CANCER CRUSADE GETS UNDERWAY HERE THURSDAY

The American Cancer Society's nationwide 1954 crusade for \$20,000,000 got off to a flying start in Sterling City April 1. Mrs. Anna Lee Johnson, ACS campaign chairman for Sterling, announced that the drive will swing into action with the **Third Annual Series of Diminishing Coffees** for participation chiefly among the women of the county, and it is hoped that special gifts, and one dollar memberships can be obtained from practically each citizen of the county. Let us make this drive as near 100 per cent participation as possible. As the drive opens, Mrs. Johnson expressed her confidence that Sterling County, as it has in past cancer crusade drives, will contribute its quota toward fighting the killer that took a death toll of 227,000 Americans last year.

The society has a year-round program of professional and public education, but during April—designated by President Eisenhower as Cancer Control Month—the cancer information program is presented additionally to individual Americans by volunteer workers during their house-to-house solicitation for crusade contributions. This approach will supplement the usual educational media of newspapers, magazines, motion pictures, radio, television, pamphlets, window displays and special exhibits.

District P.T.A. Meeting Held Here This Week

The Water Valley and Sterling City Parent-Teachers Associations were joint hosts to the Thirty-Third Annual Conference of the Sixth District, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers March 30-31.

Guests and managers began arriving Tuesday, the 30th. The two host school boards gave a dinner honoring the managers in the Sterling School cafeteria Tuesday evening.

Registration proper got underway Wednesday morning. The session was under the direction of Mrs. Sidney P. Bolding of San Angelo, president of the Sixth District. The morning was taken up by registering, opening, and conferences.

The Rev. Bruce Medford gave the invocation. Supt. G. C. Parsons of Water Valley and Sterling City P.T.A. president Mrs. Worth Allen welcomed the guests.

The two host school PTAs had a luncheon in the community center for the visitors at noon.

Various reports and judgments and discussions took place following the luncheon. Supt. A. E. Wells of Abilene schools made the principal address of the evening on "Your Schools and Mine."

Special Education Needs Stressed
Parents are sometimes overly protective toward the handicapped child, Mrs. A. K. Japhet of San Antonio told the delegates in her speech. A former board member of the Texas Congress Parents and Teachers, has been interested in promoting special education and aiding the exceptional child since before special education was officially recognized by the state legislature in 1945.

She explained the first step in obtaining a special educational school for exceptional children is the presence of five such children in the community. She emphasized the community should be "sold" on the importance of aiding physically and mentally handicapped children.

Mrs. Alexander McDonald, state vice-president, spoke on "Parent-Teacher Objects, Policies, and Structures."

Recommendations resulting from a state-wide survey were made by Donald McDonald, director of curriculum of Abilene Public Schools. His survey revealed P-TA's want more assistance from a state level on planning P-TA programs; clear cut local objectives create interest as do well planned programs; and P-TA fund raising projects should be cut to a minimum, thereby conserving effort to carry out other P-TA projects.

163 delegates attended the luncheon in the community center.

An Easy Change

GIVE a gal a new party dress and presto—she's a new woman. Try the same technique on that favorite "gal" of the food world, butterscotch pudding and pie filling mix, and presto—a delicious new dessert treat! And it's so easy. First, for an extra plus in flavor, add strong coffee, then a touch of luxury with whipped cream and pecan meats. Finally, garnish with individual baked meringue puffs—and, oh boy—what a dish!



Coffee-Scotch Cream

1 package butterscotch pudding and pie filling mix; 1 1/2 cups milk; 1/2 cup strong coffee; 1/2 cup cream, whipped; 1/2 cup broken pecan meats.

