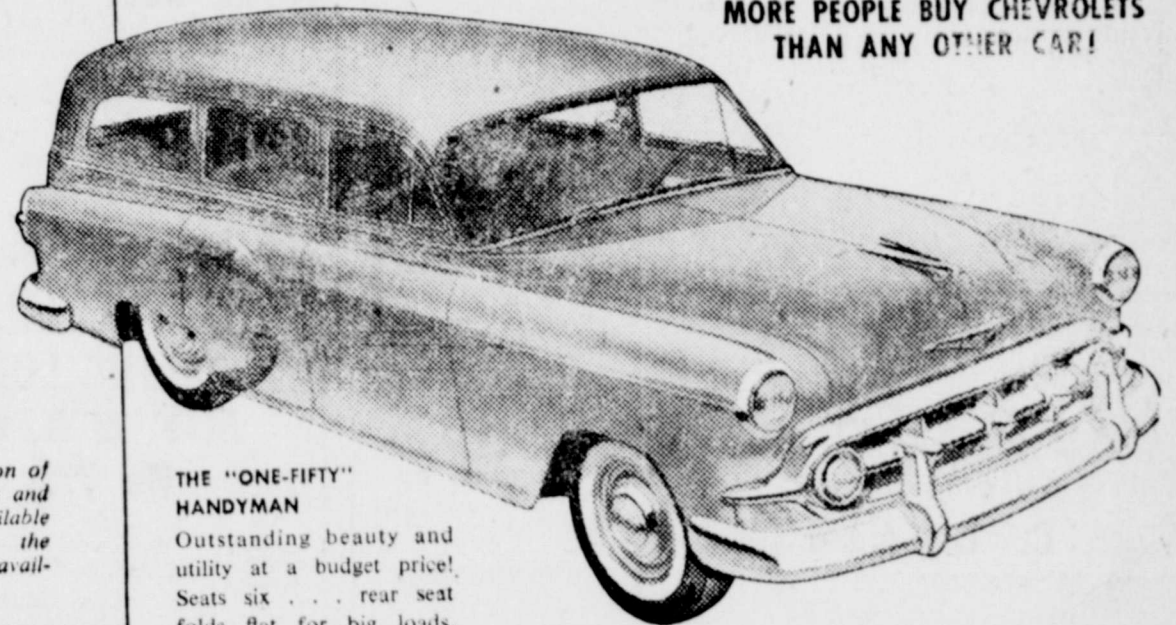

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Glamour Gal!

GIVE a girl a new party dress and presto—she's a new woman! We tried the same technique on that favorite, "gal" of the food world, lemon pudding and pie filling mix. First, for a touch of color and spice we added ginger snap cook crumbs; then we gave her a topping of sweetened whipped cream for that elegant look—and, oh my!—What a dish!

Ginger Lemon Squares

1 1/4 cups fine gingersnap cook crumbs; 3 tablespoons sugar; 1/4 cup butter, melted.

1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; 1/2 cup sugar; 2 cups water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 tablespoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 2 tablespoons sugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 5 minutes. Cool.

Combine pudding mix, 1/2 cup sugar, and 1/4 cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1/2 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and blend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto baked crumb mixture. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in rectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes 8 servings.

Lady In Distress?

IF it's lack of time that distresses you during this busy spring housecleaning period, let pre-cooked rice come to your rescue! You can stay with your chores till practically the last minute and still prepare a delicious main course dish that will really satisfy Dad and the kids—Hearty Supper Salad.

Hearty Supper Salad

1/2 cup packaged pre-cooked rice, 1/4 cup water; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup mayonnaise; 1 teaspoon grated onion; 1/4 teaspoon salt; dash of pepper; 1 cup sliced cooked ham; 1 cup sliced Swiss cheese; 1 cup cooked peas; 1/4 cup chopped dill pickle; 1 or 2 firm ripe tomatoes, cut in wedges.

Combine rice, water, and 1/4 teaspoon salt in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil—over high heat, uncovered, fluffing rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes, then uncover and let cool to room temperature.

About 1 hour before serving, combine mayonnaise, grated onion, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and the pepper. Mix well to blend. Add ham, cheese, peas, pickle, and the rice, mixing lightly with a fork. Chill. Serve on crisp lettuce and garnish with tomato wedges. Makes 4 servings.

