REVISED RESERVE PROGRAM

The House and the Senate both approve a bill the House Armed Services Committee has sent to the floor for debate. It's probably about the best bill that can be worked out under present circumstances, and has the support of such organizations as the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Reserve Officers and the National Guard—the latter with some reservations. It is generally recognized that the present reserve program, at least in the Army, is very largely a slipshod manner in which the Army managed reserve training but it has been difficult to get a training program on men who have been released from duty. The new proposal, applicable to Korean veterans, makes it possible to recall a man to active duty for 45 days if he persists in refusing any of the alternatives available for reserve training.

Young men under 19 may, if they desire, volunteer for six months of basic training and then become attached to local reserve units, including the National Guard, for a period of 7½ years.

PRINCETON University, which predates the Revolution, retains on its campus old Nassau Hall where the Continental Congress once met, and which was frequented by George Washington. I visited the famous campus the other day to take part in a forum program sponsored by the American Whig-Clubs Debating Society. The forum also predates the Revolution and is now headed by Bruce Akers of Ohio. Incidentally, Akers' brother married a daughter of the Farmer-Johnson family last summer.

The late Professor Einstein's home is adjacent to the Princeton campus. Contrary to general belief, Einstein was never attached to Princeton. He did his experiments which unlocked many of the secrets of the universe, at a nearby Research foundation, privately funded and endowed.

Speaking of research, did you realize that the \$15 million spent by the Government and private industry to develop hybrid corn now brings in more than \$1 billion a year?

Last Club Meeting of the Year Features "Spanish Ambassador"

The Wimodausis Club held its last meeting of the club year on Wednesday, and the program was highlighted by a lecture with films given by Miss Lila Barrett, San Angelo's Community Ambassador to Spain during the past summer.

Miss Barrett was one of a group of 15 Americans in the experiment in international living, sponsored by the Ford Foundation and the Junior Chambers of Commerce. These ambassadors tried to give the Spanish people an idea of how we live in a democracy, and to cultivate friendship and goodwill between the peoples of the two countries.

Miss Barrett delighted her audience with her talk describing the customs of the Spanish people, who follow a much more leisurely routine than we do. She said there were few people in the streets before 9 or 10 a.m. Around 2 in the afternoon it is quiet again when all the families are home for dinner and rest. Later in the afternoon the shops are open again and everyone goes until about 10 p.m. when the evening meal is eaten. It is too hot in the summer to go out between 2 and 4 in the afternoons. The early evening hours are a time of great enjoyment in Spain. The entire family goes out on the streets for a walk or perhaps to visit friends.

About 8 in the evening, the streets and parks are crowded and it seems everyone must be out side. The sidewalk cafes are jammed with people and there is always an air of gaiety. The food she described as delicious and the mealtime often lasts for hours with various courses of soup, salads, fish, meats prepared with spicy sauces and fresh fruits and strong coffee. Since there is little refrigeration in Spain, the food for each day is purchased by the mother of the family in the early morning.

She said the topography of Spain is greatly similar to that of West Texas, with dry, arid plains and very little rainfall. The people she described as most friendly and hospitable. And best of all, they like Americans. As the peoples of the two countries come to understand each other better, the greater the chances are for lasting peace.

At the close of the program, Mrs. Roy Morgan, club president, presented a gift to Miss Barrett.

County Agent's Column

The first fly spraying of the town may be completed shortly, depending on availability of labor. C. L. King's men are the ones who will do the actual spraying. One thing we as citizens can do is to cooperate in locating our trash and garbage receptacles so they will be accessible to those doing the work. They should be placed in or near the alley and not hidden behind an outbuilding where the sprayers have to go through several gates, etc. to get to them.

This year as last the latest and most effective insecticide is being used by the county to spray the town. By itself, spraying is not enough to give effective control of flies. The Public Health Service maintains that strict sanitation is the best weapon to fight insects. The spraying that is done by the county is to supplement the measures that we as citizens undertake ourselves. It would be an education if everyone could accompany the spraying crew and see where the flies are coming from in this town. In some cases one family is breeding enough flies to stock Sterling City.

Flies breed in dampness. If we watch out for places where water overflows and stands and dry up there will be little trouble. Now while it is so dry one good spraying, coupled with individual spraying and sanitation will reduce the parent stock which will infest the town if and when it does rain. Manure, garbage, wet feed, etc. will furnish the bulk of the breeding places for flies. These places need to be cleaned up.

The spray solution being used by the county this year is a 1.5% solution of Malathion plus one pound of powdered sugar per gallon of spray.

Watch out for the Pecan Case-bearer. Now is the time for the moths to lay the eggs on the little nutlet. If you see a small bluish white egg in the tip of the nutlet, you have only a few days to get the work done. The egg hatches and the small worm moves up and down the stem until he comes to the first or second bud where he feeds for a few days before he moves back up the stem and enters the nut. After he once enters the pecan, spraying is useless.

In spraying this year use the following materials to 100 gallons of water:

3 lbs. Wettable DDT
6-8 lbs. Wettable Sulfur
3 lbs. Zinc Sulphate.

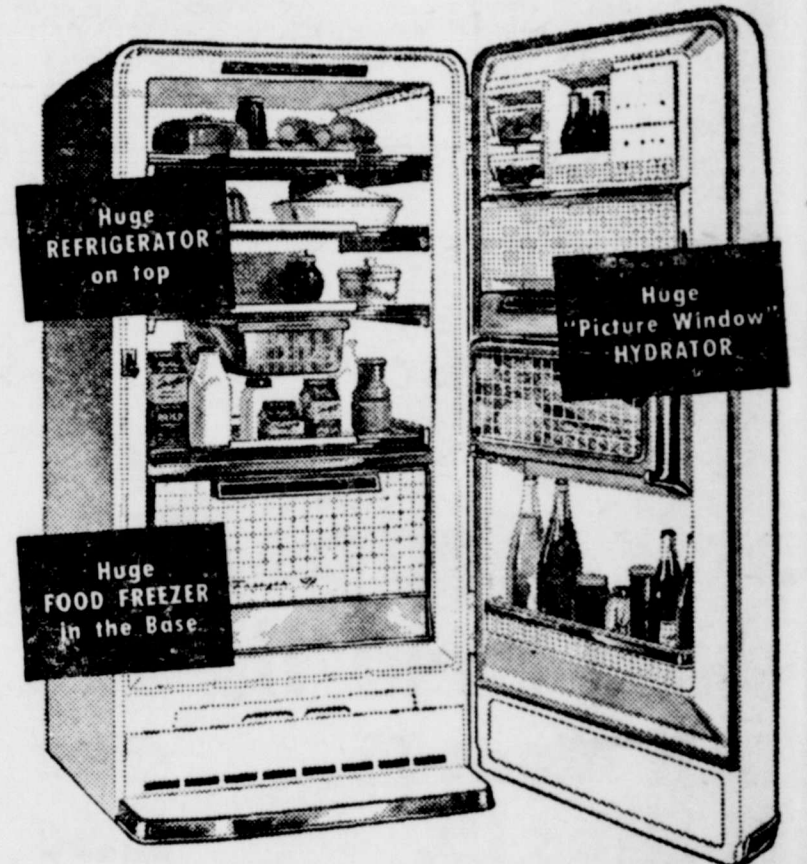