Combine pudding mix, milk and coffee in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Pour into bowl. (To avoid surface film, place waxed paper directly on surface of hot pudding.) Chill, then beat slowly with rotary egg beater. Fold in whipped cream and pecan meats. Turn into serving bowl. Garnish with individual baked meringues or whipped cream and additional nut meats. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

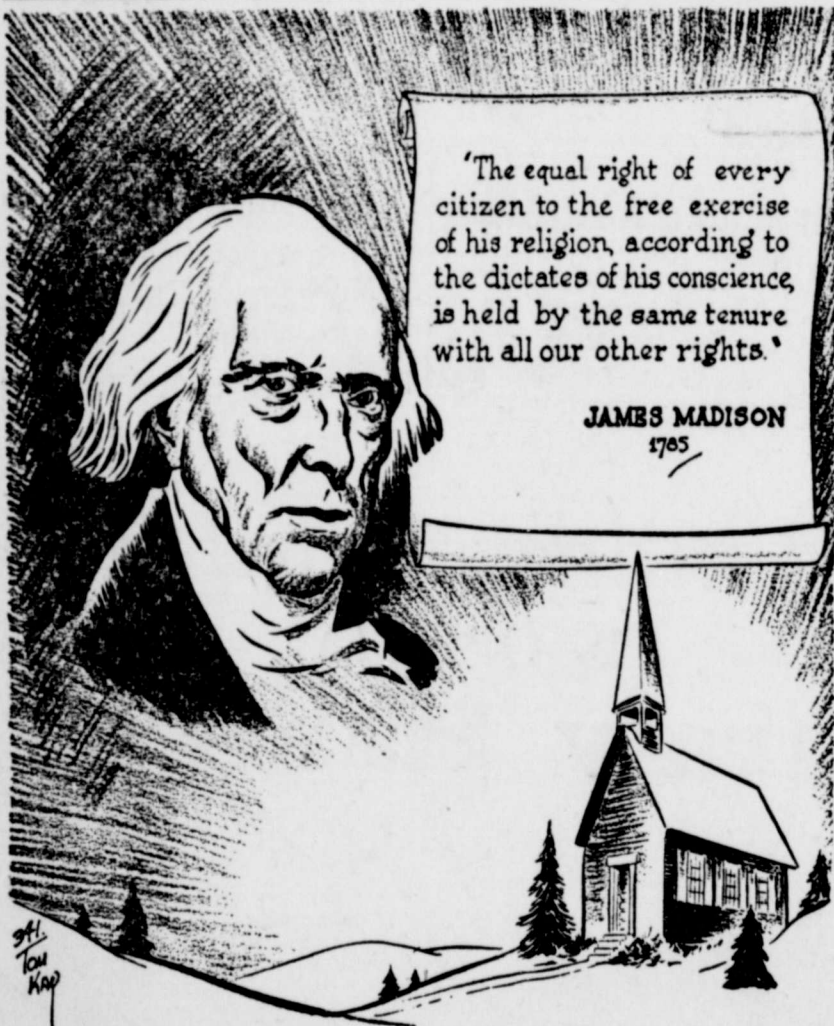

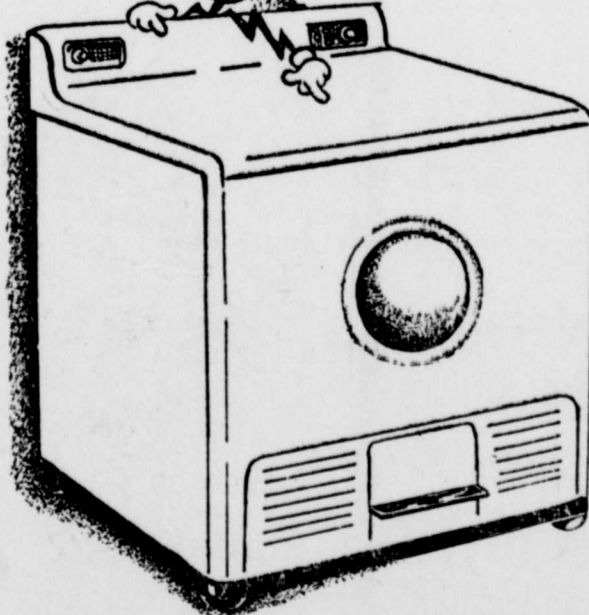

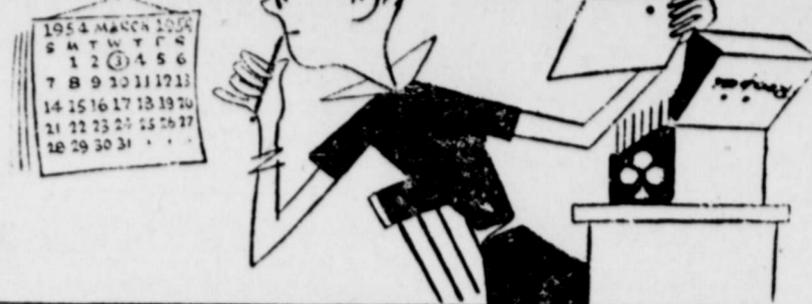

For the housewife who is intent on planning meals particularly desirable for the Lenten season—the following recipe suggestions are certain to please:

De Luxe Toppings for Pancakes.
Hot Buttered Syrup: Place 1 cup dark corn syrup and ¼ cup butter or margarine in saucepan. Bring to a boil and stir until syrup is well blended. Good on waffles or fritters too. Makes about 1½ cups.

Rich Syrup-Cream Sauce: Whip ½ cup heavy cream. Combine ½ cup dark corn syrup and ¼ cup brown sugar and gently fold into whipped cream until well blended. Sauce will be a good pouring consistency. Serve cold on pancakes, waffles or gingerbread. Good on ice cream too. Makes 1½ cups.

Jellied Cheese Salad

1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
 1 cup hot water
 ½ cup cold water
 1 tablespoon vinegar
 1 teaspoon salt
 Dash of pepper
 ¾ cup grated American cheese
 ¼ cup mayonnaise
 ¼ cup diced celery

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water, vinegar, salt and pepper. Chill until slightly thickened. Place in bowl of ice and water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Combine cheese and mayonnaise; fold into gelatin. Then fold in celery. Turn into individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. Garnish with additional mayonnaise. Makes 8 servings.

Salmon and Dill Pickle Salad

1½ cups packaged pre-cooked rice
 ½ teaspoon salt
