## County Agent's Column

The time is here to be planning the home garden. This year try some of the new varieties of tomatoes which have been tailor-made for Texas and its hot dry temperatures. Red Cloud, Summer Prolific, and Firesteel are some of the new ones. Many plant the old stand-by, the Porter, which is good. As a rule these are not large tomatoes, but are fairly heavy bearers.

Now is the time to fertilize your lawn if you want to give it a boost. Apply at the rate of 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. That would be 40 pounds of 5-10-5 or 12 pounds of 16-20-0 per 1,000 square feet.

Water only when the yard shows a definite need. Soak the soil to a depth of at least 6 inches when the grass takes on a wilt. Light frequent sprinklings produce shallow roots and encourage weeds. Shallow roots are unable to utilize moisture and plant food.

If you have been wondering what to do about your flower beds that need working over, why not have your soil tested and see what it needs. Forms and instructions are available at the county agent's office. The analysis will be run by the Soil Testing Service at Texas A. and M. College and costs only \$1.00.

At our first 4-H Club grass identification workout for the year several new prospective team members were there. Those working out were Cecilia and Don McDonald, LeRuth Reed, Jodie Green, Lee Foster and Jerry Payne. Don, LeRuth and Jodie were team members last year while Jerry, Lee and Cecilia are trying it for the first time.

**CLUB NETS \$167 FROM SALES**

The members of the Sterling City Lions Club were "Fuller Brush Salesmen" Wednesday of this week when they sold brooms, mops, rubber door mats, ironing board covers and pads, hot pads and dust cloths for the Blind Caravan. All articles were made by blind people in the Lighthouse Factories and Blind Workshops in the Texas plants. Lions club members sell the entire output over the state for a 25% commission to carry on their good work with. Delbert Haralson, in charge of the sales for the club, said the profit was a little long, but the caravan invoiced the articles in and back for the club and he paid for all articles sold. (Somebody must have paid over price.)

Most of the canvassers were through after about an hour's selling, some being through by noon. Local citizens who knew of the sale, were all ready and gladly bought the merchandise from the Lions club members. Mr. Haralson expressed his appreciation to all for their purchases and the club as a whole thanks the residents of the town for the cooperation.

At the noon luncheon Wednesday it was reported that only about \$300 had been turned in on the Red Cross drive. People who have not given are urged to make a deposit of their gift at the bank. The quota was \$700 this year and not even half has been raised.

The 34th annual P-TA conference of District 6 was held in Del Rio on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

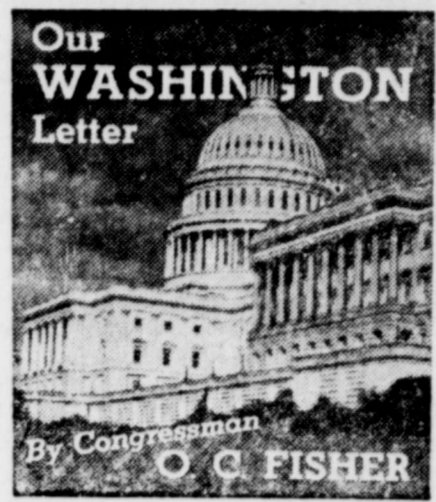
Presiding at the board meetings Tuesday was Mrs. Sid Bolding of San Angelo, district president.

BY A TWO-TO-ONE margin, the House last week approved the sale of the Government-owned synthetic rubber plants for \$300 million. Built early in the war to provide synthetic rubber in place of raw rubber taken over by the Japs in Southeast Asia, the plants mushroomed and amazed the world with the volume and quality of output. This was all done by the big rubber and oil companies which furnished patents, technicians and "know-how", and operated the plants under contract for Uncle Sam.

So, this being a business that is highly competitive, which can properly be conducted by private industry - and this being a free enterprise country as distinguished from a socialist country - it was, of course, proper for the Government to sell the plants, put them on tax rolls, and get out of that sort of business. Uncle Sam lost nothing on the venture.

A determined fight against approval of sales, using as a smoke-screen the claim that "small business" and the "little fellow" would be choked out of a supply source by the purchasers was waged. But the fallacy of that claim was exposed when it was shown that the new owners of the plants contracted to furnish nearly twice as much rubber as the small fabricators can use, at fair prices.

Speaking of "small business", perhaps the three most abused and misused terms these days are "small business", "little fellow", and "trickle down". In desperation the demagogue often turns to the use of these expressions in order to add a tone of respectability to an unsound argument. Without their consent and foreign to their best interests, monstrous sins are sometimes committed in their names.

A smooth-tongued orator can make a flood out of a "trickle" or vice versa. And "little fellow" often serves as a convenient ingredient of the politician in his otherwise unsavory concoctions.

