## HEALTH TALKS

Prepared by the State Medical Association of Texas

Probably long before primitive man learned to make fire, he had discovered that some form of heat—such as the sunshine or a natural hot spring—eased muscles that had become stiff and sore from dwelling in a cold, moist cave.

Heat and some of the other agents (such as cold, massage, and electricity) included in the specialty known as physical medicine are almost as old as man himself, but in recent years a great deal more has been learned about them. Special equipment for giving physical therapy has been developed, some of it elaborate and requiring an operator who has had special training in its use, for example, a diathermy machine for applying heat to the inner organs of the body.

The doctor who specializes in physical medicine is known as a "physicist" (fiz-e-at-rist). A person skilled in giving this kind of treatment is a physical therapist. The therapist does not work alone but under the direction of a doctor. Not only physiatrists but other doctors may and do prescribe physical therapy.

Physical therapy may relieve pain, promote early motion of the affected part of the body, prevent deformity, and reduce the recovery period, whether the patient has a disease like arthritis or an injury such as a broken bone. In arthritis, physical medicine was being used in combination with drugs with good results even before the days of ACTH and cortisone. Arthritis does not involve just one joint or one area of the body, it is a general disease. Treatment includes attention to a well-balanced program of rest and exercise, diet, and other accepted methods of treatment.

Physical therapy for a broken

bone can be started even before the bone is set; sometimes cold is used to keep swelling down and reduce pain. Perhaps the cast is split down one side and "hinged" so that the limb can be removed carefully and treated with heat and gentle massage. Later, when healing is sufficient, exercises may be given under the doctor's direction.

For the treatment of arthritis and broken bones, as well as for other conditions, many different types of physical treatment are available. Examples are the following: 1. Heat: hot water bottle, diathermy machine. 2. Cold: ice bag, cold water bath. 3. Light: sunbathing, infra-red lamp. 4. Electricity: diathermy machine. 5. Water: hot and cold contrast bath, whirlpool bath. 6. Mechanical devices: shoulder wheel, crutch or brace. 7. Massage: stroking, kneading; general local. 8. Exercise: Exercises for relaxation, coordination, improved breathing or posture.

A council of the American Medical Association offers a service in the appraisal of highly technical physical therapy equipment, and if a manufacturer wishes, he may submit a new apparatus for review. A good rating is an assurance of safety and efficiency.

Frequently objects found around the home can be used to carry out physical therapy. For example, riding a bicycle may be suggested as a substitute for working the bicycle jigsaw found in an occupational therapy workshop.

Models to be used in the show include Jimmie Currie of Garden

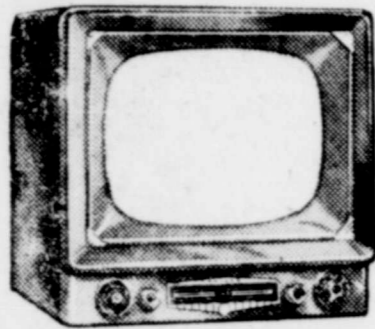

## Howard County College Prexy Speaks at PTA Meeting

Dr. Anthony Hunt, president of Howard County Junior College, was the principal speaker when the Sterling City Parent-Teacher Association held the first meeting of the year here Thursday night. The meeting was held in the school auditorium and the association held a reception following honoring the faculty and board members.

Dr. Hunt gave three things as the structure of American Society—the home, the church, and the school.

He pointed out that our school system in America was originally established so that people could read the Bible for themselves. That was the purpose our pioneers founded the schools for, reminded the Big Spring educator.

Progress has been throughout the years, said Dr. Hunt, by the people themselves—not the school men. People gradually insisted that certain subjects be taught universally, the schools became tax supported and free and finally compulsory, and non-secretarian.

Home, at first, said Hunt, was as simple—as was school—and now both are dependent on many things rather than being independent. And public schools have been forced to take on some of the duties of the home.—through the years.

Dr. Hunt stressed that we are going to have to entrench in our homes and schools the following four things:

1. Getting along with one another.
2. How to use our leisure time.
3. A spiritual awakening of faith.
4. An unselfish desire to serve.

He stressed the need for Americans to develop mentally, physically and spiritually.