 1½ cups boiling water
 ½ cup mayonnaise
 1 tablespoon dill pickle juice
 1 teaspoon onion juice
 ½ teaspoon salt
 Dash of pepper
 1 can (7 ounces) salmon, drained and flaked
 ½ cup cooked peas
 1 can diced dill pickle

Add rice and ¼ teaspoon salt to boiling water in saucepan. Mix just to moisten all rice. Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 13 minutes. Then uncover and let cool to room temperature.

About 1 hour before serving, combine mayonnaise, dill pickle juice, onion juice, ½ teaspoon salt, and the pepper. Mix well. Add salmon, pea dill pickle and the rice, mixing lightly with a fork. Chill. Serve on crisp salad greens. Makes 4 servings.

Rennet Dessert for Lent

2 cups milk (not canned)
 1 package rennet powder (any flavor)

Set out 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in the contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—no over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time.

If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding powder, or it will not set.

Hearty, flavorful lima beans and American cheese are combined to make this "Lima Friday Supper" a satisfying whole meal dish. With the casserole serve a hot green vegetable, a few crisp relishes and dessert to complete your meal.

Lima Friday Supper

2 cups California large dry limas
 5 cups water
 2 teaspoons salt
 1 (10½ ounce) can tomato soup
 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
 1 teaspoon vinegar
 1½ cups grated American cheese

Rinse limas, add water and soak overnight. Add salt, and boil 30 minutes to 1 hour, or until beans are tender. Drain, reserving liquid, and turn beans into baking dish. Heat soup with ½ cup cooking liquid from beans. Stir in Worcestershire sauce, vinegar and cheese, and stir over low heat until cheese is melted. Pour over drained limas. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 15 to 20 minutes, until thoroughly heated. Serves 6.
