

Watch out for the Pecan Casebearer. Now is the time for the moths to lay the eggs on the little nutlet. If you see a small bluish white egg in the tip of the nutlet, you have only a few days to get the work done. The egg hatches and the small worm moves up and and down the stem until he comes to the first or second bud where he feeds for a few days before he moves back up the stem and enters the nut. After he once enters the pecan, spraying is useless.

In spraying this year use the following materials to 100 gallons of water:

3 lbs. Wettable DDT 6-8 lbs. Wettable Sulfur 3 lbs. Zinc Sulphate.