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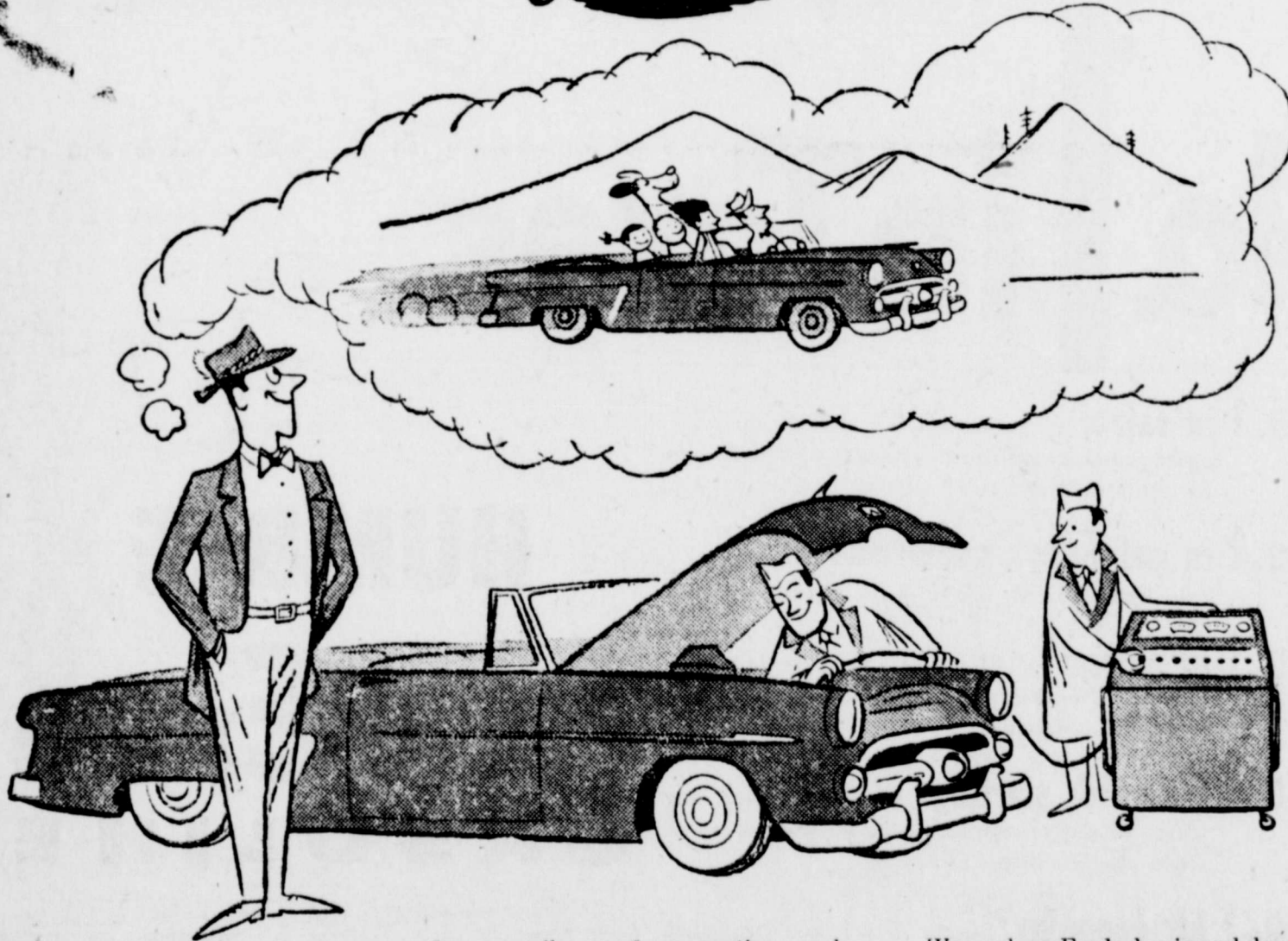
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Fun For All

IT'S a party all right, whenever this delightful Lemon Fluff pudding appears on the scene. If you happen to be the cook, you'll have fun, too, 'cause this dessert is so easily made with vanilla pudding and pie filling mix. Use Minted Whipped Cream for an extra plus in taste and looks. Lemon Fluff Pudding
1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix; 2 cups milk; 1/4 cup lemon juice; 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind; 1 egg white; Minted Whipped Cream.

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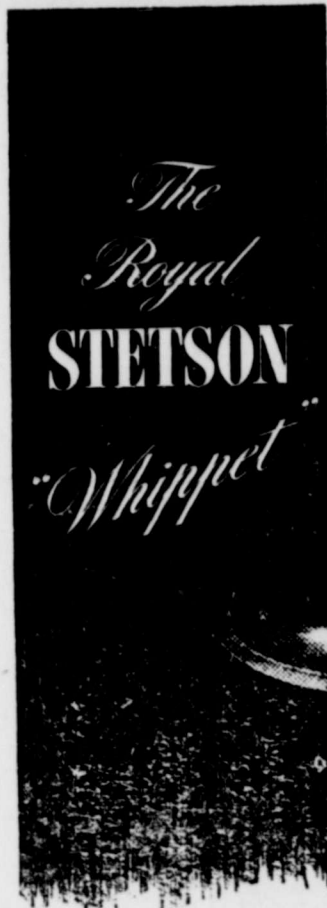

Combine pudding mix and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool, stirring occasionally. Then add almond extract. Fold in beaten egg whites. Split ladyfingers and cut in half. For each serving, place 4 pieces ladyfingers (or cake) in sherbet glass and fill with pudding. Makes 6 servings.

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
