

H-Bomb Color Film Now Available

Congressman O. C. Fisher has authorized this newspaper to announce that a 30-minute film in technicolor of the first hydrogen bomb test in history may be borrowed for local showing by writing him in Washington.

The 16-mm film, purchased by Fisher from the Atomic Energy Commission, was made by the Air Force during the "Operation Ivy' test in the South Pacific. It will be recalled that after viewing the spectacular explosion, a sailor wrote home that "an island disappeared."

Fisher says he thinks it would be a good thing if every American could see this showing of the destructive power of the H-Bomb. He is making the film available to schools, clubs, or other gatherings for programs or special occasions.

Strawberry Stretcher

By Betty Barclay

W HEN the strawberry, that ruby queen of fruits, first appears on the market, scarcity and price cause its devotees



to cast about for "stretching" methods. On e way is to combine with quickcooking tapioca in a Strawberry Tapioca Pud. ding. Tapioca is

delicately neutral in flavor so won't intrude upon the juicy freshness of the berries, yet with its help, 11/2 cups of fresh berries yield 5 to 6 servings.

Strawberry Tapioca Pudding 1 egg white; 2 tablespoons sugar.

1 egg yolk; 2 cups milk; 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; 11/2 cups crushed, sweet-

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with about 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 table-spoons sugar, salt, tapioca, and re-maining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a ooil, stirring constantly-this takes 5 to 8 minutes.

Pour small amount of hot taploca mixture gradually on beaten egg white, blending well. Then quickly add the remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffler the pudding will be.) Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Fold in strawberries. Spoon lightly into serving dishes and garnish with a few whole berries, if desired. Serve plain or with cream. Makes 5 to 6 servings.

The six major committee members will be named at a later date, and plans will be announced from week to week.

All citizens 15 years old or over are to be X-rayed. Children do not have TB except when an older member of the family has it. so no children will be X-rayed. The findings include not only tuberculosis but lung cancer and enlarged hearts, pointed out Gauss. goal of the program is 100 percent of the population of the ages mentioned. Gauss pointed out that if TB is found in early stages it can be relatively easily cured.

The club sponsored the mass X-rays back in 1949 and only 577 people were X-rayed. Gauss said people should have their chests Xrayed at least once each year. The older people are the ones that need it worst-because they constitute the reservoir of TB left in the state. The young people are the ones, though, who catch it from the older ones when it is not known. TB is contracted only by constant association of persons with people who have TB in the infectious stage, pointed out the health official.







The Jokes On Texas

Slim, walking into the post ofice, saw a new sign which read, 'Man Wanted for Robbery in Calfornia." At which Slim exclaimed, Gosh, if that job was only in Texas, I'd take it!"

With this story and many more ike it, all good-naturedly lampooning Texas and Texans, John Randolph today introduced to Texas his new book, "The Jokes on Texas.

"Texas Brags", Randolph's first book, has become a guide to Texans everywhere in pointing out Texas' glories. "The Jokes on Texas" is just the converse, with cartoons, jokes and stories on Texas' weather, geopraphy, habits and inhabitants. Randolph describes the new one as a healthy companion, or call it an antidote, if you will, for "Texas Brags."

Rib tickling from cover to cover, "The Jokes on Texas" was compiled by Randolph over a seven-year period, and published to prove to natives and to non-Texans that Texans can laugh at themselves as hard as they brag.

The book is colorfully illustrated with cartoons from the drawing boards of outstanding Texas artists plus those of many non-Texans. The jokes are from that mysterious telegraphy which is the nerve system for the American sense of humor, and, as usual, Randolph shows that the best are Texan!

In the book's introduction, Randolph says, it doesn't matter to the Texan that he comes out on the short end so long as the situation has a twist that makes him smile." And he proves it with 64 pages of hilarity.

Author Randolph is a Texan by choice who moved to Houston from his native Florida in 1938. As an advertising man he created the "Texas Brags" theme for a series of advertisements developed for a client. He put it into book form while in the Army, stationed at Marfa and later at Brownsville, in the Texas National Guard 124th Cavalry.


