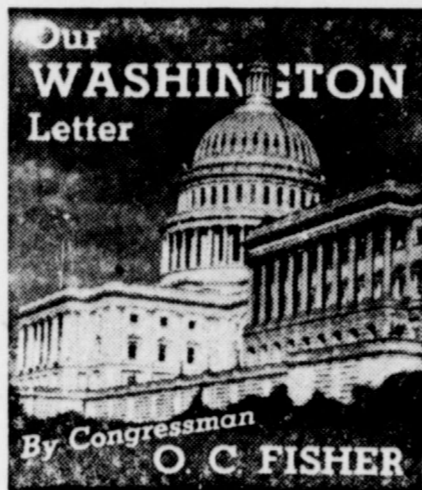

Mail from constituents is always interesting and welcome. Letters refer to a multitude of subjects, such as inquiries about legislation, problems pending before departments, rights and privileges of servicemen and their families, and scores of other subjects.

Perhaps a few examples of these taken at random from our daily mail, will be of interest. Here are a few:

Gus Doerffler, Secretary of Comfort Centennial, sends an invitation to attend the 100th anniversary of Comfort, to be held on August 14.

Answer: I promise to be there, to join in appropriate tribute to the pioneers of Kendall County who during a hundred years of glorious history have contributed so much to the community, our State and the Nation.

A Melvin farmer inquires whether there is anything to a report that Congressmen are entitled to \$3,000 personal income tax exemption?

Answer: No, the report is false and unfounded. Congressmen and Senators are accorded the same identical income tax exemption of \$600 that is allowed to every other American taxpayer -- no more and no less. There is a law which places a \$3,000 ceiling or limit on the amount of legitimate official business expenses a Congressman or Senator may, if such expense occurs and is properly certified, deduct each year. There is no ceiling or limit whatever, however, on the amount that any other taxpayer may deduct annually for legitimate business expenses.

A Brownwood student wants to know if it is likely a constitutional amendment giving 18-year-old people the right to vote will be submitted this year?

Answer: No; a resolution to do that failed to get the requisite two-thirds vote when considered by the Senate recently.

## H-Bomb Color Film Now Available

Congressman O. C. Fisher has authorized this newspaper to announce that a 30-minute film in technicolor of the first hydrogen bomb test in history may be borrowed for local showing by writing him in Washington.

The 16-mm film, purchased by Fisher from the Atomic Energy Commission, was made by the Air Force during the "Operation Ivy" test in the South Pacific. It will be recalled that after viewing the spectacular explosion, a sailor wrote home that "an island disappeared."

Fisher says he thinks it would be a good thing if every American could see this showing of the destructive power of the H-Bomb. He is making the film available to schools, clubs, or other gatherings for programs or special occasions.

## Strawberry Stretcher

WHEN the strawberry, that ruby queen of fruits, first appears on the market, scarcity and price cause its devotees to cast about for "stretching" methods. One way is to combine with quick-cooking tapioca in a Strawberry Tapioca Pudding. Tapioca is delicately neutral in flavor so won't intrude upon the juicy freshness of the berries, yet with its help, 1 1/2 cups of fresh berries yield 5 to 6 servings.

### Strawberry Tapioca Pudding

1 egg white; 2 tablespoons sugar.  
1 egg yolk; 2 cups milk; 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; 1 1/2 cups crushed, sweetened strawberries.

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with about 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, tapioca, and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly—this takes 5 to 8 minutes.

Pour small amount of hot tapioca mixture gradually on beaten egg white, blending well. Then quickly add the remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffier the pudding will be.) Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Fold in strawberries. Spoon lightly into serving dishes and garnish with a few whole berries, if desired. Serve plain or with cream. Makes 5 to 6 servings.

Saturday, July 31, has been set as the date for the mass X-raying of Sterling County residents by the State Department of Health X-ray unit. The department is staging campaign here as the result of being asked by the Noratadata Club. Mrs. Martin C. Reed was named chairman for the affair with Mr. O. T. Jones as co-chairman.