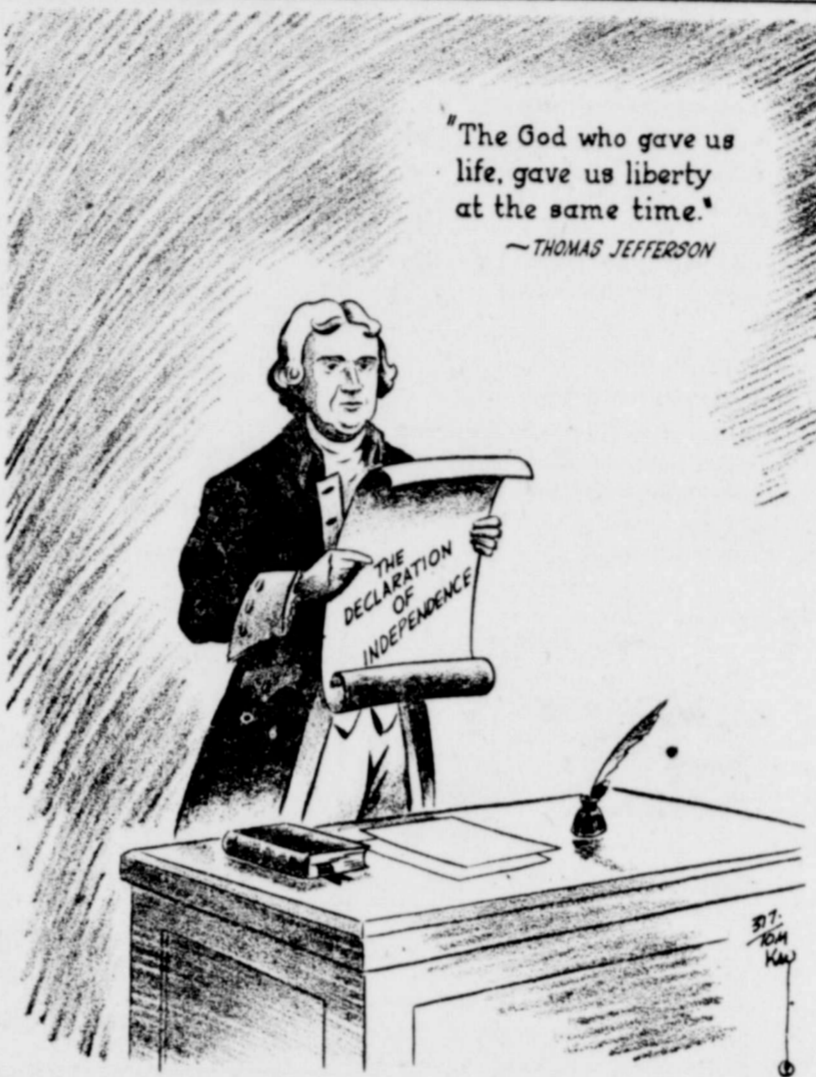

**Lemon Angel Cake**

1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; 1 1/2 cups water; 1 egg; 1/2 cup butter; 1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar; 10-inch angel food cake.

Combine pudding mix and 1/4 cup of water in saucepan. Add whole egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1 1/4 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened. (This takes about 5 minutes.) Remove from heat. Cool about 5 minutes; stir once or twice. Chill.

Cream butter until soft. Add sugar gradually, blending well after each addition. Add chilled pudding gradually, beating well with rotary egg beater.

Split cake into three layers. Spread frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

## Frostings Make The Cake



By JANE ASHLEY

The wonderful aroma of a home-made spice cake puts the family in a state of pleasant anticipation. But seeing the cake covered with a luscious frosting puts the sparkle in the eye. The first step is making the Spice Layer Cake. The corn syrup gives the cake good keeping qualities, if you are lucky enough to have any left for the second day.

### Spice Layer Cake

- 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 eggs, unbeaten

Have all ingredients at room temperature. Measure dry ingredients into sifter. Combine corn syrup and milk. Place butter in a bowl and stir with spoon to soften. Sift dry ingredients over butter. Add unbeaten eggs and half of syrup-milk mixture. Mix to combine all ingredients, then beat until thoroughly blended, about one minute. Add remaining liquid and beat again until blended, about 2 minutes. Turn batter into 2 greased and floured 8-inch layer pans. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 minutes. Cool and frost.