One smooth-tongued advocate recently boasted that he is quite capable of cooking up a palatable morsel that is unbeatable. "Give me 10 minutes", he said, and I will take a batter of "small business", add a little "trickle down" sauce, and then sprinkle it with a touch of "little fellow" flavoring, and come out with a dish that will sell!"

### LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY

**FORT WORTH**—A total of 24,06 sheep and lambs arrived for Monday's trade at Fort Worth. The expected large offering was the biggest in a single day since May 1, 1950 when 25,100 were unloaded. Largest day prior to that was May, 1948 when 37,807 were talked up in one marketing day. Most unusual aspect of the big day was that it came so early in the season. Big movement of Texas lambs usually happens in May or June. The big offering was about 10 per cent milk fat lambs of the new crop aimed at the Easter trade. Lambs processed the forepart of the week will be sold to Easter lamb buyers in the North and East next week.

Trade opened 50 cents to \$1 lower on all sheep and lambs and prices slid downward to \$1 and spots \$2 lower by the close. Choice lambs now \$23 to \$25, and old crop fat lambs sold from \$20 down. Old ewers topped at \$14.

**AMPASAS COUNTY LAMB FEEDERS ON MARKET**  
The commercial lamb feeding program sponsored by the Lampasas Chamber of Commerce was climaxed with a trip to Fort Worth and the sale of the lambs fed by the young people. The shorn lambs sold with choice grades at \$19.50, and good grades at \$18.50.

**MOST CATTLE AND CALVES FULLY STEADY**

Trade on most classes of cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday was active and fully steady to strong. The only class experiencing some pressure was fed steers, earlings and heifers. Fed cattle old steady to weak, some of the latter quality fat cattle unevenly lower.

Cows were active and fully steady. Bulls sold stronger. Cows ranged up to \$14 and a few bulls old to \$14.50. Fed cattle sold mainly on \$23.50 down, though some nice yearlings from McClung Land Cattle Co., weighed up at \$25 on previous sale.

Topsy fat calves sold from \$19 to \$1.50 and stocker steer calves and coker steer yearlings sold from \$3 downward.

**The "Babe" Strikes Back**

You've all heard of "Babe" Dikrikson Zaharias. She's probably the world's greatest woman athlete. Guess she's won more golf tournaments both amateur and pro than any other woman, and probably few men, can equal. She made the All-American girls' basketball team three times; they called her the female Jim Thorpe when she won the 80-meter hurdles in the 1932 Olympics. She's an expert at the discus, shot-put, high jump, and was an Olympic winner in the javelin throw.

But her greatest contest was not while cameras clicked and crowds cheered. It was the battle she fought in a little hospital room down in Beaumont, Texas.

"Cancer tiptoed up to me," she said. "Robust health was something I considered as much my right as

the right to breathe. I never in my life played at anything, including living, that I didn't expect to win. Now, all of a sudden, maybe I wasn't going to win the big one."

But there in her little hospital room, with the doctors and nurses on the sidelines, while her husband George and her multitude of sports fans prayed, she began to win.

"Coming out of it," Babe said, "has left some deep marks on me spiritually. When George and I talk of God now, we feel we know Him. For He was there when we called on Him, each in our separate way. I want to live now because my life is fuller than it was before. I want to live for more than the thrill of busting a 260-yarder down the middle while the crowd cheers, or the joy of traveling with George, or the satisfaction of putting around our home. With all my strength, helped by the spiritual muscle I've developed, I want to help crush cancer into the earth."

Less than a year later, in Miami, Fla., Mrs. Zaharias won the 72-hole Serbin Women's Golf Tournament. As she walked off the green, she said: "I didn't think I would ever win another one." Since then she has gone on to add further triumphs to her record, perhaps one of the most impressive being to have won for the third time the Womens Open Golf Tournament on July 4, 1954.

And in winning, she has won not only for herself, but for all the handicapped persons who are trying to make a comeback. She has shown what the right sort of courage can do. And when she speaks over radio or TV for the American Cancer Society, as she frequently does, behind her earnest words lies the inspiration from the personal battle she won.

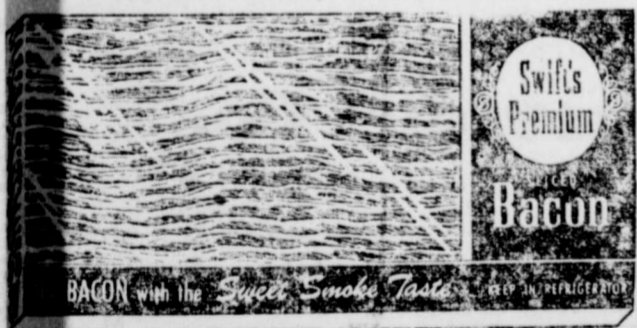