A group of interested people met at the courthouse Wednesday morning with Phil Gauss of the Texas State Department of Health to make plans for the X-raying. Present among interested persons included R. T. Caperton, O. T. Jones, Mrs. Roy Morgan, Mrs. J. Q. Foster, Cecil Long, Dr. Wm. Swann, Mrs. Delbert Haralson, Judge G.C. Murrell, Mrs. Mildred Emery, Mrs. Chesley McDonald and Jack Douthitt. The six major committee members will be named at a later date, and plans will be announced from week to week.

All citizens 15 years old or over are to be X-rayed. Children do not have TB except when an older member of the family has it, so no children will be X-rayed. The findings include not only tuberculosis but lung cancer and enlarged hearts, pointed out Gauss. The goal of the program is 100 percent of the population of the ages mentioned. Gauss pointed out that if TB is found in early stages it can be relatively easily cured.

The club sponsored the mass X-rays back in 1949 and only 577 people were X-rayed. Gauss said people should have their chests X-rayed at least once each year. The older people are the ones that need it worst—because they constitute the reservoir of TB left in the state. The young people are the ones, though, who catch it from the older ones when it is not known. TB is contracted only by constant association of persons with people who have TB in the infectious stage, pointed out the health official.

The X-raying only takes a minute or so. No clothes have to be removed and a minutes precaution in this matter may save your life or the life of one of your family.

Entering into the campaign with the Noratadata Club are members from the Lions Club and the Wimdousis Club of Sterling City.

The hours for the X-raying on July 31 will be from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. As last time, the machines are to be set up in the showroom of the Sterling Motor Company.

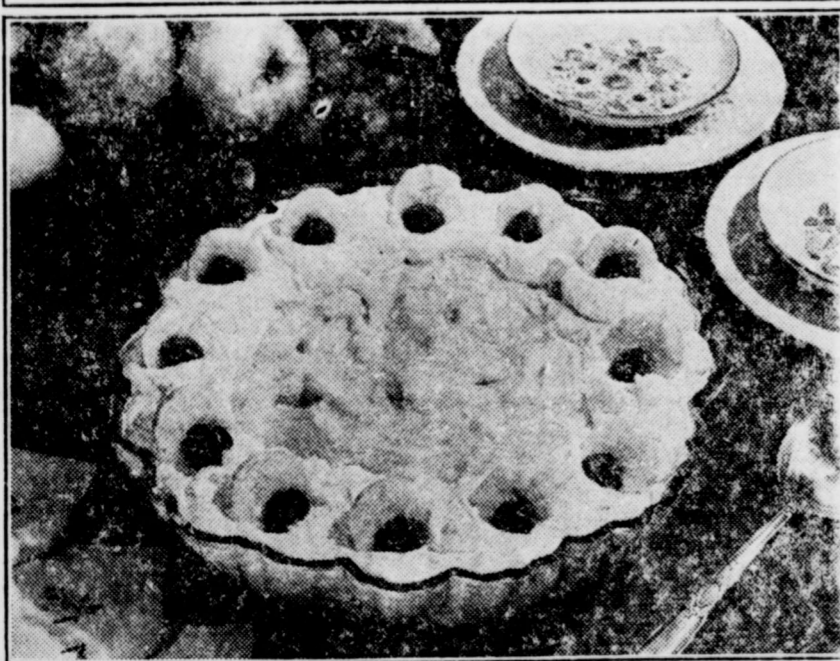

### Banana Coconut Cream Pudding

1 package coconut cream pudding and pie filling mix  
2 cups milk  
1/2 cup cream, whipped and sweetened  
Banana slices  
Maraschino cherries

Place pudding mix in saucepan.

Add milk gradually, blending well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened. Turn into serving bowl. Chill. Pile whipped cream around edge of pudding. Arrange banana slices and maraschino cherries on whipped cream. Makes 4 servings.