Choose from these two frostings. For a marshmallow type, we suggest the following:

### 7-Minute Frosting

- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Place egg whites, corn syrup, sugar and salt in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary beater until partially mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook, beating constantly with rotary beater until frosting stands in peaks, about 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from heat and continue beating about 1 minute longer. Add flavoring, beating in well. Make enough to cover top and sides of two 8 or 9-inch layers.

When you want a chocolate frosting use this excellent butter-cream type frosting with a new twist. The addition of corn syrup gives it rich creamy smoothness and good keeping qualities.

### Black Beauty Frosting

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup Karo Syrup, Red or Blue Label
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 3 1/2 cups (1 pound) sifted confectioners' sugar
- 1 to 2 tablespoons milk

Cream butter. Add corn syrup and vanilla blend. Add cocoa, mixing well. Add confectioners' sugar alternately with the milk, beat until smooth and creamy after each addition. Additional milk may be added, if necessary, to make a good spreading consistency. Makes enough to cover tops and sides of two 8-inch layers of cake.

**Snow Queen Frosting:** Follow recipe for Black Beauty Frosting. Use light cream. Omit cocoa. Increase

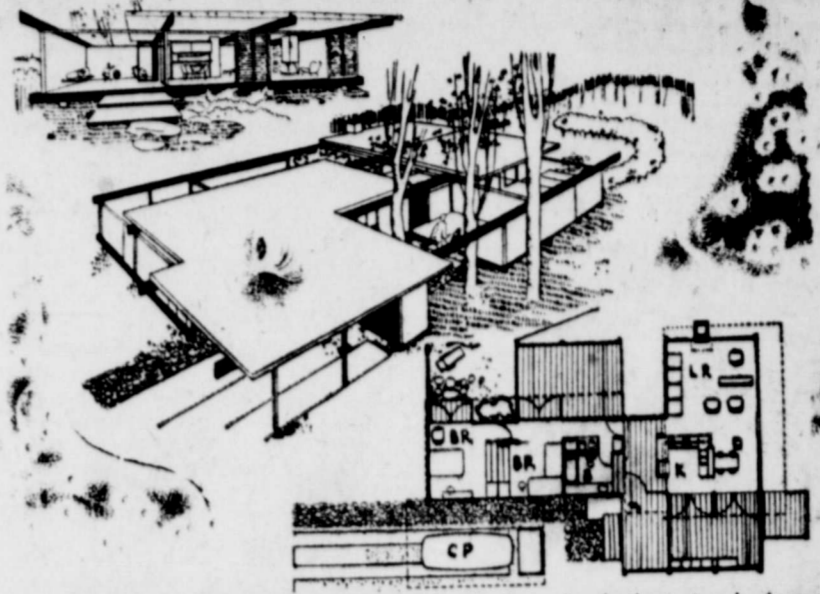

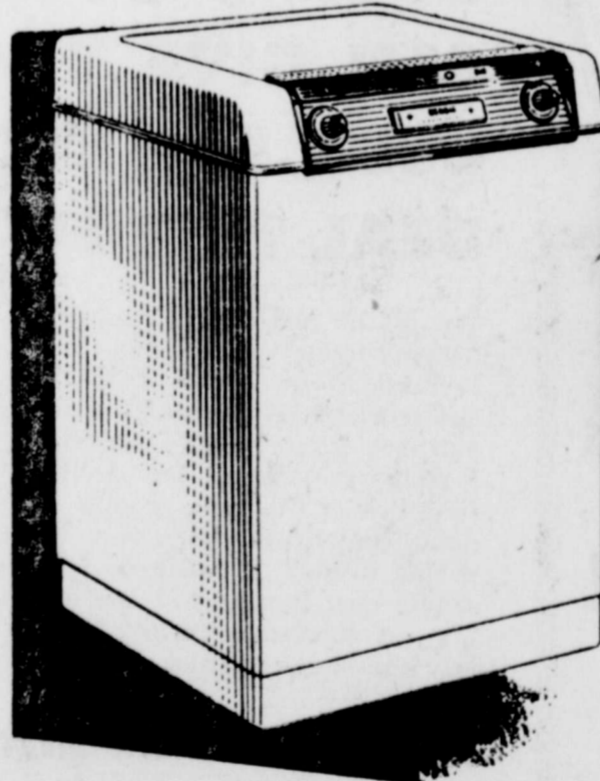
