



Couldn't place a new subscriber named Clark, but I found out who they were last week when they dropped in The Clarion's office.



Gently drop in the garnish of bright, rosy-red pimiento pieces or cut-outs; and play up the fact that soup is the star of the meal by placing a fat pimiento star in the center of each bowlful. Children will love the colorful bits of red floating in the soup, and everyone will enjoy the piquant flavor. Watch the spoons fly!

Note: Pimiento garnishes added to canned soup will give it a party-planned look and taste




