

Coconut Broiled Bananas

4 bananas; melted butter; salt; 1 cup shredded coconut, cut; 3 tablespoons orange juice; 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind.


Peel bananas and split lengthwise in halves. Place cut side down in lightly greased shallow baking pan. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle lightly with salt. 



Regular Washing: Whether you

ing: Whether you launder cordured by hand or by machine, treat soiled places first . . with sponge, rub bead-bluing suds into spots. Fill tub or washer with warm water, add a half cup of the new laundry bead-bluing (the one with nylon brightener) and a good soap or syndet, plus a water conditioner (according to the manufacturer's directions).

Since corduroy tends to pick up lint, and since colors also tend to run—wash colors separately from whites. If washing by machine, run machine 5 minutes; rinse thoroughly, spinning about 3 minutes. Squeeze gently by hand, or put through loosely adjusted wringer. Remember that twisting corduroy makes unnecessary creases!

Washbowl Washing: Identical, except that gentle scrubbing will be

Drier Drying: Dry corduroy at high heat, but remove while still slightly damp to prevent creasing. Place on hanger and smooth out—especially at seams. Drier action brings up nap nicely. Ironing is usually unnecessary, but if you prefer to touch up garment, then place nap-side down on a Turklish towel and iron from wrong side. A steam iron does especially well for this type of pressing.





a flashy gelatin dessert. Peach Delight, for instance, is based on orange. flavored gelatin could be more colorful than that?

to make it for Dad and Mom some summer weekend, too.

Peach Delight

1 package orange-flavored gelatin; 1 cup hot water; 1 cup peach juice and water; 1 cup canned peaches, diced.

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add peach juice and water. Turn 1/2 of gelatin mixture into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened. Then fold in peaches. Turn into mold over firm gelatin. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with sweetened whipped cream flavored with almond extract. Makes 6 servings.