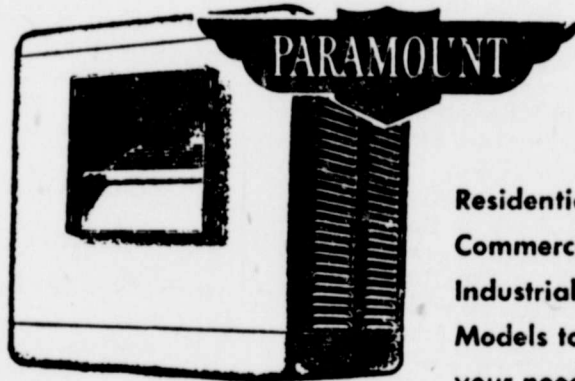

## The Jokes On Texas

Slim, walking into the post office, saw a new sign which read, "Man Wanted for Robbery in California." At which Slim exclaimed, "Gosh, if that job was only in Texas, I'd take it!"

With this story and many more like it, all good-naturedly lampooning Texas and Texans, John Randolph today introduced to Texas his new book, "The Jokes on Texas."

"Texas Brags", Randolph's first book, has become a guide to Texans everywhere in pointing out Texas' glories. "The Jokes on Texas" is just the converse, with cartoons, jokes and stories on Texas' weather, geography, habits and inhabitants. Randolph describes the new one as a healthy companion, or call it an antidote, if you will, for "Texas Brags."

Rib tickling from cover to cover, "The Jokes on Texas" was compiled by Randolph over a seven-year period, and published to prove to natives and to non-Texans that Texans can laugh at themselves as hard as they brag.

The book is colorfully illustrated with cartoons from the drawing boards of outstanding Texas artists plus those of many non-Texans. The jokes are from that mysterious telegraphy which is the nerve system for the American sense of humor, and, as usual, Randolph shows that the best are Texan!

In the book's introduction, Randolph says, "... it doesn't matter to the Texan that he comes out on the short end so long as the situation has a twist that makes him smile." And he proves it with 64 pages of hilarity.

Author Randolph is a Texan by choice who moved to Houston from his native Florida in 1938. As an advertising man he created the "Texas Brags" theme for a series of advertisements developed for a client. He put it into book form while in the Army, stationed at Marfa and later at Brownsville, in the Texas National Guard 124th Cavalry.

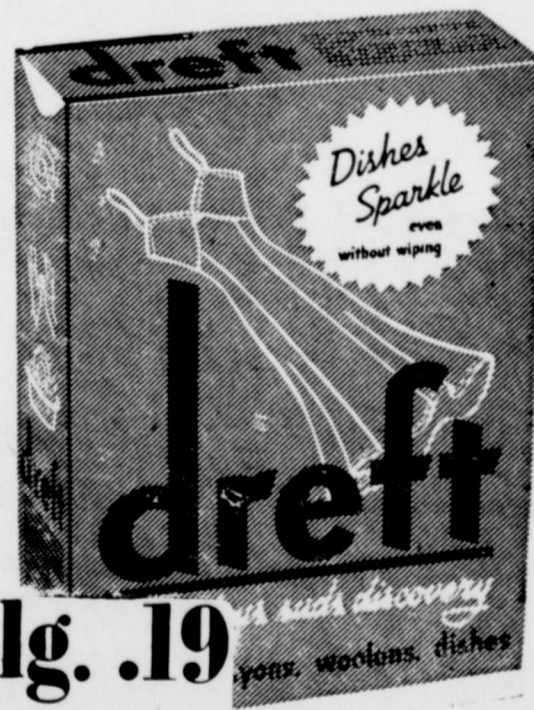

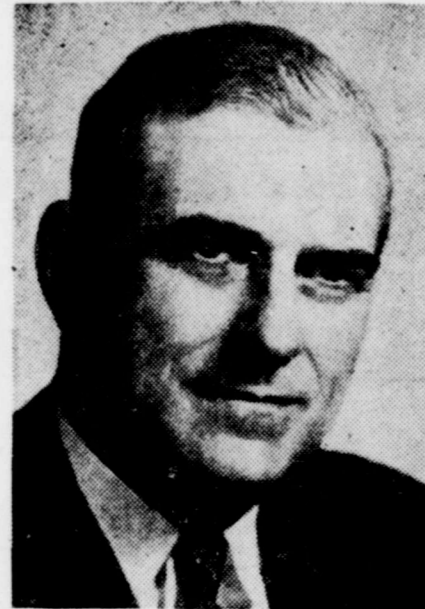
